

NEW SWEDE CABINET TO BE COMPOSED ONLY OF LIBERALS

M. Widen Will Not Have the
Socialist Leader in His
Government

London, Oct. 12.—M. Widen, who has been asked by King Gustave of Sweden to form a cabinet, will attempt to construct a ministry solely of Liberals, says the Stockholm correspondent of the Daily Mail. Hjalmer Branting and his assistants in the socialist party will be excluded by M. Widen, who is moderate liberal. It is the correspondent's opinion that M. Branting will not be sorry to be excluded, as popular discontent is likely to increase during the winter.

As to the effect of the American blockade, the correspondent says the manner in which the policy of the United States is to be answered is indicated by the government's announcement that Germany will supply to Sweden grain, potatoes and seed which the allies have refused. This announcement, if realized, will naturally stimulate the pro-German trend of public opinion developed by the Washington news of the last few days, the dispatch from Stockholm that the Swedish delegates to the United States had suppressed the facts in relation to Germany's exportation of them are to Germany.

CREDIT GRANTS TO VETERANS FOR ARTIFICIAL LIMBS

Government Will Add to
Pensions Received Special
Fund for Soldiers

Chicago, Oct. 12.—The important announcement made by Secretary E. H. Clegg, of the military hospitals commission, that soldiers who incur disabilities requiring special appliances such as artificial limbs, crutches, rubber bands and belts, will be given a bill of credits in addition to their pensions. This week, which was the year's anniversary of the armistice, is the result of an arrangement between the hospitals board and the board of pensions commission.

"We have no example," said Mr. Clegg, "but a man may purchase such appliances as it has been found he needs at any shop handling such goods, and forward the bill to the commission. The needs having been ascertained, and the cost of such articles estimated, this sum will be deducted from the amount granted for the year, and if at the end of the term there is a balance it will be given to him."

ASK GOVERNMENT TO HELP
Washington, Oct. 12.—Reports that the railroads are considering informally asking the government to help them in some way to obtain money with which to maintain and enlarge their present plants and equipment to enable them to cope with the high tide of traffic, are regarded by officials here as forecasting a concerted move soon toward that end.

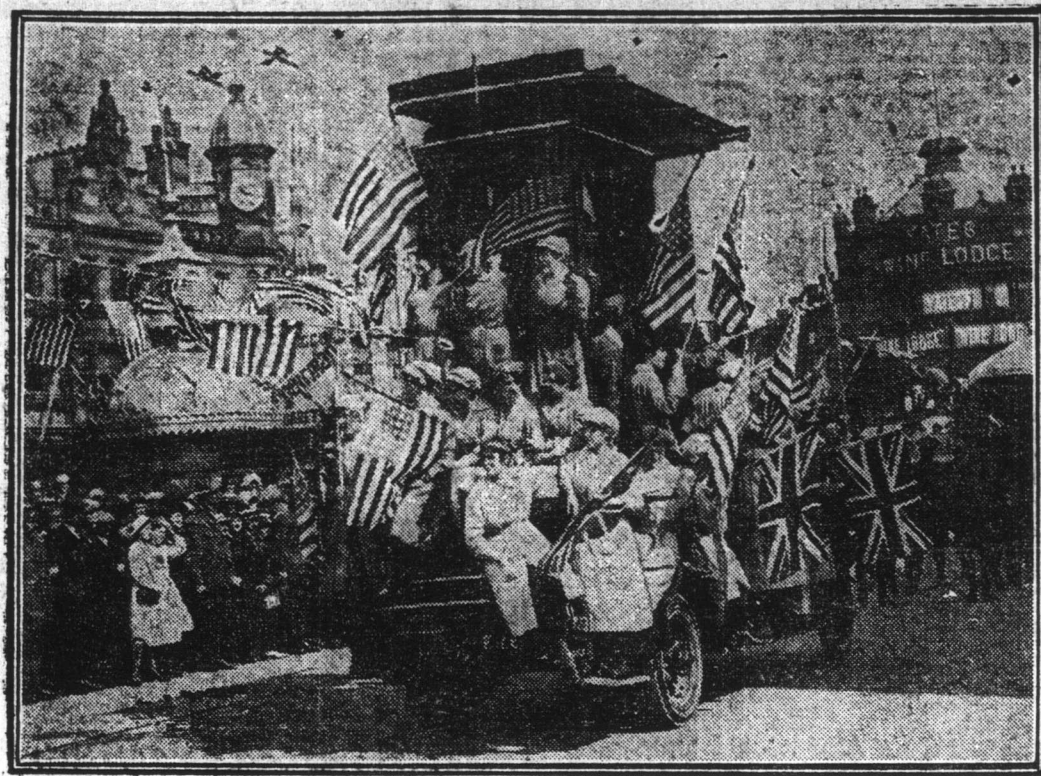

CONCENTRATE UPON VICTORY, ADVICE OF BRITISH PREMIER

Everything Else Must Give
Way at the Present Time,
Says Lloyd George

London, Oct. 12.—Premier Lloyd George, addressing a delegation of insurance committees, who called today to urge a re-adjustment of health insurance and the establishment of a ministry of health, declared that all the nation's thoughts and energies were taken up by the terrible demand made in defense of liberty and freedom. He wished he could see the end, but the task which the nation had taken in hand must be accomplished. He could not think of any statement more calculated to prolong the war than the assertion of the German foreign secretary that Germany would never contemplate the making of concessions to France respecting Alsace-Lorraine.

