WASHINGTON, April 19.

Huerta has retracted his counter  
proposition for a simultaneous sal-  
ute. President Wilson informed him  
that the United States stands on its  
original demand and he must ac-  
cept immediately. The plan for the  
seizure of Tampico, and Vera Cruz  
will be carried out without waiting  
for Admiral Badger to reach Mexican  
waters. The plan includes the seiz-  
ure of the railway from Vera Cruz to  
Mexico City, as far as the trestle  
about 20 miles west of Vera Cruz.  
While Wilson's message was thus  
flashing out instructions to set all  
forces already in Mexican waters in  
readiness to enforce the U.S. terms  
White House officials announce that  
unless Huerta saluted the flag in ac-  
cordance with Wilson's demands, as  
soon after receipt of his message to-  
day, as was possible, action would be  
taken without any further exchanges.

WASHINGTON, April 19.

At 6 p.m. Sunday no word had been  
received here of Huerta's intention  
to yield to Wilson's demand. It was  
then 4:30 p.m. in Mexico City, and he  
still had an hour and a half to reply.  
The battleship Mississippi, equipped  
with an aeroplane, corps and with  
600 marines aboard is ordered to sail  
at once from Pensacola to Tampico  
with the Prairie, Dixie, and a destroy-  
er flotilla.

Schooner Reports Oil.

Members of the crew of Capt. Car-  
roll's schooner which arrived here  
from Placentia yesterday, say that  
while coming to port yesterday  
morning, the surface of the water ap-  
peared to be covered with seal oil,  
from Trepassey Bay to Cape Ballard,  
which was thought from its appear-  
ance to have come from the bottom.  
While many to whom the story was  
told expressed the opinion that the  
Southern Cross sank in this vicinity,  
others seem to think that the oil seen  
was pumped from the Sagona and Po-  
goda on their way to port, and as the  
schooner came practically in the  
wake of these ships. Still the  
mysteries of the sea are unfathom-  
able, and the Southern Cross may  
have weathered Cape Pine and met  
her fate in Trepassey Bay.

Seventy-Five Years  
In The Dark.

The death has just taken place at  
Stockholm of Miss Christina Witlund,  
an eccentric and wealthy woman.  
Seventy-five years ago, Miss Witlund,  
then a handsome young girl of eight-  
teen, was engaged to be married to a  
dashing officer of the Royal Guards,  
and everything was ready for the  
wedding, when the bridegroom sud-  
denly broke off the engagement, and  
eventually married another.

Miss Witlund, it is said, nearly lost  
her reason from the effects of the  
shock, and when she finally recovered  
made a solemn vow never to look up-  
on treacherous man again.  
Her parents being dead, she had  
sole control of her own affairs, and  
she shut herself up in the house,  
where she remained for the whole of  
her life without ever going out. For  
seventy-five years she saw no other  
human beings than her servant girls.  
Living as one dead in the midst of  
the bustle of modern civilization, she  
had never seen trains, steamships,  
tramway cars, taxicabs, airships, or  
aeroplane. Even daylight was
