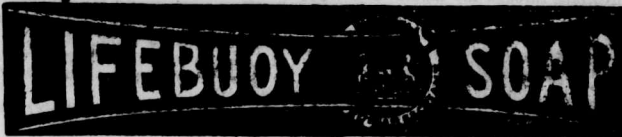
Owing to the death of President McKinley, the yacht race for the American cup will be postponed, though probably for not more than a week. Sir Thomas Lipton having declared that he could not agree to postpone it for a month as at first announced.

The struggle for life which took place in Buffalo all last week, ended at a quarter past two on Saturday morning, and the hopes of an anxious world, especially that large portion of it, the Anglo Saxon race, were dashed in pieces, when the news came that President McKinley had breathed his last. The hope, anxiety and sorrow of the Canadian people, was very little if any, less than it was in the U. S. All day Friday, the bulletin board in front of the Express office, was watched sorrowfully, and as the certainty of a fatal ending became apparent, sympathy for President McKinley and his noble, devoted wife, and anger and indignation for the cowardly assassin, found vent in words which suited the feelings of each speaker. In some respect, the feeling was more marked, than it was at the death of our late beloved Queen Victoria, owing no doubt to the entirely different circumstances. The one was the quiet, peaceful ending of a long, grand, glorious, and good life of a Queen who had lived beyond the allotted span of life. The other was a grand, good, noble, useful man, strong in body, and mind, dying long before his time, from the effects of a bullet fired by a low wretch, whose whole carcass was not worth one hair of his victim's head. Upon receipt of the news of the President's death, the flags on the town hall, public school, and other places, were placed at half mast. This was also the case all over Canada, and we assure our friends across the line, that our sorrow and sympathy is deep and genuine.

To call attention once more to the sugar beet industry, we would direct the attention of the Malahide township council to the fact that four farmers are now chosen from the district of Galt, Ont., and are being sent to Bay City, Mich., where there are now ready for operation no less than four beet sugar factories, consuming the beets being grown on no less than twenty-five thousand acres, where four years ago operations were begun by one factory using only about two thousand acres of beets, showing a growth in the industry of one thousand and per cent. And yet these four farmers are being sent by their neighbors to interview the farmers around Bay City and inspect the fields and farms and find out from this visit just what there is in the sugar beet business. Why cannot this be done by either the township council or Farmers Institute and thus settle among the farmers themselves whether or not they desire to add this crop to the ones now grown by the farmers in this township, or are the farmers around here satisfied with present conditions, needing nothing further. We published early this summer several letters from a farmer in the township of Sombra, county of Lambton, Ont., giving his experience and opinion after two years' trial, and an invitation to the farmers from this section to visit that township this fall where there are over one thousand acres of sugar beets now growing, and where the farmers have united to build a beet sugar factory themselves, perhaps next year. They now send their beets just across the river to Marine, City, Mich. Mr. Snider promises to meet such a deputation and take them to the farms where beets are now and have been growing for two years, and also across to Michigan and see what those farmers think about the business. Would this not be a wise and sensible thing for our farmers to do, and that at once, be
