The main cause for objection to this Article by the United States was the interpretation placed upon it by opponents, that it would drag that country into "indefinite and dangerous foreign entanglements, and would in effect obligate the Government to use the armed forces of the United States to preserve the territorial and political independence of all states which were members of the League." President Wilson took the opposite stand to this and held that Article X. was "the specific redemption pledge which the free Governments of the world gave to their peoples, when they entered the war." That this was not the view of the Canadian delegates has been demonstrated by the Doherty amendment to the Covenant. Neither was Wilson's exposition accepted by the people of the United States. But the fact of the Canadian administration's hostility was never disclosed to either the Parliament or people of that dominion, even when the Treaty itself was being discussed in the Commons, and this deliberate omission has been strongly condemned by sections of the Canadian press, which, however, agrees in the long run that the objections

tives may be well founded, and that no fault will be found with their position in this respect. It is pertinently asked, however, why it was found necessary to hide the Cabinet's objections from the Canadian people, and why all the secrecy and air of mystery? Secret diplomacy is charged in this connection—but there naturally was a reason. What that reason is will develop itself in time, but it is manifest that Article X. was a stumbling block, an obstacle in the way, and its elimination from the text of the Covenant will likely occur at the next meeting of the

West Coast Business in Liquidation.

R. Moulton, Ltd., Burgeo, Will Wound up.

The Supreme Court this morning crdered the winding up of the firm of Moulton, Ltd., of Burgeo. It is said that the assets of the company exceed the liabilities by about \$80,000

The empany has a paid up capital

of \$78,800. The capital stock of the business is \$200,000 divided into 20,-000 shares. In the course of the proceeding in Court Mr. Howley, Solicitor for one of the creditors of the company, asked for a viva voce examinaion of any who were in a position to know the affairs of the company, and as Mr. John T. Moulton, Manager at Burgeo, was in court he was called to the stand and the following facts were elicited: The company was threatened by several local creditors. That the company was not in a position to pay 100 cents to the dollar and that there were large outstanding liabilities which the company does not admit. The company owes the Bank of Nova Scotia \$335,000 hypothecated by two cargoes of fish now on the other side. The Bank holds a guarantee from Messrs. Winter and Campbell for the amount. The Managing Director of the Company is Mr. Edgar Templeman which position he has held for 8 years. The Company's books for 1919 are in the hands of Reid Son and Watson and there has been no audited account since 1918.

The manager did not know if there was any subscribed capital not paid up. The security given the bank by Winter and Campbell was secured by mortgage of \$100,000 on the whole ssets of the company. The largest

£130,000 is claimed by Lind & Couto, which would be reduced by insurances collectable. The bank refused to pay the company's checks in August. The company has \$17,000 worth of shares in foreign going vessels. Mr. Moulton in reply to the question, "Is the company able to carry on its business?" answered, "No, not under the present circumstances." Asked what were the present circumstances, he replied, "The slow realization on codfish." The company has \$200,000 worth of fish at present in Newfoundland on which the banks have no claim. The company had fish from Jude Nash MacCallum valued at \$13,000, which is not paid for. LeSeelleur's fish valued at \$9,690 is not hypothecated the proceeds of this sale being paid


