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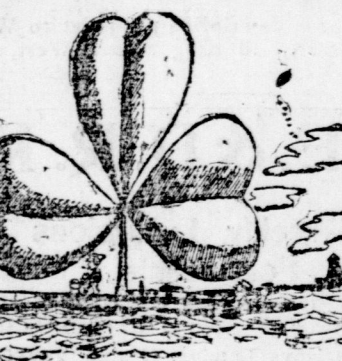

FINE AND WARMER.
Toronto, Sept. 1.—8 p.m.—In the territories and Manitoba the very fine weather still continues. In Quebec and the Maritime Provinces it has also been fine today, but over the greater part of Ontario it has been dull, with some light scattered showers. The heavy thunderstorms which occurred in Toronto on Saturday, with a rainfall of 2.19 inches, were not general; in fact, a large part of the province recorded no rain.
Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 54-62; Kamloops, 52-76; Calgary, 48-74; Prince Albert, 56-80; Winnipeg, 50-78; Parry Sound, 56-68; Toronto, 60-68; Ottawa, 60-68; Montreal, 58-70; Quebec, 54-70; Halifax, 60-72.
Probabilities for the lower lakes: Moderate winds, chiefly northwest and north. Fine and a little warmer.
Today (Monday) the sun rose at 5:41 a.m. and sets at 6:53 p.m. The moon rises at 8:53 p.m. and sets at 10:16 a.m.

BRIDEGROOM DEAD.

Ninety-Year-Old Paul Sandstrom Brown Only a Week Married.

Bloomfield, N. J., Sept. 1.—Paul Sandstrom Brown, 90 years old, who was married a week ago to Augusta Andree, a Swedish nurse, is dead at his home in Monroe place. Mr. Brown lived in Brooklyn with one of his sons until last spring, when he came to this town with his nephew, Herbert J. Carrington, with whom he kept house. They became tired of arduous domestic duties and Mr. Brown had an advertisement placed in a New York paper for a housekeeper. Miss Andree was selected from over 50 applicants.

Mr. Brown summoned Arthur Russell, a real estate dealer, and Lynden G. Fitch, his nearest neighbor, to act as witnesses to a marriage contract which Mr. Russell, who is a notary public, drew up at the nonagenarian's dictation. The exact wording of the contract cannot be ascertained as all concerned were pledged to secrecy regarding its contents. It is said, however, that the document stipulates that the bride shall receive the deeds to valuable property owned by Mr. Brown in New York and Brooklyn three months after the marriage ceremony, and \$5,000 in cash at the expiration of six months. At the time of the marriage it was also said that the contract would be null and void unless Mr. Brown lived three months after the ceremony.

Three sons of Mr. Brown by his first wife, who died two years ago, reside in Brooklyn. Mortimer Brown, one of the sons, was with his father when the old man breathed his last.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

Strong Feeling Developing in Favor of Confederation With Canada.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 31.—Hon. J. D. Green, K.C., former premier of Newfoundland, arrived at North Sydney yesterday, and in discussing confederation with Canada, said that a strong sentiment was now developing in favor of union, and that a considerable portion of the people were formerly opposed to it were now inclined to look favorably upon confederation with Canada. Of course, this country would have to offer favorable terms, as Newfoundland had now the resources to fall back upon to maintain her local services of roads, bridges and education.

SALE OF THE PLAINS OF ABRAHAM.

Quebec, Sept. 1.—One of the principal attractions upon which the Ursuline nuns agreed to sell the Plains of Abraham to the Dominion Government was that the city of Quebec extend its water and drainage system to Marchmont, adjoining the plains, which they intend to buy and turn into building lots, reserving a portion on which to erect a convent. On account of the lay of the ground, it would be necessary in order to furnish water and drainage to the portion intended to be sold as lots to pass over or under the ground of the portion retained by the nuns for their private use. Therefore, before signing the contract, Mayor Parent sought to have a clause inserted relieving the city from any claim for damages or for the right to run the drains through the nuns' private property, which latter property would also be benefited by the proposed condition. This condition the nuns refused to entertain, hence the rupture in the negotiations. Mayor Parent in an interview repudiated being responsible for the present state of affairs, only being the representative of the people.
