Toronto, Oct. 26—11 p.m.—The depression over the Southwest States yesterday has moved northeastward, and is now central over Lake Huron. It is causing a general rainfall and strong winds in the lake district. High pressure and fair weather continue in Eastern Canada. In the Northwest the pressure is lower and the weather fair with moderate temperatures.

Real Estate by Auction.

Ald. J. W. Jones held a sale of real estate at his rooms on Dundas street yesterday.

Parcel 1, a residence on the north side of Riverview avenue, South London, first house west of the Wharfedale road, was sold to Mr. Dan Ferguson for \$2,400. No. 66 Alma street, South London, was bought by Mr. W. W. Kennedy for \$2,200. No. 27 Askin street, South London, was sold to Mr. E. I. Ferguson for \$1,000. No. 151 Duncas street, South London, was withdrawn at \$1,400, also No. 338 Maitland street at \$75. No. 1,071 Richmond street was withdrawn when the bid had reached \$850. No. 728 Queen's avenue was withdrawn at \$1,500, and the store and house at the southeast corner of Clarence and Simcoe streets was also withdrawn at \$975. Housekeepers' Mission.

At the autumn meeting of the Housekeepers' Mission it was decided that the monthly distribution to the charitable homes would not begin this year until the first week in November. Through the kindness of London's liberal housekeepers there is always a supply on hand for distribution by the members to the friendless and aged sick of the city, but the active work of the mission is confined principally to the winter months. Church Opening.

The re-opening of St. John's Church at Eastwood took place yesterday. The evening service was to have commenced at 7:30 p.m., but long before that time the building was filled to its utmost capacity.

Rev. G. B. Ward, the incumbent and three other clergymen assisted in the service, while the Bishop of Huron preached a very impressive and instructive sermon from II. Timothy, ii, 19. At the conclusion of the sermon the bishop congratulated the members very warmly for their zeal in re-opening and restoring the old structure. A liberal collection and the doxology brought the occasion to a close. A sacred concert and addresses by the clergymen of the diocese were given to the church tonight in aid of the building fund.

Dr. Paton in Britain.

The many friends of Dr. J. G. Paton, will be glad to hear of his safe arrival in Glasgow, Scotland. Mr. Drysdale, of Montreal, has received a letter from him, of which the following is an extract:

"I landed in Liverpool on Saturday morning. That evening I did not feel sick but could not write or read with comfort (as usual at sea), and felt as if the time were lost. On Oct. 14, I entered upon a two months' course of meetings in the largest cities of Scotland and England, and Ireland follows, all arranged before I came by a volunteer committee, which saves me much labor and time. They have taken Easter Hall, London; the City Hall at St. Andrew's; the Glasgow, and each city to be visited, with from one to three meetings daily. I hope I may be able to carry all through, for I caught a severe cold on the voyage, and have not been able to go out since I landed. May the Lord grant strength and his blessing, with much spiritual fruit to his glory. I heard that the Toronto foreign mission committee took no action regarding the 5 cent children's shares for our mission ship till they saw what the Spread of Nova Scotia does regarding it, but I hope God has led them to approve of it. We must accept the result as his will in the matter. The London Missionary Society are launching a new 'John Williams' with auxiliary steam power, on Nov. 11, built here in Glasgow, and unless Canada helps us, there seems to be no hope of ours being built."

Board of Works.

The Board of Works met last night. Engineer Graydon presented the new sewer on Dundas street, between Maitland and Colborne streets, was badly laid, forming pockets and sharp turns and causing water to run into cellars when the sewer is flushed. The defective parts will be laid.

The engineer also recommended that the council chamber be wired for an incandescent light, the present arc light being hurtful to the eyes, but the communication was filed.

The Hamilton and Toronto Sewer Pipe Company were Chairman Gerratt complaining that the sewer pipe tender of another company had been accepted in preference to theirs, at one-third more price. The letter said that Mr. Gerratt had made the most awkward of the contract, and it went on to say: "In our last conversation you stated that you would advocate the use of our pipes. We do not propose to allow this matter to stop here; we will push it to the end of it."

As the council determined at the beginning of the year to use nothing but the "Standard" pipes, of St. John's, N. B., in their repairs and works for the year, Mr. Gerratt simply went according to the council's orders. Tenders will be called for the building of the Worley road sewer. The pay sheet amounted to \$295.88. The committee have a balance yet to their credit on account of appropriations of \$3,339.93. There were present: Ald. Thomas Jones (acting chairman), Ald. Dreaney, Ald. Taylor, Ald. Shaw, Engineer Graydon, Commissioner Owen and Secretary Bell.

No Change in Coal Prices.
