## COLORED GIRL FALSELY ACCUSED

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec.-(By The Associated Negro Press)-When Geo. Reinhart, white, sees another colored girl on the street he won't be so anxious to offer her a ride in his car. because Lizzie Wills, Kater St. near Seventeenth gave him a warning that caused him much embarrassment when he accused the girl of stealing \$80 from him, only to find it on the floor of his car.

With the idea that money would turn the heads of girls, Reinhart was cruising along Columbia Avenue near Fifteenth Street Wednesday night when along came Lizzie. He offered her a ride for reasons of his own and she accepted the offer. What happened in the car could not be learned. However, the girl alighted from the car after riding a block and a half. She then boarded a car for down town.

Reinhart missed his pocketbook and he immediately followed the trolley in which the girl was riding. After twenty squares the girl alighted from the trolley and Reinhart told a traffic cop, who arrested the girl on Reinhart's statement.

The girl denied having the money, but the white man said she did as he had evidently been very close to her in his car. However, the girl said the pocketbook was on the floor of the car. Reinhart and the cop investigated and found it. Lizzie was released.
