THE CZAR'S RAILROAD.

Count John Thun of Austria Gives Some faluable Information About the Great Line.

Vancouver, Nov. 19. — Count John Thun, Austria, came in on the Empress of China from Yokohama. Last May he left his home at Cohiltz, Bohemia, and went by way of Vienna and Berlin to St. Petersburg: thence he went to Moscow, and after necessary preparations started upon the hazardous journey over the Czar's Trans-Siberian Railroad. From Moscow he proceeded by easy ow, and after necessary preparations started upon the hazardous journey over the Czar's Trans-Siberian Railroad. From Moscow he proceeded by easy stages to Irkutak without mishap. For some two hundred versts beyond Irkutak the journey was full of great peril and it required nine days and nights of hard traveling, sometimes mounted, but the great part afoot, to encompass the distance. Work upon this part of the road had been well advanced a year or so ago, but an era of unprecedented storms set in and embankments and bridges to the value of about 43,000,000 roulies were washed away. The work of restoring them during the past summer was cemplately interfered with by swarms of insects and other pests which made it impossible to work. Reaching the eastern division of road finally, he came on to Vladivostock and thence to Japan. Count Thun says it is intensely cold all along the line of road, and for the most part a barren and utterly desolate country. POSTAL NOTE SYSTEM.

The Government's New Move Is In-

creasingly Popular.

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—During the month of August, the first month that the postal note system was tried, 2,773 notes were sent. In September 11,999 were used, and last month 15,146. During the three months there were issued 8,675 25-cent notes, 146 40-cent notes, 6,095 50-cent notes, 13,246 75-cents, 7,865 one dollar, 165 one dollar and fifty cents, and 5,710 five dollar notes. Six denominations remain to be issued.

Anyone wishing to send a sum not covered by a note may paste upon its face stamps sufficient to make that sum. For

covered by a note may paste upon its face stamps sufficient to make that sum. For example: If one wishes to send 47 cents, he will buy a 40-cent note and affix seven cents worth of uncancelled postage stamps to its face, and the 47 cents will be paid upon presentation.

A GREAT FRUIT CROP.

The Final Crop Bulletin Issued by the Agriculture Department-Tobacce Is Also Good.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—The following is a condensation of the final crop report for 1898 of the Ontario Department of Agri-

Fall Wheat—The favorable accounts given in the returns given in August have been verified by the reports just to hand. Poor yields were exceptional, and large yields were common. The plumpness of the grain is frequently alluded to, in many cases the weight going over the standard, and as high sometimes as 63 or 64 pounds to the bushel. Here and there only did correspondents complain of rust, midge, or other injury to the crop. The yield is 24 bushels per acre, giving the large total yield of 25,158,713 bushels.

The New Fall Wheat—An enlarged area is reported for the growing crop of fall wheat by most of our correspondents, the increase being placed at from ten per cent, up, a few claiming to have actually doubled their acreage.

Spring Wheat—The acreage of spring wheat is only a little over one-third of that of fall wheat. The crop has been over an average in yield, and the quality is also good. A large amount of goose wheat has been grown. The yield is a little larger than our August estimate, being 17.7 bushels per acre.

Barley—Only the low prices prevailing prevented barley from being one of the most satisfactory crops of the season. The yield per acre generally has been large, and a better sample of grain as to weight and color has selden; been raised. The yield is 28.9 bushels per acre, somewhat larger than was estimated before the crop was harvested.

Oats—This crop appears to be a fair one, in many cases going over the yield per measured bushel. The crop has turned out two bushels per acre better than was estimated before harvest, bringing the yield up to the extraordinary total of 80,858,293 bushels.

Kye—What little rye was grown for grain turned out well. In fact the too rank growth of the crop appears to have been the chief cause for complaint.

Peas—This appears to have been the most unfortunate of the grain crops. The crop continued to drop in yield, so that the final statement gives 18,521,268 bushels, somewhat under the previous year, and 15.6 bushels per acre, as compared with 19.6 bashels per acre, the average yield for the period.

