Girl Acquitted of Glover Murder Wedded at Arichat

West Arichat, C. B., Jan. 16.—With-
in a stone's throw of the house in
which Mrs. Lillian M. Glover was
born, Hattie LeBlanc, the girl who
was tried and acquitted on the charge
of murdering Mrs. Glover's husband,
Clarence P. Glover of Waltham,
Mass., was married yesterday to Felix
Lynden. The ceremony took place in
the village church here.

The bridegroom is a former Boston
boy and fell in love with Miss Le-
Blanc during her trial at East Cam-
bridge. He is a native of Richmond
borough, part of which is the Isle
Madame, on which Miss LeBlanc
was born.

When the girl was brought home
by her father, Lynden followed, quit-
ting his job in Boston. He had paid
her ardent court, making frequent
trips from Sydney to the little Le-
Blanc cottage on Forzeron Point.

The wedding guests included per-
sons from every part of the borough.
Miss LeBlanc was attended by her
sister, Lillian, one year her junior.
Lillian was recently married to Wal-
ter Simpson, also a former Boston
boy. His acquaintance began when
he met Hattie's sister in the corri-
dor of the East Cambridge court
house.

THE ENGINEER IS HELD RESPONSIBLE

Montreal, Jan. 16.—A coroner's jury
today found Engineer J. C. Hamilton
criminally responsible for the wreck
on the C. P. R. Montreal-Quebec line
which resulted in the death of six
people.

Hamilton was engineer on the first
engine of the double header from Que-
bec which crashed head-on into the
train from Montreal, which was stand-
ing at St. Vincent De Paul station, ex-
pecting the train from Quebec to take
a siding.

Hamilton was not present in court,
as he is still in the hospital suffering
from two broken legs and internal in-
juries, the result of the collision; but
his deposition was read by the coron-
er.

It was to the effect that at Torren-
bonne, the station before St. Vincent
De Paul, he noted that the airbrake
on his engine was not working and
signalled to Paquette, the engineer on
the second train, to take charge of
the breaking of the train. He believed
that Paquette understood.

About half a mile from St. Vincent
De Paul he noted that the train was
going too fast and whistled for Pa-
quette to apply the brakes. This Pa-
quette did not do. He declared that if
Paquette had done so the disaster
would have been averted.

DANE IS WARDEN.

Native Born Son of Denmark is Pre-
siding Officer of Victoria County
Council.

Andover, Jan. 16.—For the first
time in the history of the Province of
New Brunswick, and possibly of the
Dominion, a native born Dane has
been selected to preside over the des-
tines of his county as warden.

The election of officers to the Vic-
toria County Council here today re-
sulted in the election of Anders J.
Jensen, of Salmonhurst, to that posi-
tion. Mr. Jensen has been a member
of the council for the past eleven
years, during which time he has ac-
complished much for the county.

It is rumored here that negotiations
will soon be opened with the provin-
cial legislature with the view to em-
powering the county to organize a
chain gang similar to that in St. John
county. If this innovation should be
introduced, Victoria county will be
the second in the province to adopt a
system that has proved successful
elsewhere in the prevention of law
breaking. By making the prisoners
work, a considerable saving can be
effected, and many habits of the
pen made to avoid it more carefully.

KILLED ON I. C. R. OUTSIDE HALIFAX

Halifax, Jan. 16.—Arthur Liffey, a
young man of twenty-five and Leo
Mullins, and I. C. R. shunter, were
killed in an accident on the Cotton
Factory siding of the I. C. R. here
tonight. James Robichaud of Mon-
cton, an I. C. R. fireman had his leg
broken in two places.

These men with nine others were
on their way home from work on an
engine which was proceeding from the
round-house to take the suburban
train from Halifax to Windsor Junc-
tion. It was preceded by a train of
empty box cars. The locomotive
caught the train ahead at a curve and
before it could be stopped it crash-
ed into the rear car. Three of the
men tried to jump and were caught
by the tender, two being killed in-
stantly. The third lost a leg, but may
live. He is now at the hospital.

Liffey had been at the round-house,
looking for a job.

MONCTON WON.

With Hogan in Goal and Doherty Star-
ring on the Wing, the New Glasgow
Team was Beaten.

Moncton, Jan. 16.—The Vics trim-
med the New Glasgow Cubs tonight, 6
to 3, in the fastest and most sensa-
tional hockey ever seen on Moncton
ice. Doherty, of Galt, the new Mono-
ton wing man, made good and carried
off the lion's share of the honors, with
Smith a close second. Scott who was
on the Moncton's lineup last year, was
watched closely and his brilliant
rushes were not so much in evidence.
Excitement ran high throughout the
game.

Miller, for the victors, shot the on-
ly goal in the first period. The sec-
ond period opened with a rush and
pandemonium prevailed when ten sec-
onds after the faceoff Doherty found
the New Glasgow net from the side
while 50 seconds later Norman scored.
Scott for the visitors soon evened up
but the pace was too fast for them,
and the second period ended 6 to 3.
There was no scoring in the third

BURNED TO DEATH.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 16.—Guy L.
Stewart, agricultural and industrial
agent of the Cotton Belt Railroad, with
headquarters in St. Louis, was burned
to death in his private car in a wreck
in which trains of three different roads
collided today, at Kelso, Mo., 140 miles
south of St. Louis.

M'MANIGAL TELLS OF DYNAMITE PLOTS

His Evidence Implicates Man
Who Met Him With Instruc-
tions for Omaha Job

Indianapolis, Jan. 16.—"When you
arrive in Omaha to blow up the pow-
er house you will be met by some-
body who will show you where it is."
That statement said by Otis E.
McManigal, the confessed dynamiter,
to have been made to him by John
J. McNamara, the convicted secre-
tary-treasurer of the International
Association of Bridge and Structural
Iron Workers, was inquired into at
the federal grand jury investigation
of the dynamite conspiracy today.
McManigal says, in response to the in-
structions from McNamara, he went
to Omaha in July 1910 to blow up
the power plant of an "open shop"
contractor and was met by a man
whose name he gave.

McManigal said the man told him
he had communicated with McNamara
about the job to be blown up, that
the man himself could not do it be-
cause he was not experienced in ex-
plosives and so McManigal was cho-
sen.

The evidence was in line with that
being gathered by the government
to ascertain who, if any, besides those
already known were implicated in the
hundred or more explosions scattered
over the country in the last five years.
It was about the time of the Omaha
job, according to McManigal, that Mc-
Namara said to him, "I am going to
get six or eight good fellows and sta-
tion them about the country, so that
explosions will take place in differ-
ent cities all in one night and they won't
know who is doing it."

McManigal is to be sent continu-
ously before the grand jury for the next
three days.

STREET RAILWAY SOLD.

Portland, Me., Jan. 16.—Arrange-
ments for the sale of the Portland
Street Railway Company, with assets
of about \$5,000,000 to the Portland
Light and Power Company were per-
fected today. An offer of 118 a share
for all or a majority of \$2,000,000 of
stock has been made and the directors
voted to recommend the sale of stock.

\$70,000 FIRE.

South Bethlehem, Pa., Jan. 16.—The
five story brick building owned by
the Austin Knitting Company and oc-
cupied by it and the Progressive Silk
Company, was almost destroyed to-
day by fire of unknown origin. The
loss may reach \$70,000.