However long the war lasted, said the premier, Great Britain intended to stand by her ally, France, until she redeemed her oppressed children from the degradation of a foreign yoke. This meant that the country must husband its resources and when demands were put forward for improvement here and there, his answer was: "Concentrate upon victory."

N.S. CHIEF JUSTICE IS DEAD

AUSTRIAN SHIP QUIT WITHOUT FIRING A SHOT

Marked Contrast Between
This Craft and That of
Italian Ship

Washington, Oct. 12.—According to dispatches, the Italian navy department has announced the capture of an Austrian torpedo boat destroyer in the Adriatic. The Austrian ship surrendered without firing a shot. The Italian newspaper, *Il Sole*, says this episode recalls the conduct of the crew of Italian *Turbin*, which, having been surrounded by enemy destroyers, fought to the last shot, and then was sunk by its own men rather than surrender.

The newspaper contrasted the two incidents, and declared they illustrated the difference in the morale of the Austrian and the Italian navies.

Advice from Madrid states that a Spanish mission has just returned from a visit to the Italian front and that its members expressed their wonder over the Italian military achievement, which they declared surpassed the imagination. They also emphasized the importance of Italy's participation in the war.

TROUBLE BEGAN IN NAVY MONTHS AGO

The Men in German Navy
Had Reached Nervous
Collapse

Amsterdam, Oct. 12.—According to some reports here, the discontent in the German navy began eight months ago and the men of the fleet had reached such a nervous state, owing to the prolonged high tension, that only a spark was needed to cause an explosion. On board the warships involved, it is said large numbers of pamphlets were found dealing with the cause of the war and asking why Germany became the best hated nation in the world. Other indications of the influence of Junkerdom and the big manufacturing interests and purported to give the truth about "the men behind the war."

Fairly reliable accounts put the number of men condemned to penal servitude at 30, whose sentences range from five to 15 years, while thirty to one hundred were given lighter sentences.

The Vorwarts, the German Socialist organ, in its report of the debate in the Reichstag of the mutiny, quoted Herr Haas, the Socialist leader, as saying the condemned sailors were accused of distributing pamphlets given them by Dittmann, which were full of perjuries, which should be passed by the censor.

BAD FIRE AT FORT DE FRANCE

Fort de France, Martinique, Oct. 12.—Three provision depots and a quantity of construction material in the vicinity of the customs house here were destroyed last night by fire. It is estimated that the monetary loss will be heavy.

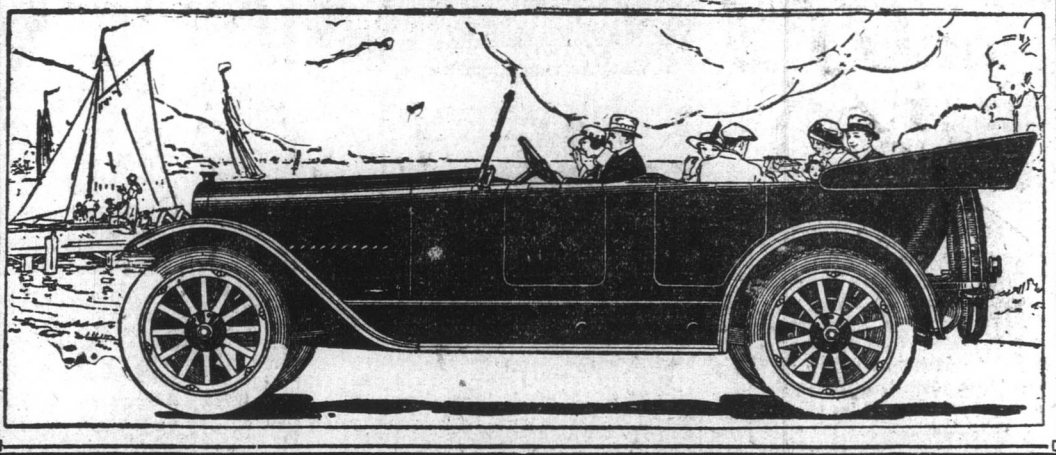
