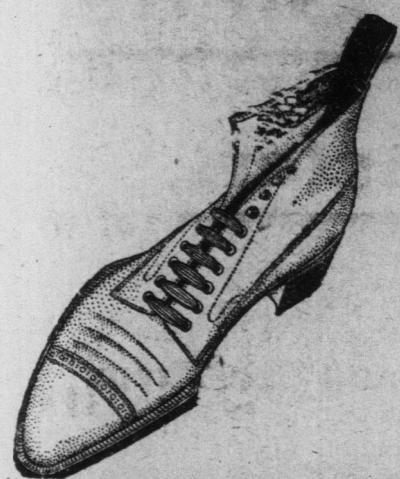

## Efficiency in Shopping.

Are you tired of hearing about the efficiency movement, that great new science of doing things in the quickest and easiest way? If you are not, I have a new application for it. As you know, the efficiency idea has been applied to housework, and it has been proved that by eliminating useless motions, perfecting her apparatus and improving the conditions under which she works, such as the position of apparatus, the heights of sinks, tables, etc., a big slice of every woman's time and energy can be saved.

Now if the science of efficiency is useful in this department of woman's work, why can't it be applied to others? And in what possible direction could a study of energy and time-saving be more valuable than in relation to shopping?

Are you an efficient shopper? I don't simply mean, do you get what you are after. But do you get it without using an unduly large amount of time and energy?

It was after a morning of shopping which left me astonishingly tired and out of temper that I began to wonder if I might not use more efficient methods in this matter.

I went over the ground thoroughly in my mind and formulated some rules for more efficient shopping. If

shopping leaves you astonishingly tired and out of temper, you may be interested in them.

One should always make out a list, not only of articles to be shopped for, but of places to be visited. Twice during that day I went back to a shop in which I had bought one article, for another. It will certainly save time if, before leaving home, or on the journey to town, you make out a list of shops to be visited in the order of their convenience. Under each shop write down the articles which you want to look for there.

If you are going to have several things to carry, do not try to carry them separately. It is confusing to try to keep track of them, to say nothing of the danger of loss, and confusion often tries one more than actual work. Either have some kind of a bag or a case to carry them in or have them wrapped up together.

Don't let yourself get too tired. Five minutes spent in the rest room just relaxing would double your efficiency for the rest of the forenoon.

Don't let yourself get too hungry. When you begin to feel confused and unable to concentrate, get a cup of chocolate or bouillon and see how much simpler everything seems.

Be sure to wear comfortable shoes and a light, small hat.

These are just a few things that I feel would make me a more efficient shopper. They may please you, and then again, they may not. Even if they don't, they may start a train of thought which will bring you some helpful ideas.

## Household Notes.

Mince meat usually makes the most acceptable sandwiches.

A adept in cooking does her work without utensils.

Scald new brooms in hot suds. This will toughen the fibre.

Fried bananas laid on a bed of rice makes a good luncheon dish.

To keep away moths, scatter cloves in bureau drawers and boxes.

Clean nickel and silver pieces with ammonia applied by a flannel cloth.

Milk puddings are the best desserts for children, but they should be varied.

Cheese is very wholesome prepared with macaroni, potatoes or bread-crumbs.

Regular bathing with hot water before bedtime is excellent treatment for the eyes.

Always fasten the ends of the threads when you finish a seam done by a chainstitch machine.

To peel onions without crying hold both onions and knife under cold running water while peeling.

A three-cornered telephone stand or table is a great saver of space, as it fits into a corner perfectly.

A velvet hat can be kept in condition by wiping it with a piece of black stocking after brushing.

When washing out the refrigerator some washing soda in the water will help to keep it sweet.

The triplicate mirror is an absolute necessity to the woman who would be always in perfect trim.

Attention to detail—orderliness and perfect cleanliness—make the kitchen a place of peace and beauty.

If canned pears are insipid, drain

off the juice and cover them instead with the juice of oranges well sugar-ed.

When kitchen towels wear thin, stitch two of them together around the edges and diagonally across the center.

A soiled rubber raincoat can be scrubbed with automobile soap, wetting only a small surface at a time and drying it.

A delicious gelatine pudding is made with the juice of canned strawberries. Add the juice of an orange to the strawberry.

