Irish Land Bill Before the Commons—Commissioner to Take Over Estates for Sale to Tenants.

ACRIMONIOUS CORRESPONDENCE

An acrimonious correspondence between A. J. Balfour and Gen. Buller has been published. Mr. Balfour contends that Gen. Buller was in chief command at the battle of Spion Kop, while Gen. Buller denies this assertion.

To his contention Mr. Balfour adds: "There is no reason why all the Spion Kop dispatches should not be published."

To this, Gen. Buller rejoins that he hopes the dispatches will be published without manipulation.

Mr. Balfour protests against the latter's insinuation, declaring that the only manipulation which had been exercised with regard to Gen. Buller's dispatches was the exclusion of a single sentence criticising Sir Charles Warren, while the omissions from Lord Roberts' dispatches relating to operations in Natal were made.

THE IRISH LAND BILL.

Chief Secretary for Ireland George Wyndham introduced the Irish Land Bill in the House of Commons. Mr. Wyndham said the object of the bill was to amend the land purchase law. The government could not ignore the problem, owing to the acute crisis in agriculture, and in view of the fact that there was an alarming decrease in the advances for the purchase of land, owing to the unwillingness of the landowners to sell.

ITS PROVISIONS.

The main provision of the bill authorizes the land commission to take over the land of any owner who is willing to sell. The commissioner will then resell it to the tenants, but the assent of three-quarters of the number of tenants necessary before the commission will undertake to transfer any part of an estate. The landlord himself may repurchase part of his estate, not to exceed one-fifth of the total area, from the tenants, but he must become a tenant-purchaser, in case he desires to continue to reside on the estate. The bill does not provide for compulsory purchase. All the transfer arrangements are in the hands of the commission, and are simplified as much as possible.

The bill provides that cash, not exceeding \$3,000,000, to be outstanding at any one time subsequent to the bill, may be advanced to the commission by the exchequer, thus enabling purchases to be made on a vastly larger scale than ever before.

IRISH DON'T ENTHUSE.

The Irish members evinced little enthusiasm over the bill.

John Redmond, the Nationalist leader in the house, said he purposed to reserve his judgment until he had studied the provisions of the bill carefully. He warned the government that the ultimate compulsory purchase must be the ultimate solution of the problem, as nothing else would be acceptable.

Timothy M. Healy (Nationalist) said he believed the bill would do something towards settling the question.
