In Memoriam.

JAMES W. PITTMAN.

On Monday, Oct. 18th, there was laid to rest at the cemetery of St. Augustine's Church, New Perican, the remains of the late James W. Pittman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Pittman.

Mr. Pittman, or Jim as he was generally spoken of by his friends, was formerly Principal of the High School at Rose Blanche, afterwards taking charge of Harvey & Co.'s branch business there.

When the war broke out, he, like many another brave lad, resigned his position and offered himself and services for his country's disposal, and in due time crossed to the western front, where he held the rank of sergeant. After receiving injuries there which totally incapacitated him for further active service, at the front, he returned home and spent some time recruiting, being also for a while employed at the Militia Department.

For the past two years he had held the position of Superintendent of Shannon Munn Memorial Orphanage, where he was beloved by the boys, and all connected therewith for his pleasing manner and sterling character, as well as his business ability. He took a great interest in the boys there and was lieutenant of the Orphanage Corps.

Being a constant sufferer from injuries received at the front, he was advised, after receiving treatment at St. John's Hospital, to seek further advice at Halifax. He entered Camp Hill Hospital and spent two months there, where it was found impossible to effect a cure, and he was at this institution when the summons came, which he obeyed as only the soldier and christian can.

The body was brought to his home for interment, accompanied by his brother John. The funeral was very largely attended, being of a military nature, the C.L.B. from Heart's Content being present under Major (Dr.) Anderson.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Canon Smart, after which "The Last Post" was sounded by Bugler Willis White. He sleeps but will awaken at the Last Great Call when all Christians shall receive the Master's "well done!"

Shipping Notes.

It is expected that repairs to S.S. Anglesa, which arrived in port yesterday with her bilge pumps out of order, will take four or five days. The ship is commanded by Capt. G. Davis, owned by Messrs. Jas. Jenkins Sons & Co., Ltd., Cardiff, and is 4,460 tons gross, 2,818 nett and has a cargo of 6,800 tons of grain, which is consigned to Rotterdam.

S.S. Tulsa, Capt. F. N. J. Nordberg, which arrived in port yesterday morning for repairs to her boilers, will be delayed some three weeks, as new boiler tubes have to be ordered from New York. The Tulsa is a new ship, being launched early in 1919, and is owned by the U.S. Shipping Board. She has a gross tonnage of 5,562 tons and 3,434 tons nett, and was built at the Hog Island Pennsylvania ship-building yards. These yards, which were erected during the war by the American government, have been making records in the mercantile ship-building world, and although the Tulsa is a large boat, she was built in the remarkable quick period of 62 in the remarkable quick period of 62 for launching ships, seven steamers aggregating 54,775 tons being launched on the evening of July 21st last in the record time of one hour and twenty-seven minutes. Whilst in port Messrs. Furness Withy & Co. are the Tulsa's agents.

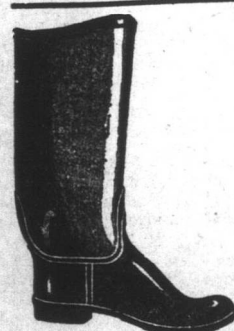
