# British Oppose Russia's Plan

For Taking Possession of an Important Railway.

Germany Also Goes Counter to Russian Proposals-Salisbury Said to Have Sent a Significant Message Li Hung Chang.

Tien Tsin, Sept. 17.-It is understood | government considers that an indispenthat the British authorities here have een instructed to oppose vigorously the proposed Russian occupation of the Shan Hai Kwan and Tien Tsin Railway, which is owned by a British syndicate and leased to the Chinese. The recent Russian movements northward are believed here to include an expedi-

tion to Shan Hai Kwan, which is now held by the imperial troops. Both the British and the Americans have an eye on Shan Hai Kwan as an open winter port. Only a few miles of the railway to make no prisoners.' has been destroyed, and the bridges are intact. A British expedition to Shan Hai Kwan is probable at an early date.

London, Wednesday, Sept. 19-4:30 The British report that the Bengal a.m.-Coincident with the arrival of Lancers entered Hiang Hsiang ahead Count Von Waldersee in China comes the most important declaration of policy yet issued by any of the allies.Germany's circular note has turned the tables on Russia, whose evacuation proposal had put Germany into an awkward corner. Now, if Russia assents to the German note, she will be unable to pose as China's lenient and forgiving friend, while, if she dissents, Russia will lay herself open to the charge of reducing the punitive expedition to a farce.

GERMANY'S NOTE PRAISED.

The London morning papers have lit tle but praise for what is called "Germany's admirable note." The Times goes so far as to wish that the credit for making such a proposal belonged to Great Britain. The Morning Post alone points out that if the real instigators should prove to be identical with the personnel of the Chinese Government, it can hardly be expected that they will deliver themselves up, and if the Chinese Government should be designated as guilty, it would be under the ban of the powers-a condition of things only terminable by the conquest of China or producing a new government. "Therefore," says Morning Post, "the powers should carefully weigh the matter before committing themselves."

SALISBURY TO LI. There is no confirmation in any other quarter of Lord Salisbury's alleged telegram to Li Hung Chang. referred to by the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express. eve of Li Hung Chang's departure," says ehis correspondent, wiring yesterday, "he received a strongly worded cablegram from Lord Salisbury, declaring that the British Government would insist upon the return of Emperor Kwang Su to Pekin as an absolutely essential condition of peace negotiations, without which the dissolution of the Chinese Empire was inevitable." "As proof of this," says the correspondent, Earl Li pointed out that the conspiracy recently discovered at Hankow, whose aim was the re-establishment of the emperor, the dethronement of the empress regent, and the execution of Prince Tuan, and which, therefore, coincided with the aims the allies, was squelched by the Yang Tse viceroys, they all siding with the empress regent and Prince Tuan. The Parliament of Labor in Session at Ottawa.

Delegates Welcomed by the Mayor and Ministers-First Copy of the Labor Gazette Presented to President Ralph Smith. Ottawa, Sept. 18.-The sixteenth an-

nual session of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress was opened formally this morning in the St. John's Sunday school hall. On the platform were A. J. Kelly, Ottawa; Ralph Smith, president of the congress; Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Wm. Mulock, N. A. Belcourt, M.P., Mayor Payment, Ald. Desjardins and others. Mr. Kelly introduced the mayor of Ottawa. His worship assured the delegates of the pleasure it gave him to welcome them to Ottawa.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier followed, receiving a hearty welcome from the delegates present. He said it afforded him pleasure to join with the mayor in welcoming them to the capital of the Dominion. He welcomed them as brothers, as he claimed to be a workingman. All honest toilers in the shops, on the farms, or in the office were workingmen, and the trade followed was one which admitted of no idleness. Ottawa, while in many respects a good city, was in others a poor one. It was worthy the best efforts of the country to make it the most beautiful city on the continent. Hon. William Mulock, the minister of labor, said Ottawa was a city of conventions, all endeavoring in their several spheres of influence to do effective work. No more responsible or important convention would exist than one representing labor. He, as minister of labor, invited them to the labor department. He presented Ralph Smith with the first copy of the Dominion Labor Gazette. He felt it an honor to introduce this paper to the workingmen of Canada through the president of the representative labor body of Canada. He also presented him with a copy of the regulations regarding the abolition of sweating, fair wages and the conciliation act, which he asked the congress to study and criticise and suggest any amendments which may be required.

N. A. Belcourt, M.P., and Ald. Desjardines having spoken, Ralph Smith, M.P.P., president of the congress, in a well-delivered speech, expressed his appreciation of the welcome extended them. He approved of the leaders of public opinion coming into direct contact with the leaders of labor in Canada today. The labor movement is to some extent laid on a permanent and intelligent basis. It is laid on fairness and justice, and the demands must be met and considered by public men. He would say to the lawmakers that it is to them they looked for the amelioration of labor conditions. The labor bodies must remember that their influence with the lawmakers depends upon the character of the individual

labor man. He concluded by reading a telegram from Winnipeg: "Puttee nominated unanimously; \$3,500 collected towards election fund." (Loud applause.)

Clara Barton Stricken Down av Her Work.

Statement of Gov. Sayers-The Work of Recovering the Dead Goes On.
