FASHIONS IN CURTAINS

Fabrics That Will Be Smart This Winter.

FANCIES IN LINEN SHADES.

Among the New Materials For Hangings is a Madras Distinguished For Its Resistance to the Sun's Rays. Dutch Prints Are Effective.

The new curtains are extremely pretty, and for the comfort of the chateleine with moderate sized purse it may be noted that some of the designs are not high priced. There are others, though, that rise to figures prohibitive for any but the possessors of the most pretentious homes.

The old fashioned curtains of tuck muslin and others showing checks and dots are very modish and are closely rivaled by insertions of Arabian lace and bobbinet draperies with bonnas decoration, the bowknob being the preferred design.

Body's Accessory. For summer frocks of sprigged muslin, spotted foulard or flowered lawn the most attractive trimming to the bodice would be wide broderies of fllet lace, bordered on either side with a band of pale satin colors, cut on the cross and matching in tone the pattern on the ground work of the material.

A set of trimmings such as these, hemmed with silk or satin in different colors, would form a most useful adjunct to a dress of spotted or plain white muslin, and if a waist belt and hat were chosen to match completely different aspects could be given to the original simple dress at a minimum of expense.

Use of Braid, Velvet and Buttons. The dainty touches given the new lace blouses by the clever use of narrow braid, buttons and velvet bows are indiscribable for their effectiveness, and it would take a chapter to do justice to the ideas rung in on this scheme. Instead of the regular beading, many of the tiny lace frills used upon blouses of the moment are put on understitchings of narrow silk soutache braid, and above the heading there usually appear two or three more rows of the soutache braid.

MARCONI TALKS WITH IRELAND.

Outlook For Wireless Telegraphy is Bright—Secrecy Assured.

Sydney, N.S., Sept. 26.—Signor Marconi was interviewed yesterday at his wireless telegraph station, Port Morion.

"We have been working steadily the past three months putting on the finishing touches," said Marconi, and inside of three weeks we shall be in a position to give the press a five-cent rate on messages to the other side, and the general public will be given a ten-cent rate.

"I am in daily communication with Clifton, and was speaking to them today. We are testing the machinery on that side. Before the station is opened up for commercial work we shall work continuously with Canada for two or three days."

"Can transatlantic messages be intercepted by passing steamers which are equipped with the Marconi apparatus?" was asked.

"No," replied the inventor, "unless the vessels were equipped with special apparatus the messages would be absolutely private. I hope to put up more stations on this side of the Atlantic, but that will be something to be considered later. The locations have not been decided as yet."

SEES WAR IN NEAR FUTURE.

Japan and U. S. Will Struggle For Mastery of Pacific.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 26.—The conviction prevails here that war between Japan and the United States is inevitable in the distant future.

"The day when the United States fleet passes out of the Strait of Magellan and sweeps into the waters of the Pacific will open a new era for the eastern world. Official courtesies and the temporary lull in war talk do not conceal the fact that America is reaching out for the mastery of the Pacific, and already is strong enough to attain it."

DOVER COUNCIL.

The adjourned Council of Revision on the Terry Mechanical Drain met on Sept. 16th, 1907.

The minutes were all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

Moved by Fox and Carron, that having considered the appeal on the Terry Mechanical drain, and heard the appellant in evidence, the assessment, \$35.99, on the n w 1/4 lot 3, in the 6th Con., be taken off and the same be added pro rata to the assessments on the rest of the lots and roads assessed for said drain; and the Court of Revision be closed.—Carried.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment. Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

The Terry Mechanical Drain By-law was read and finally passed. The Marden drain repair, and the Hyatt drain branch repair by-laws were read and provisionally adopted.

A by-law to provide for the current rates for 1907 was also read and finally passed; the rate on the dollar being, county rate including county special school rate, 1.6-10 mills, general school rate 1.5-10 mills, township rate \$3-10 mills.

A letter was read from F. W. Smith, solicitor, re Jos. L. Charron's fence grievance on Big Point Road.

Moved by Fox and Carron, that J. Shackleton's amended report on the Hackett drain repair be adopted, and the Clerk prepare a by-law.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Crawford, that the matter of having the minutes of the Council meetings published in both Chatham papers, be referred to the Printing Committee with power.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Crawford, that a dog be taken off Wm. J. Brown's assessment, it having been killed some time ago.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Crawford, that Theodore Peltier be paid \$4 for inspecting residences of John Toulson and Joseph Carron.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Crawford, that M. Carron, T. Peltier and W. H. Clements, fenceviewers, be each paid \$2 for inspecting the line fence between the lands of Gilbert Reaume and Theresa Jubinville, and making an award thereon, and charged to Mrs. Jubinville. Also that Geo. Foy, John B. Rose and Edmund Cheff, fenceviewers, be each paid \$2 for arbitrating on the line fence between the n w 1/4 lot 12 and s w 1/4 of n e 1/4 said lot 12 in the 9th Con., owned by Gephore Emery and Alexander McDonald, respectively, and making an award thereon, and charged to Alex. McDonald.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that Con. E. Shea's account, \$2.70, be paid for furnishing and printing, and charged to the respective accounts.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that the Daily News account, \$8.24, be paid for advertising Voters' Lists.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that R. Cooper's account, \$8.05, be paid for stationery.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that A. McDonnell's account, \$25, be paid for repairing the damage to his rig by an accident on the public highway.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that John B. Rose be paid \$1 for pathmasters' returns.—Carried.