Corn—In the more western counties of the Lake Erio group the crop was an excellent one, but from the remainder of the province variable reports come. The crop, however, turned out better than was expected earlier in the season.

Tobacco—This crop has turned out well. The season for esting out plants was rather dry, but the general growth was good, and a large quantity of leaf was obtained. A little late planted was caught by frost, but the bulk of the crop is grown. Frost

Buckwheat—The crop was a comparatively poor one.

Potatoes—The potato crop is light throughout the province, but the quality of the crop secured is almost uniformly good, and but few cases of rot are reported.

Turnips—There has been a fair average yield of turnips. The crop has been secured, except in a few places.

Mangel Wurzels—This has probably been the most successful of any of the root crops. Very little of the crop remains to be taken up.

Carrots—Where grown, carrots have as a rule done well, aspecially in the west. The yield has been got under cover in good condition.

Fruit and Fruit Trees—Fruit trees and increased.

Fruit and Fruit Trees—Fruit trees and vines are in a generally healthy and thiving condition, the principal causes of injury noted being storms, blight, and in the case of plums and cherries blacknot. The San Jose scale was also mentioned as doing some damage in Kent. There were many causes which adversely affected the fruit crop. The dreuth and frost inflicted considerable injury during the earlier stages of its development, and much loss has also been caused by insect pests. The apple crop in particular suffered much from worms, much of the fruit being affected in unsprayed orchards. The tent catorpilar also did injury. Several correspondents note the fact that where spraying was properly attended to these pests were kept in check, tended to these pests were kept in check, and good crops of fruit secured. Notwithand good crops of fruit secured. Notwith-standing all disadvantages the returns from all over the province, with the ex-ception of a few northerly counties, show that the supply of fruit, more especially of apples, was considerably more than sufficient for home consumption, very large shipments having been made to England and the United States from the western fruit-growing section. Pears, peaches, plums and the smaller fruits were also shipped from many localities. There was great variation as to quality, much of the yield being spoken of as in-

HE DIED IN HIS SIST YEAR.

Sir George Baden-Powell With the Great Majority.

> Eminent Political Economist and Au therity on Colonial Affairs-Represented Kirkdale Division of Livernool in Conservative Interest Since 1885-Visited Canada in 1886 in Connection With the Fishery Dispute.

London, Nov. 20.—Sir George Smyth Baden-Powell, the eminent politician, economist and authority on colonial affairs, who has represented the Kirkdale Division of Liverpool in Parliament in the Conservative interests since 1885, died to-day in his 51st year.

en political economy, "Protection and Bad Times," and "State Aid and State Interterence."

In 1880 he went to the West Indies to investigate the effect of the sugar bounty system on West India sugar plant, and two years later Mr. Gladstone appointed him a special commissioner to report upon the administration, revenues and expenditures of Great Britain's coionies in the West Indies. His report, contained in five books, was regarded, when it was published in 1884, as a complete summary of West Indian affairs.

In 1885 he went to South Africa and joined Sir Charles Warren in Bechuandand, assisting him in diplomatic negoriations with the native chiefs, at this time he made a tour of investigation in Basutoland, Zululand and other places in that part of Africa.

In the winter of 1886-87 he was in Canada and the United States drawing up a statement of details in the fishery dispute, of which Mr. Joseph Chamberlain was subsequently commissioned to negotiate a final arrangement.

In the autumn of 1887 the British Government sent him to Maita as the colleague of Sir George Bowen, who arranged the details of the new Maita constitution. It was at this time that he received the honor of knighthood.

In 1891 he was appointed joint commis-

It was at this time that he received the honor of knighthood.

In 1831 he was appointed joint commissioner on the condition of seal life in Behring Sea, and in the following year participated in the deliberations of the joint commission at Washington.

He was a most industrious and prolific writer, a keen sportsman, and, socially, a great favorite in the House of Commons.
