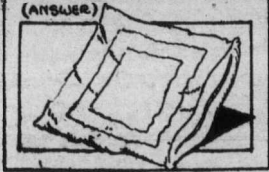
### THE WEATHER.

## DURHAM BRIDGE MILL OWNER WAS BADLY INJURED

Foster Cass the Victim of Painful Accident This Morning.

### SHOULDER BROKEN AND OTHER INJURIES

Board Caught in Saw and Was Thrown Back, Striking Mr. Cass.

Foster Cass, of Durham Bridge, was quite badly injured in his saw mill this morning.

Mr. Cass, who is the owner of the mill, was sawing some boards when one was caught in the saw in some manner and flew towards him, hitting him near the shoulder.

It was found that he had sustained a broken shoulder, a broken collar bone, two ribs broken, and a punctured lung. It is expected, however, that he will recover. ## DOUBLE ECLIPSE FOR FREDERICTON

Not Only the Moon Was Out of Business, But so Was the Street Lights.

Fredricton citizens had a fine opportunity to see the eclipse of the moon last evening.

Not only were atmospheric conditions excellent and the sky clear during the period of the progress of the eclipse but the civic authorities very kindly had an eclipse of the street lighting system, too.

Without street lights and the moon hidden under the shadow those who were fortunate enough to have to be out on the streets were impressed with the fact that there sure enough was a total eclipse. At the University and elsewhere local scientists made observations and much interest generally was manifested, those who were outside noticing many citizens and their families clothed in their night-robes and watching the progress from the windows.

The shadow started to cross the moon about 11 p. m., and the eclipse was in progress until after 1 a. m., the last half hour or so, however, finding the sky clouded.

## A NEW INDUSTRY FOR FREDERICTON NOW ANNOUNCED

Will Manufacture Concrete Blocks and Forms for Building Purposes.

### FORMER INTERCOLONIAL OFFICIALS INTERESTED

Will Remove Here and Use Old I. C. R. Foundry at Gibson for Factory.

Fredricton's industries are soon to be augmented by the addition of a concrete manufacturing plant.

A company has recently been formed, of which Mr. J. J. McCaffrey, proprietor of the Queen Hotel, is one of those interested, and also the only local stockholder, and the object of the new company will be to manufacture concrete blocks and forms for building purposes.

The old I. C. R. foundry at the Gibson end of the railway bridge has already been purchased, and it is here that the new industry will be located. Mr. H. J. McGrath, formerly masonry inspector on the I. C. R., will be the manager, and Mr. T. C. Burpee, formerly engineer of maintenance and ways of the I. C. R., will be the mechanical superintendent. The head office will be at Gibson.

The new company is applying for letters of incorporation with a capitalization of \$25,000, and already has plans in view for the erection of several concrete buildings here. It is also understood that they have orders for a large amount of ornamental work. The field of the new concern will comprise the eastern section of Canada and they will employ two travelling representatives.

Messrs. Burpee and McGrath will both move here from Moncton with their families shortly. Mr. Burpee having already purchased a dwelling in Gibson. Mr. McGrath is the father of Dr. R. H. McGrath of this city, and is expected to arrive here tomorrow.

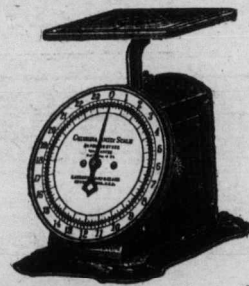
