The Tariff.

The Manufactures' Association at its meeting at Halifax, put its views on the tariff question on record in the following resolution:

Rescived, that in the opinion of this association the changed conditions which now obtain in Canada demand the immediate and thorough revision of the tariff upon lines which will more effectually transfer to the workshops of the Dominion the manufacture of many of the goods which we now import from other countries. "That in any such revision the interests of all sections of the community, whether of mining, fishing or manufacturing, should be fully considered with a viet not only to the preservation, but to the further development of all these great national industries.

That while such tariff shail b primarily framed for Canadian interests it should, nevertheless. give a substantial preference to the Mother Country, and also to any other part of the British Empire with which reciprocal preferential trade can be arranged to

our mutual advantage, recognizing adequate protection to all Canadian producers." Put briefly, what the manufac turers ask is that the customs duties shall be fixed at so high a figure that the reductions under seriously affect the home market by their encoruagement of imto nullify the preference by indirect means. This attitude is a mistaken one, as greatly so as was the action of Parliament when it adopted the preferential principle. It was no part of the Canadian Paliament's business in framing a tariff for Canada to specially care for the British manufacturer, by in the Canadian market. The body of the sailor was not recovered.
