KING'S SECOND COUSIN.

Count Albert Victor Gleichen Now Attached in Military Capacity to U. S. Embassy at Washington.

Count Albert Victor Gleichen, who is attached in a military capacity to the British embassy at Washington, is, in spite of his German name and title, an English soldier and in every sense of the word a Briton. He is no stranger to this country, writes the Marquis de Fontenay, which he visited about sixteen years ago, and on his return home published an article relating his American experiences and which appeared in Murray's Magazine, attracting a good deal of attention on this side of the Atlantic, owing to the fact that he had been imprudent enough to mingle with his praise some criticisms which were not altogether well received here. He is, however, a gallant soldier, one of the most popular men in the English army, alike with his fellow officers and with the rank and file, and besides that an extremely accomplished man, who paints, sketches, plays, and sings, as well as he writes. He is the author of several successful books, one of the most interesting of which is a record of his experiences as a member of Sir Rennell Rodd's mission to the Negus of Abyssinia.

Besides being the godson of King Edward and one of his equerries, Count Gleichen is his cousin. For his father, the late Prince Victor Hohenlohe, who, as Count Gleichen, rose to the rank of admiral in the English navy and distinguished himself in the Crimean war, was a favorite nephew of Queen Victoria, being a son of her half sister, Princess Victoria Hohenlohe, on marrying Miss Laura Seymour, assumed the title of Count Gleichen, which belonged to his family, and abdicated his rights and prerogatives as son of one of the medieval or formerly reigning houses of Europe, descending to the rank of a mere noble. Otherwise he would have been compelled to marry Miss Seymour morganatically. Prince Victor's sister was the mother of the present German Emperor, and Count Gleichen is, therefore, first cousin of her German majesty. Thanks to this, he has enjoyed an exceptionally privileged position at the Kaiser's court and in Berlin society, while acting as military attaché of the British embassy there. His mother now bears the title of Princess Victor Hohenlohe by virtue of an order of Queen Victoria, though it is not recognized on the continent. One of his sisters, Countess Frederica Gleichen, has achieved a little fame both as a painter and as a sculptress, having won prizes both at the Royal Academy and the Paris salon, while another sister, Countess Valda, who possesses a magnificent voice, married a few weeks ago Mr. MacNeill, under secretary of state in the department of finance of the Egyptian Government, and a son of the famous sportsman, Capt. MacNeill.

Count Gleichen, who holds the rank of lieutenant-colonel in the Grenadier Guards, and who is covered with decorations, is a bachelor, far from rich, and there are no restrictions in the way of his marrying anybody he chooses. His wife will be through her union to him a first cousin of the Kaiser and of King Edward, a German countess, and the helpmate of a charming and accomplished man, who is generally known among his friends by the nickname of "Glick."

I may add that he has seen a good deal of active service, having taken part in most of the Egyptian campaigns, is a graduate of the staff college, has been attached to special missions in Morocco, a country about which he has written, and was so badly wounded in the last war in South Africa that he was reported as dead in fact, his recovery were little short of miraculous.

How tactful he is in best shown by the manner in which he has managed to retain until now the affection and good will of his two kinsmen, the Kaiser and King Edward.

Leading Dietetic Authority.

Dr. Robert Hutchison, the leading authority at the present day on the subject of dietetics, is a Scotsman by birth, and was educated at the University of Edinburgh. He was one of the most brilliant students which the university ever had, and he was awarded every prize and scholarship practically which the university had to offer him. Edinburgh did not seem to give him a large enough field for his abilities, and he followed the example afforded by many of his countrymen in going south to the metropolis. There his ability was at once recognized, and, like the late Sir Andrew Clark, he was appointed physician to the London Hospital. Since then his career has been one of interrupted success. He has published what is at the present time the standard work on "Food and Dietetics," and also a manual on children's disease. Dr. Hutchison is a tall, very strongly-built man, clean shaven, with a quiet but impressive manner, and his whole personality speaks efficiency. He is possessed of a fund of dry humor, and of many friends.

Relic of Scotland's Kings.

An old cushion on which the Crown of Scotland rested was recently placed in the jewel room at Edinburgh Castle. The cushion has been presented to the nation by Sir Patrick Keith Murray, Bart., of Ochertyre, Gifford. It has been in the possession of the Keith Murray family since the marriage of the late Sir William Keith Murray, eighth Baronet, to the heiress of the last of the Keith Marischals, and who thereby became owner of Dunnotar Castle and Navelton House, near Edinburgh. It was sent in June last to the King's Remembrancer in Edinburgh, who, on receiving a certificate of authenticity from Sir Patrick Keith Murray, lodged the cushion with the regalia.

Always Raining There.

