Some of them bellowed so loudly that it would be absurd to think they had a drop less than "ten gallons" aboard. Daylight managed to come some how or another, but not a more miserable, unhappy night, from half past nine to dawn, than that of the 12th. Many of the boys, and some of the girls, were very much pleased with the performance of the Florenceville, did this unfortunate Editor ever speak.

Famine in Syria.

WASHINGTON, May 24. The following has been received by telegraph:—

Mossoul, April 5. A terrible famine, in which we exist, kills all the inhabitants of the town and those of the neighboring villages, who are assembling here in masses. Their sufferings are indescribable. Finding no cereals some eat corpses and become ill in consequence. Their lamentations are heartrending. Most of them are dying, as they have nothing to eat. Those of the inhabitants who have lived until now between life and death, pray you to give them such assistance as will enable them to live. They take the liberty to present their prayer with tears of expiation, which are flowing from their eyes, covered with blood.