As soon as tongue is boiled tender, it should have cold water run over it for a minute; then the skin will slip off easily.

When furniture does not actually need polishing it is a good idea to wipe it off thoroughly with a cloth dipped in linseed oil.

To rid a room of flies instantly, put a few drops of carbolic acid on a live shovel and wave the shovel around the room.

If you wish to get the utmost heat from soft coal, powder it small, wet it and sprinkle 1-2 cupful of fine salt on a large hod of coal.

A good polish for patent leather shoes is one part linseed oil and two of cream, well mixed. Apply with a bit of flannel, then rub off.

Soapsuds should always be saved for the garden—roses, vines and fruit trees all thrive with an occasional sudsy watering of their roots.

Lace theatre caps which are out of fashion can be turned into charming bags by running cords and tassels in where the elastic was.

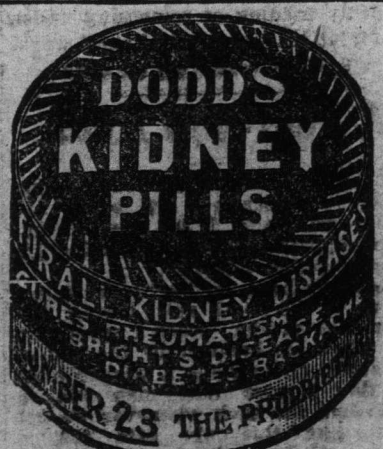
An appetizing change for breakfast is slices of dried-out bread quickly browned over a very hot fire, and eaten dipped in hot salted water.

Varnished wall paper can be successfully washed in warm water to which a little vinegar has been added. Rinse with clean tepid water.

Arabian lace curtains can be cleaned by brushing dry cornmeal through them as they lie on the floor. A sheet should be spread under them.

A hat should never be set flat on the floor of its hat box. Place a little hat rest in the centre, made of an inverted strawberry basket, padded.

A nice way to prepare fruit for the luncheon basket is to divide an orange into sections, dip it in powdered sugar and pack tightly into a little stone jar.

## Seven a Day Killed.

In Greater New York During the Past Year.

New York, Jan. 29.—In the twelve months of 1912 there were 2,712 persons killed in Manhattan by shooting, stabbing, assaults, self-inflicted wounds or from injuries received in falls and other mishaps. This made an average of more than seven violent deaths each day. These figures are given in the annual report of Antonio d'Alessandro, chief clerk of the Board of Coroners.

One hundred and forty-six persons lost their lives by being struck by automobiles, or fifty-five more than in the previous year. There were 114 homicides by shooting and 198 homicides by all methods.

The antiquated horse cars still in use killed ten persons in the year, ten were killed by horse kicks and the apparently harmless bicycle killed three. Horse drawn vehicles killed 108, surface cars 62 and the subways 14.

Accidental burns killed 267 persons, and of these fourteen children were burned by playing with matches; six children were burned to death by bonfires, and seventy-four children were scalded to death by pulling pots of hot water, soup and coffee down upon themselves.

Five persons were killed by jumping from windows at fires, fifty-nine were burned to death in fires, and twenty-three were burned to death by their clothes catching fire.

Interesting figures are revealed in the list of deaths by suicide. Thirty-eight persons chose the method of leaping from windows or roofs, while only two employed the supposedly easy method of drowning. Fifteen hurled themselves in front of trains or automobiles; thirty-two hanged themselves; sixty-seven selected poison; 183 used gas; eighty-nine shot themselves and twenty-eight used knives.

Fifteen persons were choked to death by food; 229 were accidentally drowned, three were accidentally shot and 52 were killed by accidentally taking poison. Ten persons were killed by falling into the holds of vessels tied to piers; 102 were killed by falling from chairs and beds; 60 were killed by being hit by bricks and other material falling from buildings; 39 fell down elevator shafts; 35 fell off roofs, and 34 fell off street cars, automobiles or other vehicles.

Of the 97 killed by falling from windows, 36 were children, and of the 55 who fell off fire escapes 43 were children.

Rabies killed eight persons, and tetanus or lockjaw killed six. Eighteen persons died immediately following surgical operations.
