THE BEHNKE CASE.

The Behnke case became sensation-
 when the analysis of the stomach contents
 was made by Dr. Chabert; the
 government analyst at Regina found
 traces of chloral hydrate therein.
 This would give the impression that the
 deceased had been "dozed" by someone,
 or that he had taken something by mis-
 take or design.

Chloral hydrate is a drug which phy-
 sicians sometimes prescribe, but it is
 also used as a "knock out" by persons
 who mean robbery.

The above facts were communicated
 to the adjourned inquiry last week and
 a further adjournment took place. The
 jury sat again last Friday and arrived
 at the only possible conclusion.
 "The verdict of the jury was that Wil-
 liam Behnke came to his death from a
 dose of chloral poisoning, administered
 by himself or some person or persons un-
 known."

This amounts to an open verdict, but
 as far as the coroner's jury is concerned
 the case is closed. If someone does him
 it is difficult to find a motive, as Behnke
 had about \$150 in cash, and bank drafts
 for about \$1,200 in his pockets when
 taken from the train here in the state of
 unconsciousness from which he never
 recovered.

 were in town on Friday, and it was ex-
 pected that local sports would have seen
 a race between the former and Grant of
 Macleod. A race had been arranged for

 men would have been well backed.

To the Editor of The Times

Dear Sir,

I desire to present to your
 readers a few suggestions concern-
 ing the disease in the district in the
 province, which it seems to me the
 new Provincial Government could
 very wisely take up at their first
 session.

The particular disease to the pre-
 vention of which I desire to call at-
 tention is Typhoid. Fever and the
 particular method of its prevention
 is the keeping pure of our streams.

The investigation of many Sanitary
 Commissions and Boards of Health
 has conclusively shown the fact that
 Typhoid bacilli are almost always
 waterborne, even those found in milk
 being conveyed to the dairies in the
 water supply, and further, that only
 the most elaborate and costly plants
 are able to entirely eradicate them.

At the present time Mr. Editor
 there are four or five of our big
 towns draining their sewage into the
 rivers upon which they are situated
 without any attempt to prevent the
 full effect of the filth being passed on
 to those who live further down the
 stream, and it will take only a few
 years of this sort of thing to make
 our waterways modified sewers. These

meet the President and Secretary of the
 Turf Association.

The Secretary reported that through
 a judge's mistake in a figure the prize
 for brood mare shown by Mr. Penton
 had been paid to Mr. John Ross.

On motion of Messrs. Harris and Rae
 the President and Secretary were
 authorized to adjust the matter.

EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

Mr. Babington raised the subject of
 an experimental farm for Medicine Hat
 and suggested the Town Council would
 take the matter in hand and get a piece
 of ground near town and start it. He
 noticed Mrs. Basset had a small piece
 which would do, and a whole section
 just out of town belonging to Lord
 Strathcona and he might be induced to
 give them a piece of that. The speaker
 offered to do a dollars worth of work
 preparing the land for every dollar in
 money put up by the town or the Agri-
 cultural Society.

Mr. Foster informed the meeting as
 what had been done by the town
 Council and Board of Trade in trying
 to get an experimental farm here.

Don. W. T. Finlay, Minister of Agri-
 culture for Alberta, being asked to speak
 on this question, gave a very interesting
 address and mentioned that among the
 earliest of his duties would be to take up
 the subject of travelling dairies. As
 to the experimental farm he had some
 time ago approached the Ottawa author-
 ities at the request of this Society, and
 had received an acknowledgment but
 no more. He believed three or four
 small experimental stations would be
 established in Alberta, and whatever he
 could do to get one here would be done.
 Such a farm at Edmonton would of
 course be no use to the people here,
 because the conditions there are so
 different from the conditions here.
 He would do anything in his power for
 this district. (Applause.)

Mr. Harris was glad to hear the Min-
 ister of Agriculture announce that his
 department intended doing something
 for the dairying as it would be a good
 thing for this district, and he gave a
 little of his experience of the
 travelling dairy schools in the Old
 Country where, although every farmer's
 wife was a good butter maker yet much
 good had been done even there among
 the farmers daughters in affording them
 instruction in up-to-date methods.

Mr. Shields also spoke in favor of the
 travelling dairies.

Mr. Rae moved for a committee to
 consider the question of the experimen-
 tal farm, but said he did not think the
 Town Council or the Society could do
 anything much in the matter on their
 own account as unless they were thor-
 oughly well under very competent
 management it would be a failure. Re-
 ferring to the proposed travelling dairies
 he thought it would be a good thing to
 bring one into this district. If the
 German farmers of Josephsburg learned
 the art of making good butter there
 would not be necessity there now of
 sending to Brandon and other Manitoba
 creameries for butter, which has to be
 sold here at 35 cents per lb.

The discussion was continued by Mr.
 Babington, Mr. Cousins, Mr. Foster,
 and others and Mr. Rae's motion was
 carried.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The annual general meeting of the
 Medicine Hat Agricultural Society was
 held on Friday last. There was a fair
 attendance of members. President
 Foster called the meeting to order.

Secretary Bray read the minutes of
 the last annual meeting and on motion
 of Messrs. Cousins and Harris, the same
 were adopted.

The Secretary next read his annual
 statement in the course of which he
 gave the shipments for the year as follows:

Cattle.....13,046
 Horses.....2,720

He also read a statement of the
 receipts and disbursements of the year,
 and on motion of Messrs. Finlay and
 Hunt it was adopted.

Following this the Secretary read the
 auditors report, which, on motion of
 Messrs. Harris and Porter were adopted.

Correspondence re seed grain exhibits
 was read. This had been before the
 Board of Directors and the action of the
 Directors (as already published in the
 Times), was reported to the meeting.

On motion of Mr. Cousins and Finlay
 the general meeting endorsed the
 steps taken by the Directors.

The new President then took the
 chair amid applause and thanked the
 members for the honor conferred upon
 him.

Mr. Rae drew attention to the im-
 portance of issuing the prize list early
 in the season, and moved that next year
 the list be issued in April. This was
 seconded by Mr. Hunt and carried.

The question of a committee from the
 Society meeting a committee from the
 Turf Association with reference to ob-
 taining suitable show grounds and
 track grounds was raised, and the Presi-
 dent and Secretary were appointed to
 consider the matter.
