#### STILL WAITING.

The German-American situation begins to be almost amusing. Relations are severed between the two countries but there is no war; yet Germany has won at least this advantage, that no American ship seems to have the courage to leave its port and traverse the war zone. There can be no drawing back by either side, but neither wishes to go on. America will not declare war until she has cause; cause can hardly come unless one of her ships presents to a submarine the opportunity to give it; but a declaration of war thereupon could not restore a possibly sunk ship or a possibly murdered crew. So American ships lie safely in port and Germany rests content with the position. So long as they do not bring food to Britain, they are better so than at the bottom of the sea and America numbered in consequence among her enemies.

We cannot believe that the United States will long tolerate such a state of affairs, or even does so now; probably preparations are being made for the departure of American ships on their old schedule but in such manner that they will be protected. If then they are attacked the inevitable result will follow; if not, Germany's bluff will have been successfully called.

the best brief of a bad case. That they are unsound even for their poor purpose, and based upon a great misconception of America's present capacity to do Germany harm and an underestimation of the seriousness of the loss of her friendship, is no proof that they were not mad. Possibly Germany did not anticipate quite so abrupt and final an action from America, and is reconsidering. It is significant that in spite of the loud-trumpeted warning, the Housatonic was given a full hour's grace and her passengers carefully towed away; and even now Germany invites America to talk the whole situation over. If these are signs of relenting, we may be assured that America's displeasure is not the main cause, but rather a dawning realization even now that the boasted blockade is doomed to failure. It is in any case probable that Germany will endeavour to preserve such peace as she enjoys with America as long as possible while she studies the effect of her campaign of murder. It is a pity that the idea is so prevalent in the States that the decision of peace and war rests entirely with Berlin. It is not necessarily so, and Germany, a past master in the art of temporising, will take full advantage of her position to keep the Americans on tenterhooks as long as it pleases her.

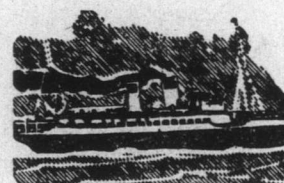
