THE WHEAT LANDS OF CANADA

AMPLE TO FEED THE WORLD

Amazing Rush of Farmers and Capitalists to Invest in the Fertile Fields of the Northwest.

Annual Product Will Soon Reach 250,000,000 Bush.

THE PREDICTIONS OF A BANKER

Minneapolis Man Presents Interesting Figures Regarding Dominion Agriculture.

NEW YORK, July 24.—A special to the Evening Post from Washington says: "Within ten years Western Canada will be producing annually 250,000,000 bushels of wheat."

This is the prediction of Theodore M. Knapp, of Minneapolis, made in an address before the State Bankers' Association, and other observers who have been lately quoted in these columns share his views. If this estimate proves correct, it will constitute one of the most far-reaching economic developments of the world, one destined to have notable political effects on both sides of the line.

The prosperity of the United States always depends in large part upon the foreign market for our great cereal products, of which wheat is king. Its price is regulated in the markets of Liverpool, and as that figure goes up, prosperity smiles on the great Northwest, and when it comes down, complaint deepens in the hearts of the people.

The low prices of a decade ago, which gave birth to the Farmers' Alliance and People's party movements, culminating in their capture of the Democratic party in 1896, were in no small degree due to the sudden prominence attained by Russia and the Argentine Republic in the world's cereal supply. There had come to be an over supply of cereals which reacted unfavorably upon the United States. Since that time the consuming power of the world has been steadily increasing, and new markets, especially in Asia, have been opened for our cereals.

NEW CONSUMERS FOUND.
New races have learned to eat wheat, the most aristocratic of grains, and one which only the richer people have been accustomed to afford. High Australia, in a state of unprecedented prosperity. But they, without being alarmed, may properly ask where this new Canadian wheat is going to, and what will be its effect upon the world's market in cereal production.

The United States is today exporting about 80,000,000 bushels in the kernel, and as much more in the form of flour. Mr. Knapp's 250,000,000 bushels of Western Canadian production within a decade would thus be nearly double the present export of the United States.

WHAT IT MEANS FOR CANADA.
The suggestion that the existence of such a food supply on British territory, with the cattle-raising possibilities of the West, is a state of unprecedented prosperity. But they, without being alarmed, may properly ask where this new Canadian wheat is going to, and what will be its effect upon the world's market in cereal production.

WELL OFF FOR PAPERS.
The new owner says there will be no radical changes in the appearance or policy of the Public Ledger. Mr. Ochs, who is the principal owner of the New York Times, Philadelphia Times and Chattanooga Times, when asked if the Philadelphia Times, which is now being purchased by his brother, George W. It passed to the ownership of the A. J. Drexel estate when Mr. Childs died, and has been conducted up to the day of sale by George W. Childs Drexel, one of the trustees of the estate.

Mr. Ochs' newspapers are all independent in politics. The Public Ledger was notably so conducted by George W. Childs and his successor and his godson, George W. Childs Drexel, consequently the changes made in the style and character of the Philadelphia Times when its ownership changed a year ago are not necessary to the Public Ledger.

L. Clarke Davis will continue as editor and John Morris, of the New York Times, will for the present act as business manager.

pect a larger Canadian market for its agricultural machinery and other products. A number of the harvesting machine concerns have already established factories in Canada, but this may be due to requirements of the patent law, as much as to the tariff itself. Our Northwestern boundary line is purely an artificial barrier; it does not separate races, or institutions, or civilizations, or any noticeable degree. For years Canadians like James J. Hill and S. R. Callaway, have been coming south of the line to grow up with us, but recently have now going north of it to become subjects of King Edward. Since conditions of labor in this new wheat belt will not differ materially from those in the United States, it is easy to see how a vigorous agitation within the Republican party for Canadian reciprocity is bound to be heard in the near future. It will become a political question of the first importance, and if the Northwest really awakens to an economic advantage, the tradition of leaving the tariff alone will probably have to give way. Meanwhile, Americans will be having a weather eye out for an opportunity to carry out much to the north. The Republican national platform of 1896, which read: "We hope to look forward to the eventual withdrawal of the European powers from this hemisphere, and to the ultimate union of all of the English-speaking part of the continent by the free consent of its inhabitants."

CANADIANS SCORE WELL

Ten in Second Stage of King's Prize Competition.

Creditable Figures Made by the Team in Several Matches.

