SCENE OF THE McCLARY FIRE IS BEING RAPIDLY CLEARED

ILES of burnable rubbish now occupying the space in front of the McClary building has been set on fire, and a great quantity of the rubbish has already been destroyed. COMMITTEE CONSIDERS FIRE DEPARTMENT'S NEEDS

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH HAS HAD A PROSPEROUS YEAR

All Organized Societies Connected With It Flourishes.

Session Give Warning Against Decline in Spiritual Life.
T. ANDREW'S Church, whose congregation held its annual meeting last night, has enjoyed a year of gratifying prosperity, as indicated by the reports of the various church organizations that were presented. The membership of the church itself has increased to 983, and the total receipts for all purposes, to \$12,659, over \$1,000 more than last year. Of this \$8,559 was subscribed for the work of the congregation and \$4,100 for missions and benevolences. However satisfactory this may be considered, the session of the church warned the congregation of the decline in spiritual life that is apparent on all sides, owing to the increased demands made upon men and women by business and pleasure. They referred to this in a letter read at the meeting, and Rev. Dr. Johnston, speaking subsequently, commented upon the discontinuance of family worship, the slackness, on one hand, of church attendance, and a growing passion for pleasure on the other. These things indicated a downward tendency, and peril to spiritual life that must be resisted. He was pleased at the prosperity and good work of the church societies, but the best work of the church, the quickened sympathies, the strength to resist temptations, and the aspirations after higher things, could not be tabulated by figures. These intangible results were the real objects for which the church lives and labors.
