THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK

As Seen by Bradstreet's Special Correspondents.

New York, March 21.—Special telegrams to Bradstreet's do not point to a more active distribution of staples throughout the country than provailed in the preceding week or in a corresponding period a year ago. The volume of general business at most points is generally favorable, moderately active or fairly satisfactory. Some clothing manufacturers find their spring trade not up to earlier expectations. Lumber is in better demand in the East. Snow in the Northwest will fill the streams and help the logging industry. Iron is in slightly better demand. Anthracite coal is no firmer, efforts at restricted production being a failure. Frices will probably be lower next month. Hog products are firmer and higher in price. Hog and cattle receipts at Western markets have not equaled the demand, and prices are up 10 cents to 15 cents. Sugar inclines lower.

Money markets very generally remain easy and rates unchanged. In regions where the crops are short discounts are extended with special caution. Mercantile collections generally are not fully satisfactory. Foreign exchange tends upwards, pointing to gold exports, which are not unusual at this season. Share speculation at New York is depressed and dull on \$2,375,000 gold shipments this week and the absence of interest or support.

Drygoods are in fair demand, but do not move freely. Prices of cottons are firm, but print cloths are again selling below \$3 cents. Brown and bleached cottons move slowly. Cheap worsteds sell well. Wool has been quiet, with prices unchanged. The outlook for foreign wool is for lower prices, as the offerings at London will be heavy.
