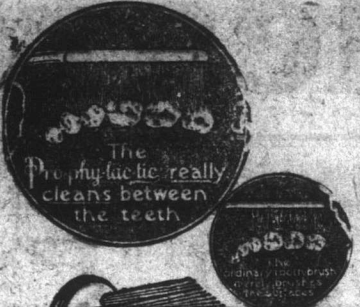
The earl smiled sadly as he watched his daughter.
