Pte. William West, who is reported as missing at Koonstad, is one of the best known and most popular young men who left this city for South Africa. He lived with his parents at No. 183 Langarth street, South London, and his father is an employee of the Hobbs Hardware Company. Pte. West for a number of years worked in the stock warehouses of the McClary Company. When the 7th Regiment was reorganized he joined it, and was an enthusiastic member. On the first night of enlistment for South Africa he volunteered, and having a splendid physique and being a good marksman, he was readily accepted. It is hoped that Pte. West's absence will be only temporary.

### MURDEROUS MUTINEERS BE-HEADED.

Tacoma, May 21.—News have been received here of a terrible mutiny that took place last March on the brigantine Navarro, bound from Sorsogon, in the Philippines, to Manila, with a cargo of hemp. For a month she was not heard from, and at last was given up for lost. It was then learned that two days out from Sorsogon the boatswain led the crew in mutiny, which resulted in the killing of Capt. Acosta, Mrs. Acosta and the vessel's mate. The three were killed with knives, and without warning. The crew finally ran the vessel into the mouth of Lucol River, in Mindoro. Several days later two native women, who had acted as servants for the vessel, told the native authorities of the tragedy; then the entire crew was arrested. The boatswain and his chief accomplices were beheaded. The rest of the crew, seven persons, were imprisoned for from ten to twenty years each.

## CAPITAL ECHOES

Who May Get Queen's Birthday Honors—Editor Becomes Postmaster—Canadian Soldiers Honored.

Ottawa, May 22.—George Kennedy, late editor of the Columbian, New Westminster, has been appointed postmaster of New Westminster in place of Mr. Brown, who has resigned, to join Premier Martin's cabinet as minister of finance.

There is considerable talk here about Queen's Birthday honours. While it is generally recognized here that the minister of militia will be the recipient of a title on account of the part he has taken in sending contingents to Europe for service, it may not be given until the war is over.

The name of the minister of justice has been also mentioned in connection with knighthood, and it is rumored that Louis Frechette will be advanced from a C. M. G. to a K. C. M. G. A cable has been received by the governor-general from Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, congratulating Canada on the great services rendered by the Canadian artillery in relieving Mafeking.

## AMBUSHED.

COL. BETHUNE FALLS INTO A BOER TRAP—68 CASUALTIES.

London, May 22—4:48 p.m.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Gen. Buller:  
"Newcastle, May 22.—May 21, while marching in the direction of Newcastle, one of my squadrons of Bethune's mounted infantry was ambushed by Boers about six miles from Vryheid, and very few escaped. Lieuts. Lausum and Capell are among the missing. Capt. the Earl De La Warr is slightly wounded in the leg. The total casualties are about 68. I have returned to Ngutu for supplies. Will march tomorrow for Newcastle via Dundee."

Gen. Buller then proceeded: "I detached Col. Bethune and about 500 men from Dundee on May 17, with instructions to march by Vryheid, and show his force at Ngutu, which was reported to have been evacuated by the enemy, preparatory to the return of the magistrates and the civil establishment to the district. He was to rejoin me at Newcastle afterwards."

Francis Anthony, of Brampton, an old man of 70 years, hanged himself.

The ice has broken up on the Yukon and the steamers are again running.

The German authorities in Manitoba have sent \$25 to the patriotic fund.

S. W. Chamer, in shooting at a rat in Paulding, Ohio, instantly killed his wife, aged 60.

Ahmed Pasha tells New Yorkers that Russia would go to smash if defeated by anybody in one good battle.

Christian Scientists will be prosecuted for allowing Mrs. J. M. Torrance to die from phthisis fever.

Rev. A. J. F. Behrends, pastor of the Central Congregational Church, Brooklyn, died today (Tuesday) of Bright's disease.

It is expected the Winnipeg carpenters will go out on strike in June unless the contractors increase their wages.

Five hundred Filipinos ambushed 80 Americans near Aquasana. Fifty-one rebels died. Two Americans were killed.

The vinegar brewery of D. H. Wilson, Bay street, Toronto, was damaged by fire on Saturday to the extent of \$7,000.

Fritz Meyer was electrocuted at Sing Sing Monday morning for the murder of Policeman Smith in New York in October, 1897.

The elevator belonging to the Northern Elevator Company at Oakville, was burned to the ground Friday. The 19,000 bushels of grain stored there was a total loss.

Mr. W. Barclay Stephens, manager of the Western Loan and Trusts Company, died suddenly at his residence, 56 Port street, Montreal, on Monday, aged 43 years.

Detroit News: The Canadian log embargo is proving a good thing for the mill men of the other side. Michigan lumbermen in the Georgian Bay are forced to pay \$4 a thousand for sawing logs when they could get it done on the Saginaw River for \$1 75 and \$2 a thousand.

At the sessions in Toronto Monday, Henry Broderick, a tailor, was sent to penitentiary for four years for receiving and selling stolen goods.

Samuel Branch, of Preston, builder and contractor, was riding to Gait on a bicycle, when a street car going in the same direction, collided with him knocking him senseless. The right leg was broken above and below the knee, the pelvis bone broken.

The Ontario Government inspectors are fighting the San Jose scale in a new way, said to be quite effective. Instead of cutting down the trees, leave in special instances, the owners are instructed in the use of chemicals, which are applied at half cost. The pest is making little or no headway.
