His Excellency the Governor has received a cablegram from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating that His Majesty the King has expressed the wish that on Armistice Day, November 11, there shall be a complete suspension of all normal business throughout the British Empire during the two minutes' silence, commencing at 11 a.m.

His Excellency and Ministers, feeling sure that the people of this ancient and loyal Colony desire to perpetuate the memory of our great deliverance and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it, direct that such observance shall take place throughout this Colony, and that at 11 a.m. on Friday next, the 11th instant, all normal activities shall be suspended for the space of two minutes, during which time all thoughts will be concentrated in reverent remembrance of the Glorious Dead.

In St. John's the Gun at Cabot Tower will be fired at the hour above named.

For the two minutes as above trains will be stopped on the railways, traffic on the streets, ships at sea (as far as possible) and work suspended everywhere, in schools, shops, mines, factories, etc. During the two minutes there should be complete silence.

His Excellency the Governor and Ministers believe that all will gladly interrupt their business and pleasure, whatever it may be, and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

SAMUEL GORDON

He leaves to mourn a widow, three daughters, Mrs. Owen Chipman of Seattle, Mrs. George Pike and Miss Madge of this town; one son, John W. of Halifax (a prominent business man there); one brother, John, of this town, but at the present time on Labrador; also a large circle of friends. During the summer Mrs. Chipman (after an absence of 13 years) and Mr. John W. Gordon visited their parents at the old home, and this must be a source of comfort to the bereaved to know that all were spared to meet together once more under the parental roof ere the family circle here on earth was broken. The funeral took place on Monday, 31st, and was attended by a large concourse of people, including representatives of the C. B. British Society and St. Paul's Bible Class, deceased being a worthy member of both. He was laid to rest in the Church of England Cemetery, Rev. W. R. J. Higgit performing the last rites; there to sleep until "the day dawn and the shadows flee away." To the family and friends of the deceased we extend our condolence in this sad hour of their bereavement.—COR.

### Education.

### Western Notes.

Reports from Channel and Port aux Basques advise that these places fortunately escaped the brunt of the recent storm, no damage whatever having been done either by wind or sea.

Schr. Magna, Capt. Alex. Chaisson, from Sydney to Port aux Basques with cargo flour for Emanuel Pike, Ltd., was caught in the hurricane, when within nine miles of Channel Head, and was obliged to heave to and let the vessel drift. For sixty-three hours the staunch little craft under a double reefed foresail only bore the full blast of the wind, drifting one hundred miles to sea. She eventually made port—all well—on Tuesday evening, November 1st.

The fishery is not yet showing any great sign of improvement. Bad weather militates against boats getting on the ground and to make matters worse there is a scarcity of herring bait. Once weather gets settled, prospects may look better for the fall catch to pick up.

## Want Bone-Dry Prohibition.

Prohibition, that is absolute and bone-dry, such is to be the demand voiced last night by Wesley Literary Class and unanimously passed in a standing vote. J. R. Smallwood introduced and James Gushue seconded the resolution. Several spoke to the resolution, which was as follows:

"That this Literary Class make known its insistent and emphatic desire that the people of this country be given what they thought they were getting in 1915 when they voted for prohibition, namely, absolute, bone-dry, prohibition, with provision for legitimate medical needs."

The resolution was introduced following the evening's debate reported in another column and met instant support from the meeting.

## Is the Audience Always Hypnotised?

The Indian "rope trick" is one of the most discussed illusions in the world.

In "Here, There, and Everywhere" (Hodder and Stoughton), Lord Frederic Hamilton offers an explanation. The story was told him by Colonel Barnard, at one time Chief of Police in Calcutta. Invited to see the trick performed, the colonel took with him one of his English subordinates and a Kodak camera loaded with a new roll of film.

Here are their experiences:—

"They arrived at the poor house in the native quarter, where they were ushered into a small courtyard thick with the dense smoke arising from two braziers burning mysterious compounds. The juggler, naked except for his loincloth, produced a long coil of rope, which began paying away, as sailors would say, out of the juggler's hand of its own accord, and went straight up into the air."

An Aerial Wonder.

"Colonel Barnard Kodaked it. It went up and up, till their eyes could no longer follow it. Colonel Barnard Kodaked it again."

"Then a small boy commenced climbing up this rope. He was Kodaked. The boy went up and up, till he disappeared from view. The smoke from the braziers smouldering in the courtyard seemed almost to blot out the courtyard from view."

"The juggler, professing himself angry with the boy for his dilatoriness, started in pursuit of him up this rope. He was Kodaked too."

"Finally, the man descended the rope and wiped a blood-stained knife, explaining that he had killed the boy for disobeying his orders. He then pulled the rope down and coiled it up, and suddenly the boy reappeared and, together with his master, began salaaming profoundly. The trick was over."

"When Colonel Barnard went into his dark room and developed his negatives, with an astounding result."

"Neither the juggler, nor the boy, nor the rope had moved at all. The photographs of the ascending rope, of the boy climbing it, and of the man following him, were simply blank, showing the details of the courtyard and nothing else."
