MORNING PRICES WEAK; AMERICAN MARKETS WERE STRONGER LATER
Rains Not Heavy Enough to Do Any Appreciable Good
Low Point of Preceding Day Reached After Rises and Falls

Winnipeg, June 3.—Officially the wheat market was closed today in honor of the king's birthday, but on the curb a light volume of business was transacted at slightly stronger figures. American markets on the other hand opened 1 3/8 to 3/8c lower and further declined 3/8 to 5/8c, rallying later to around opening points. The weakness of the morning was attributed to rains in Kansas, and lower Liverpool cables. Later the market broke on realization that rains were too light to do any good.

reports of wheat damage from hot winds and premature ripening. At first, however, the rains formed a bullish influence too great to be withstood, the market lurching heavily downward. Then came opinions that the injury by the extreme heat of the last days of May had not been overcome by the rains from millers gave fresh courage to the bulls. In addition, the world's available supply total showed a decrease of 2,745,000 bushels, in spite of a liberal gain in European stocks and in the amount afloat. Total clearances of wheat and flour today equaled 855,000 bushels. Primary receipts of wheat were 427,000 bushels against 238,000 bushels a year ago.
