NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY

Interesting Talk by President Bailey Upon Queer Fishes.

Some of the Curiosities of the Mighty Deep.

Results of Alcoholic Fermentation as Shown by the Microscope.

At the meeting of the Natural History Society last evening the President of the Society, Dr. Bailey, gave a talk upon the subject of "Queer Fishes." After defining the word "queer" as meaning "odd" or "singular" he first described what may be called a typical fish, and then explained how from this type variations branched off in various directions, producing oddities. Then it was shown that there are fishes with immense heads and little bodies, others with large bodies and hardly any heads; fishes without skulls or brains or hearts or limbs; fishes which instead of the ordinary shape are snake-like or ribbon-like, or square or triangular or spherical; fishes with enormous eyes and others with no eyes at all, or with both eyes on the same side of the head; fishes which stand on their heads and others which stand on their tails; fishes which are termed "all mouths" and deceive the name, while others are practically all stomach and swallow prey twice as large as themselves; fishes which are covered with an armor or coat of mail, while others pour out over the body a fluid which thickens the surrounding water almost to the consistency of jelly; fishes with teeth like lancets, others with teeth like cobblestones, others with teeth like velvet, and others with no teeth at all; fishes which fly as well as swim while others, leaving their native element, crawl for hours upon the land or even climb trees; fishes which carry storage batteries in their heads, capable of giving fatal shocks, while others hang out a few inches in front of their heads, electric lights as lures for the smaller fishes on which they prey; fishes which never leave the surface and others whose home is five miles below the surface and under a pressure equal to that of half a dozen heavy locomotives; fishes which instead of laying eggs in the ordinary way incubate them and even build nests in which to lodge them; others of which the male carries the eggs about in his pocket, or at times in his mouth; still others that lay no eggs at all but like mammals, bring forth their young alive; fishes which live in caves, in hot springs or in the stomachs of other animals; finally fishes which, though commonly so called, like cuttle-fishes, jelly-fishes, etc., are not fishes at all. He even went on to say that he had known of cases where members of the human race had been described by their fellows as being "queer fishes" but probably a better acquaintance would correct the fallacy.

In illustration of the lecture which explained the very various ways in which fishes move, eat, breathe, attack and defend themselves actual specimens of various forms were exhibited, including sharks, dog-fish, sturgeon, skate, flying-fish, pipe-fish, sea-horse, sea-porcupine, trunk-fish, sea-pike, etc., which awakened much interest, as did a volume issued by the U. S. Fish Commission showing in beautiful plates the wonderfully colored fishes collected about the shores of Porto Rico.

After some discussion of the subject in which a number of members, including Mr. Brittain, Mr. Foster, Mr. Hagerman and others took part, Mr. Brittain exhibited under the microscope, more fully than he had been able to do at the previous meeting, the results of alcoholic fermentation; and Mr. Manzer, of the Junior class at the University, showed, also under the microscope, living specimens of the fresh water hydra, an animal which he had been recently studying. This animal when first discovered near the beginning of the last century was considered so remarkable that specimen were sent from one European court to another by special embassies; the singularity consisting in the wonderful recuperative power to which its name refers, and in virtue of which it may be cut indefinitely into pieces, each developing a new animal like that of which it was a part, or even of being turned inside out without apparent inconvenience. Another singular feature is its mode of reproduction by bud like a plant, thus forming united colonies, some of which were shown among the specimens exhibited. The meeting was in every way an interesting one.

ONTARIO EXPENDITURES.

Whitney Cabinet Present Their First Budget to Legislature.

Total Expenditures for Year Over Five Millions.

Increased Grants for Agriculture—Education Not Neglected.

TORONTO, Ont., April 11.—Complete estimates of expenditures have been distributed at the Parliament building in the usual pamphlet form. The total estimated expenditure is as already announced \$5,070,780; the actual expenditure last year was \$5,267,453. Among interesting items are an increase of \$11,000, for the Macdonald Institute at Guelph, bringing the total for the institution up to \$23,000; \$25,000 for a farm mechanics and implement demonstration building at Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph; and \$12,500 for sub-targets for high school cadet corps; \$1,186,340.51 is asked for education.

BRIBERS ABROAD.

City Council of Woodstock, Ont., Treated to an Unsavory Sensation.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., April 11.—Mayor Scarff this morning ordered an investigation of the charges that certain members of the Council had been bribed to support certain tenders for construction of cement walks in the city. This year the contract for walks was awarded to the Ingersoll Cement Co. at a council meeting yesterday afternoon, and immediately Alderman Gardener arose and declared that members of the Council were approached by various tenderers and influenced by bribes. He refused to name the Aldermen he had reference to and Mayor Scarff thereupon appointed Aids, Mearns, Hurst, Bastedo and Sawtell a committee to investigate the charges. The Crown Attorney will cooperate with the committee.
