VISIT THE SCHOOLS

Parents should visit the schools

CANADA'S POPULA- TION ESTIMATED AT OVER 9,000,000

Canada's population has increased
nearly half a million since the last
census was taken in 1921. Estima-
tes made by the Bureau of Statis-
tics show increases in every Pro-
vince except Prince Edward Is-
land where there has been a decline
of 900. There has also been a
fall of 600 in the population of the
Yukon.

PRICE OF COFFEE MAY BE ADVANCED

Coffee is considerably higher in
price than a few years ago, and it
is indicated that there may be
further advances within the next
few months. Several reasons are
given for the increase in the cost

of this beverage, but by far the
most important is the fact that
world consumption is speedily over-
taking production and in the grow-
ing of coffee such a state of affairs
cannot be adjusted in a hurry, so
that it is feared that there may be
a shortage before the growers are
able to meet the demand for coffee.
It has been estimated that the
world's shortage will amount to
between 1,500,000 and 2,000,000 bags

Present coffee prices are entirely
due to the natural laws of supply
and demand.

A local coffee merchant, in speak-
ing on the situation, said that he
had increased the retail price of his
coffee this week, but pointed out
that he was now making a smaller
margin of profit than previously.
He also pointed out that the most
popular grade of coffee which he

handled cost him in the vicinity of
eighty cents per pound wholesale
above the New York price, after
duty, freight and other charges had
been added, and said that there was
a considerable percentage lost in
shrinkage in roasting. He pointed
out that there was, also, a sales tax
to be added, thus making the price
considerably more than in the United
States.
