CANNONADING CONTINUES.

PARIS, Nov. 24.
Yesterday cannonading continued
in the region of Soissons and Rheims.
In the Argonne district attacks were
without result.

The French Cabinet has decided
that France shall be officially repre-
sented at the San Francisco Exhibi-
tion on February 20th next.

The Dutch Chambers are discuss-
ing a proposal to vote a war loan of
275,000,000 florins.

French 3 per cent. Consols are
quoted at 7b.

Semi-Official.—In Belgium recently,
in an attack on Bru Woods, which
was held by Zouaves, a German col-
umn, pushing in front of them some
Zouave prisoners, advanced to the as-
sault crying, "Cease fire." For an
instant our soldiers and quick-firers
hesitated, when from a Zouave in the
German ranks came the following
cry, "Well, in God's name, fire!" A
general discharge from the Zouaves
immediately ensued, mowing down
the Germans, and the brave soldier,
who gave his life to foil the enemy's
ruse.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, Nov. 24.—(Official.)
There is no modification in the
general situation since yesterday. On
the greatest part of the front the
enemy has manifested its activity by
intermittent cannonading, but less
violent than on the previous day.
Nevertheless, here and there, have
been several infantry attacks, all re-
pulsed as usual. These attacks have
been particularly violent in Argonne,
where we have gained ground in the
region of Tour de Paris. There is
nothing to signal between Argonne
and the Vosges. Thick fog hindered
operations. The sanitary condition
of the troops is excellent. German
losses in the battle in Flanders are
estimated up to now as superior to
120,000.

Petrograd.—The battle continues
between the Vistula and Wartha.
Fighting is terrible at north of Lodz.
German attacks have been repulsed
everywhere. On the Czenstochowa-
Cracow front, the situation is un-
changed. The Russian troops have
gained a big and decisive victory on
the Wartha front. The German troops
are in full retreat towards the fron-
tier, vigorously pursued by the Rus-
sians. Whole German regiments
have surrendered.

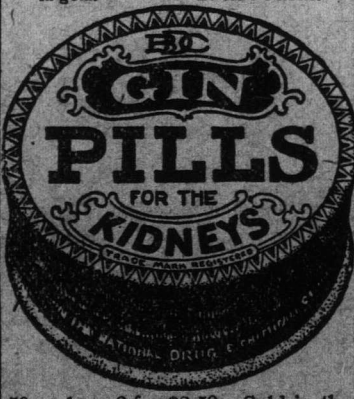
FRENCH TRIBUTE TO BRITISH AIRMEN.

at Argonne, all of which have been
repulsed.
An official note, published by the
French authorities to-day, giving de-
tails of the aeroplane raid made on
the Zeppelin balloon factory at Fried-
richshafen, last Saturday, says:
"Three British airmen left France on
Nov. 21, by direct air route to the
Zeppelin factory at Friedrichshafen.
Despite artillery fire, which was vir-
tually continuous throughout the 250
miles journey over hostile territory,
the three aviators reached their goal.
They bombarded the factory, which
we believe to have suffered consider-
able damage. One aviator seems to
have been wounded. The other two
returned with their machines more or
less damaged by the enemy's fire.
This long flight over one of the most
mountainous regions in Germany, ex-
ecuted through unfavorable atmos-
pheric conditions, is another fine ex-
ploit to the credit of the British air-
men."

GERMANY ADMITS REVERSES.

BERLIN, Nov. 24.—(Official.)
While eventual victory for the Teu-
tonic allies in the east theatre of war
is expected as confidently as ever,
official reports from the German-
Austrian military headquarters make
it appear that the decision will not be
reached as soon as had been expected.
The final result has been delayed by
the advance of new Russian forces
from Warsaw.

Austrians announce that they have
abandoned to superior hostile forces,
several passes in the Carpathians.
Russian troops which are investing
Przemysl have been driven back by a
sortie, and are now within range of
the cannon forts.

Russians who crossed the lower
Dunajec are not able to proceed fur-
ther.

The tremendous extent of the bat-
tles now raging in the east is appar-
ent from the fact that contests are
now progressing along a front ex-
tending over 400 miles, between pos-
itions at the extreme north and south.

No important reports have been
received recently from Serbia, from
the scene of the Turkish operations,
or from the west theatrical war.

There was a light snow fall in Ber-
lin this morning, and the tempera-
ture fell below zero.

HIDES OF FULL GROWN CATTLE RESERVED.

LONDON, Nov. 25.
Field Marshal Earl Kitchener to-
day issued a decree reserving all
hides of full grown cattle for military
purposes. A special company is
having the leather business of the
country organized. All tanneries
will be operated in connection with

this company, receiving their quota
of hides, which they are to tan for
the army.

PORTUGAL DECLARES FOR THE ALLIES.

LONDON, Nov. 24.
A despatch from Lisbon says the
Portuguese Congress to-day decided
that Portugal should co-operate with
the Allies when it considered the
step necessary. The Minister of War
will issue a decree for partial mo-
bilization.

BRITISH SHIPS BOMBARD ZEEBRUGGE.

LONDON, Nov. 24.
The Admiralty announces yesterday
that all points of military significance
in Zeebrugge, were subjected to se-
vere bombardment by two British
battleships. The German opposition
was feeble. The extent of damage is
unknown.

TURKS IN RETREAT.

PETROGRAD (Official.)
In the region of Tchouk River
(Russian Armenia) the battle has in-
creased in intensity. Yesterday, in
the direction of Erzerum we threw
back the Turks on the whole front,
and forced them hurriedly to retreat.
Our troops are still pushing them en-
ergetically. There is no change in
the situation in other regions.

SUCCESSFUL LOAN.

LONDON, Nov. 24.
The list of subscriptions to the
greatest war loan in history, £350-
000,000 sterling closes this afternoon.
The loan, it is freely stated, will be a
great success, although no official
figures are as yet available.

LABRADOR HUNTERS DROWNED.

QUEBEC, Nov. 24.
A brief message coming here from
Harrington Harbor, Labrador, states
that two hunters named Knox and
Enos, were drowned while hunting
sea birds some days ago.

Truce Over Winter

PROPOSED BY KAISER.

Paris, Nov. 17.—Folled in her efforts
to negotiate peace separately with
the Allies, Germany is casting around
for means to obtain an armistice over
the winter. The fact that the armistice
would prove of advantage to no one
but herself does not seem to discour-
age Germany from mooted the idea.
Envoies have already set out to
pave the way for a formal proposition
to this end when the moment appears
propitious, and high German opinion
is quite sanguine as to the results.

The armistice would be welcomed in
Berlin, primarily on account of the
rest it would give the German army.
All the armies badly require a spell
in which to recuperate, but an ar-
mistice would be chiefly employed by
the Wilhelmstrasse in redoubling the
efforts to sow dissension among the
Allies. The German statement are
possessed of the idea that sooner or
later they will stir up trouble in this
connection, and they eagerly clutch
at everything that will afford them a
fresh opportunity to try their skill in
this way.