There is a group of islands to the south of New Zealand called the Sisters, or Seven Sisters, which are reputed to be subjected to a practically constant rainfall. The same may be said of the islands and mainland of Tierra del Fuego, for the difference there that the rain often takes the form of sleet and snow. On a line running round the world from four to eight or nine degrees there are patches over which rain seldom ceases to fall. This is called the "zone of constant precipitation," but at the same time there are several localities along it with very little rainfall.

CINDERELLA.

Her Story is Very Ancient and is in Sacred Hindu Books.

The story of Cinderella is substantially the same that told of Rhodope and Psammitichus by Eilian who lived in Rome in the third century of the Christian era. The story as told by Eilian is that while Rhodope was bathing an eagle carried away one of her sandals and dropped it near the feet of Psammitichus, King of Egypt, who, like Cinderella's prince, was struck by its diminutive size, caused the maiden to be sought for and married her when found. Make the sandal a glass slipper and add the ugly sisters for the sake of contrast, and the stories are much the same. The glass slipper, by the way, is an acknowledged fiction, being in reality a mistranslation of "pan-toufe en val" (a fur slipper), and not "en verre."

This at all events is what is claimed by Perrault in his "Contes de Fees." Both these stories have doubtless a common origin, but it is necessary to go farther back in the history of literature to find it—to a people who lived in a period of the past. It is in the Vedas, the four sacred books of the Hindoos, that the origin is to be found.

After what has already been said it will not be surprising to learn that Cinderella is a dawn maiden, her sisters being the powers of darkness, who compel her to wait upon them, keeping her hidden from sight. The dawn maiden breaks from her bonds and captivates the sun, remaining with him for a time. She then lingers with him in the heavens. She can remain only until a certain hour. Once she lingers too long and, hurrying back, leaves on the path she has taken a token of her visit in the form of a fleecy cloud, which she carries along with her as she returns to her abode in the night. The sun, determined to find her, sends out his emeralds (the rays of light), but does not find her until she appears before him as the evening twilight. In the Vedas the prince is called Mitra, which is one of the names given to the sun.—London Globe.

A Yankee Stretcher.

The late General Wilman W. Blackmar once told how he had overheard an English corporal drilling his squad in this fashion, according to the Chicago Inter Ocean.

"Now, then, No. 7," the corporal said, "we'll make another start—that is, if you've quite finished feelin' if your back hair happens to be on straight this mornin'. It's you I'm talkin' to—third man from the left on front rank. I haven't the pleasure of knowin' your name, but I expect to be writin' it down for an hour's extra work pretty soon. Now, then, look out to your front. Squad, 'tchum! Left dress! Turn your eyes to the left—without squintin' like Chinese rummies, if you can. Stand up in the ranks, too like soldiers, not like a measly row of lopped, spindle shanked, cockney shop boys! Stick your chests out and put your stummocks somewhere out of sight altogether. There's 'est of you with figure like bags of potatoes. Strike me crimson if I ever saw such a mob! Hi, you in the centre—the ginger headed man, I mean—don't grin like that. This ain't no perishin' beauty competition, not by no manner of means."

The Lake Dried Up.

Lake Chrissie is a small body of water in the eastern Transvaal, in connection with which there is an interesting legend. The Boers held the belief that not until the lake in question became dry would they lose their independence. For the first time with in human memory the lake, one of the very few fresh water lakes in South Africa, was perfectly dry during the latter stages of the war. After the declaration of peace the lake resumed its normal appearance, though the water was shallower than before. Twice since then—in 1904 and 1905—the bed of the lake has been quite dry.

CONFESSES TO A MURDER.

Rancourt Says He Had Himself Been Threatened With Death and Was Terrorized Into Deed.

Montreal, March 26.—A wire from St. Joseph, Beauce County, says that Bernard Rancourt was put on trial Saturday morning for the murder of Johnny Rainville. Friday the widow Rainville said she did not believe Rancourt killed her husband, but the young woman's theories were upset Saturday by a confession from the accused to High Constable Dulac of St. Mary's.

"Several times Rainville had threatened me with death," began the accused, "and he said things to me so terrible that they are still ringing in my ears. 'If you do not obey me in everything,' he declared, 'I will kill you like a dog.'"

"Seeing him alone in the road the night of Aug. 25, I was more frightened than ever because I believed my life to be in danger. In fact, I was afraid of my life whenever I would meet him. For the last few days before his death, Rainville became still more terrible in his threats, and I feared for my life."

Three-Storey Sun Parlor Annex to Atlantic City Hotel Falls.

Atlantic City, N. J., March 26.—Five men are believed to have been killed instantly and nearly a score of others injured, several possibly fatally, when the three-storey sun parlor being built as an annex of the Hotel St. Denis collapsed Saturday afternoon. The annex, which is 100 feet long and extends from Michigan avenue to the board walk, with a width of seventy feet, was nearly completed.

Forty or more workmen were engaged on the various floors, when, without warning, the big structure of brick and steel fell with a crash that was heard for blocks.
