CONTROL OF THE SEAS.

In Ten Years Will Have Passed to the United States.

London, Aug. 9.—(C.A.P.)—At Hatfield Hon. T. A. Brassey, reviewing the comparative strength of our navy and those of foreign countries, said that in ten years the command of the seas will have passed from the United Kingdom to the United States. He arrived at this conclusion because at the present moment the States had considerably more battleships building than were being constructed for the British navy, and because the resources of the States were greater than those of the United Kingdom. The resources of the States, however, were not equal to those of the United Kingdom combined with those of the colonies, and one reason he was a tariff reformer was because he held that through some form of commercial federation we should obtain such a result as would enable us to maintain our navy at a strength securing us the command of the seas.

To a Royal Commission London, Aug. 9.—(C.A.P.)—The Daaly Chronicle says that it looks as if Premier Balfour was sounding the colonies on the subject of Mr. Chamcolonies on the subject of Mr. Chamberlain's proposed conference. Again he has asked that the Parllamentary question on the subject be postponed for a few days. Either the Government have not yet made up their minds or they are inquiring what the colonies have to say. Possibly, however, Premier Balfour is considering the idea of circumventing Mr. Chamberlain and shelving the whole subject by refering it to a Reyal Commission on the lines of the "compromise" resolution adopted at the Associated Chambers of Commerce Congress at Montreal. Congress at Montreal.

Lightning Causes Big Less.

Fergus, Aug. 9.—Another disastrous storm passed over here Sunday afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock. There was a very heavy rain, with hail, which could be gathered up in pails full. It was accompanied with wind and severe thunder and lightning. One flash struck in the corner of Alex. Brown's magnificent barn on the Belwood road, two miles out, and in an instant the blaze was seen in the barn from the house. It, and all its contents, were soon destroyed. Nothing could be saved. There was insurance to the amount of about \$3,500, but the loss will be heavy. heavy.

New York, Aug. 9.—The general lockout against unions in the building trades, whose members have recently ordered strikes, went into effect yesterday. The number of men affected by the lockout is variously estimated at from 50,000 to 100,000. The men yesterday repudiated the general arbitration plan signed a year ago.

Strassburg, Alsace Lorraine, Aug. 9.—Fire yesterday destroyed a large orphan asylum and the Magdalen Church, causing damage of \$1,500.
