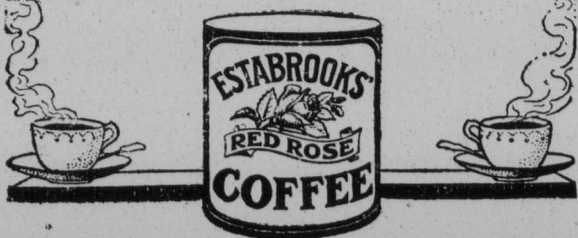

ATTACKING A
COMBINE

United States Government Takes
Action Against the Inter-
national Harvester Co.

Suit against the International Harvester Company charging it with being a monopoly in restraint of the trade and asking that it be dissolved has been filed by the Government in the U. S. district court last week. In a petition in equity this \$140,000,000 corporation, popularly called the harvester trust is declared to exist in violation of the Sherman law, and its dissolution is sought. To accomplish the disintegration of the so-called trust the Government asks the court to issue injunctions to bar from interstate commerce the products of the International Harvester Company, or the International Harvester Company of America, its selling agency is also to the appointment of a receiver to take charge of the property and wind up the business. "If the courts showed the opinion that the public interests will be better thereby," is suggested. The government alleges that the company has advanced the price of its products "to the grave injury of the farmer and the general public," and is extending its business into all lines of agricultural implements with the purpose of monopolizing it. The government alleges that the International Harvester Company controls at least 90 per cent. of the trade in the United States in harvesters or grain binders, 75 per cent. of the mowers, and more than 50 per cent. of the binders. There are only three or four manufacturers of harvesting machinery in the United States other than the International Harvester Co.
