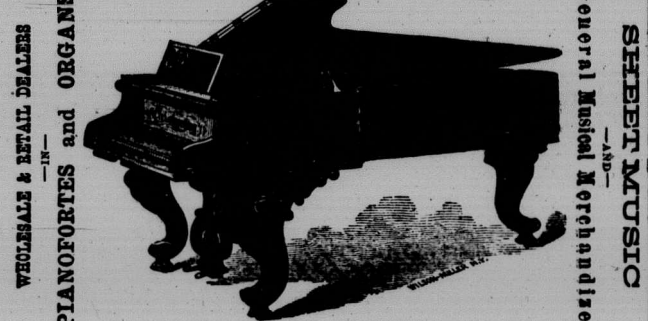

**How to Defeat Tupper.**  
WESTMORLAND POINT,

To the Editor of the CHIGNECTO POST:  
Sir:--I see a great portion of your  
local contemporary, a few weeks  
since, was taken up in publishing that  
wonderful address to the Hon. A. G.  
Jones, got up at Amherst, and after-  
wards sent to Ottawa. Fearing some  
people might think Dr. Tupper's  
popularity on the decline, I thought  
it best to give a fair statement of  
facts, as that address said it was  
signed by most of the leading men  
in Amherst. Well, as regards the  
respectability of the persons who  
signed it, I believe it to be correct.  
I will admit I was somewhat surprised  
at seeing some of the names at-  
tached. I had a conversation with  
one gentleman who signed the ad-  
dress, and asked him how it was that  
many of the Dr.'s former supporters  
had signed it. His reply to me was:  
"We thought it would do no harm,  
and our object was to get from Mr.  
Jones a political speech at Amherst."  
He further said: one half or more  
who signed the address would vote  
for Dr. Tupper. I think it strange  
that the British Squadron in the  
Mediterranean is now in Beika Bay  
and will advance to the Dardanelles  
to be nearer Admiral Commerell.

Captain Syenetchukine of Russian  
Navy is about to proceed to New  
York to inspect fast sailing steamers  
available for the service of the  
Government. The Russian fleet  
will be bound by the Russo-Turkish  
preliminary of peace.

The Preparations of England and  
Austria cause but little excitement.  
The conviction that peace will be  
maintained is very strong.

BALTIMORE, March 13th.--A brig  
entered here a few days ago as the  
"Alesia," from Port Cabello, with a  
cargo of coffee and hides. She  
proves to be the British brig "Alesia,"  
of St. John, N. B., which was loaded  
at Porto Cabello for Hamburg, and  
where her cargo is insured for \$24,  
000. A man calling himself Kingear  
was endeavoring to sell the cargo  
and tried to obtain \$60,000 in  
cash advance, but failed, getting  
only \$1,000. The brig has been  
seized by the British Consul, the  
being found yesterday at Canton
