THE WHEEL.

They had traveled a large part of the way from the coast, more than 300 miles, on the machines, and they say they worked finely along the well-trodden native paths.

THE RELIC OF ST. ANNA.

Thousands Crowd Into the Church of St. Jean Baptiste.

Three Miracles Reported by Mgr. O'Reilly to Have Occurred in New York.

New York, May 10.—Mgr. Marquis has consented to stay in New York two days longer than he announced, and to let the relic of St. Anna be exposed in the little church of St. Jean Baptiste, in East Seventy-sixth street, until Wednesday noon. Sunday saw scenes in and around the little Church of St. Jean Baptiste that were unprecedented in this country. Those who went to East Seventy-sixth street out of curiosity were amazed at the great throngs, at the strange and fervent expressions upon the faces of those waiting outside, and at the amazing display of faith and veneration within where the relic was to be seen.

When mass began the church was packed until motion in it was impossible, while several thousands were in the streets, restrained from pushing into the church by a dozen policemen guarding the doors and ranged along the sidewalk. Mgr. Boers and O'Reilly preached upon miracles and relics and gave a history of the relic now in evidence. His sermon was in French, which he speaks fluently and without accent.

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Pickets were issued and sold at \$1 apiece by Father Tetreau for the evening service. Even this price did not diminish the number of those who were eager to enter. Mgr. Boers said: "Sympathy Standard of the relic. He said that immediately after the crucifixion there was a violent persecution of all who had followed Jesus, and especially of those who were related to him. Even the dead were not safe. And as the body of St. Anna, the mother of the Virgin, was the most precious body of all, it was taken away for safety. It was carefully guarded and brought to Constantinople, and from there to Apta, where it is now buried in the great cathedral there. The Pope ordered an arm to be taken from this body, and that to be taken to Rome. From this arm came the relic. The proof that this is part of the body of St. Anna," said Mgr. O'Reilly, "is the fact that miracles are performed through it. Since it has been here, no less than three miracles have been performed. A deaf man has been restored to hearing, a young girl has been cured of the palsy, and the third miracle I will not mention, because the person who experienced it is here."

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