Bisley Camp, July 23.—Today the principal matches, in which the Canadians participated at the ranges, were the Alexander and the Martin's challenges cup. The Martin's cup is a rapid scoring competition. There is only one range—that at 200 yards—and each contestant, in firing his seven shots, has either to sit or kneel on a time limit of one minute, and magazines must be used. The Canadians made the following scores in this match: Bennett 18, Bayles 17, Carruthers 22, Davidson 28, Jones 21, King 29, Lance-Corp. Mortimer 27, Moscrop 22, Sargent, Mortimore 28, Margarets 24, Mitchell 23, MacDougall 17, Peddie 26, Perry 13, Richardson 24, Rennie 19, Smith 26, Scott 23, Skeddin 20, Spearling 26. Pte. Scott was a prize winner, standing in seventy-fifth place and winning \$2.

Lance-Corp. Mortimer, who has been shooting splendidly, got his shots within the center circle of the target every time in the Handsworth competition, which opened on Monday. The distance is 800 yards, with ten shots. Mortimer's marksmanship yesterday at the several ranges in the Knapdale cup competition was all the more creditable, as he was the highest individual tally in the contest, pleased his fellow-countrymen immensely.

There were eleven men from Canada, eleven from Australia, six from New Zealand, two from Natal, one from the West Indies, one from India and one from Rhodesia left to compete in the second stage of the King's prize competition, which takes place on Friday.

When shots at the 1,000 yards range, Sargent Skeddin, of Hamilton, made 45 points in the Kynoch match, which is being shot this week. Pte. Rennie is one of the contestants in the Association cup match, at 200 yards. His score was 39, and at 600 yards 36, out of a possible 40.

The MacKinnon cup competition, over which differences occurred last week on account of an over-time allowance to Scotland, will take place on Monday next.

In the Ely revolver competition, with stationary targets, at about 20 yards, Capt. Margarets made 40 points. At the vanishing target his score was 37, and at right and left 70.

In the Alexander match the scores of the Canadians were as follows, at 200 yards: Sargent, Mortimer 34, Bayles 31, 25; Carruthers, 23; King, Davidson, 33; 25; Jones, 27; King, 33; 33; Lance-Corp. Mortimer, 34, 30; Moscrop, 34; Sargent, Mortimore 32, 19; Margarets, 24; Mitchell, 30, 27; MacDougall, 32, 22; Peddie, 33, 26; Perry, 24, 30; Richardson, 32, 29; Rennie, 33, 23; Smith, 33, 25; Scott, 35, 32; Skeddin, 30, 28; Spearling, 32, 27.

AMERICANS COMING IN.

In 1896 fewer than 10,000 Americans crossed the border, while this year it is estimated by J. Obed Smith, Dominion immigration commissioner at Winnipeg, that out of a total immigration of 100,000, the number of Americans is 50,000. The United States contributes 50,000. It has been predicted that we shall soon be pouring Americans into Canada at the rate of 50,000 a year, as we have so long been pouring them into our Northwest under a similar economic stimulation. A notable illustration of the way the plans of men have been made is that when Sir John Macdonald built the Canadian Pacific Railroad, partly to prevent the Americans from coming in, and partly to open the road a land grant of about 25,000,000 acres. This is the very land through the company or its assignees, the American settlers are now buying, and they will bring about the Americanization of Canada, with greater rapidity than was ever before thought of.

CAPACITY OF CANADIAN FIELDS.

Last year Manitoba raised as much wheat as North Dakota, and, with the three territories of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Assiniboia, produced 82,000,000 bushels. The same success will produce this year 75,000,000 bushels, or about the yield of Minnesota. One Minneapolis milling company has already made arrangements to receive and grind Assiniboia wheat, in bond, and is planning to build a great mill for the exclusive grinding of Canadian wheat for the export trade. Manitoba alone has 2,500 miles of railway and other spur tracks are building. The Canadian Pacific is active, and the Canadian Northern is active, and the continental, whose eastern terminus is at Port Arthur, is already pushing out from Erwood, 800 miles northwest to Prince Albert, and Edmonton, and through the Yellow Head Pass, the lowest of mountain pathways, and down to the Pacific. It is also extending the line to the west, and the whistle of the locomotive will be heard on the shores of Hudson Bay.

Our Northwest wants reciprocity with the United States, and the country wants the removal of duty of 25 cents a bushel on wheat, which is senseless, since both countries sell in the same market, and the wheat is in bond and export in bond, would be avoided.

TO BALANCE THE SCALES.

In return, the Northwest would expect a larger Canadian market for its agricultural machinery and other products.
