

THE NEW COUNCIL.

All yesterday afternoon and last night the attraction for citizens was Duckworth Street, opposite the Seamen's Home, where the bulletins of the voting in the Municipal contest were being exhibited. All through the day the position of the candidates did not alter, the first six standing thus: Martin, Coaker, Channing, Bishop, Ryan, Mullaly. During the evening Mullaly's stock took a rise and he took fifth place, and until well into the night it looked as if these would be the successful men. Then it was seen that Mr. Myrick's vote was increasing, and when the 1600 mark was passed the bulletin showed Myrick only 9 votes behind Bishop, he having picked up 59 votes on this particular hundred. When the next record was shown Myrick had forged ahead of Bishop, taking sixth place and increasing his lead until when the poll was closed at 12.30 this morning he led Mr. Bishop by 101 votes. When the poll was declared from the window of the building by Mayor Ellis, cheer after cheer greeted the new Councillors, whose position and votes were:—

The total number of votes cast was 3,192. Number accepted, 3,171; number spoiled, 21. After the result was announced Mr. Martin, who takes the honored position of Deputy Mayor, addressed the crowd thanking them heartily for the honor conferred on him, and was followed by the other newly-elected Councillors and Messrs. Bishop and Laracy. Mayor Ellis, supported by Mr. Martin, proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. F. J. Doyle, Returning Officer, and his aides for the painstaking manner in which their work was performed. Most of the newly elected Councillors were escorted to their homes by cheering crowds.

Manufacturers Meet.

A meeting of the St. John's Manufacturers' Association was held in the Board of Trade rooms last evening. Mr. J. H. Monroe was in the chair. Amongst those present were John Browning, J. McCoubrey, C. Duder, Mr. Cornick, Mr. Archibald, Mr. Renne, J. W. N. Johnstone, Mr. McLean, Mr. McCaffrey and Mr. Hirst. A committee consisting of F. McNamara, J. R. Bennett and C. R. Duder had been appointed at a former meeting to interview Lieut.-Col. Rendell in order to negotiate for the hire of the C. L. B. Armoury to hold the exhibition and also to wait on the Government to suggest that the Agricultural Show and Industrial Fair be held co-jointly. In connection with this a letter was received from Mr. Bennett saying that the Government were prepared to help on the Fair. Mr. G. C. Fearn, the Secretary, spoke strongly in favor of this idea and expressed the opinion that it would be a mistake to hold the exhibition separately. He stated that if the sible way. He also stated that if the manufacturers wished to have the Prince's Rink the Government would arrange to have the Agricultural Exhibition in the Curling Rink. He suggested that a committee be appointed to see the Executive of the Government in order to get their views on the matter. The subject will be taken up by the Finance Committee at the next meeting.
