Ottawa, March 24.—The debate on the Northwest autonomy bill was contined today, Messrs. Sproule, Monk and Patterson being the principal speakers. Dr. Sproule combated the view taken by the Premier as to Parliament being under a constitutional obligation to give the new provinces separate schools, and to back up his statements read the following legal opinion of Mr. Christopher Robinson, K. C.

"The right of the Dominion Parlianent to impose restrictions upon the provinces about to be formed in dealing with the subject of education and separate schools, is, I think, not be-yond question. I am asked, however, whether the Pariament is constitutionally bound to impose any such restriction or whether it exists otherwise, and I am of opinion in the negative. It must be borne in mind that I am concerned only with the question of legal obligation. What the Parliament ought to do or should do in the exercise of any power which they may possess is not within the province of counsel. Such a restriction, I apprehend, must exist or may be imposed, if at all, under the visions of section 93 of the British inces now to be formed. If that seceffect, and if not no such enactment, so far as I am aware, is otherwise made necessary. Upon the whole, I am of opinion that section 93 does not apply to the provinces now about to be es tablished. Its provisions would appear to be to be intended for, and confined o, the then province and to the union forced in 1867. There is not in any part of the Northwest Territories, as a province, any right or privilege with respect to denominational schools ossessed by any class of persons, created by the province, or existing such union, and a right subsequently established by the Dominion in the part now about to be made a provice, does not appear to me to come within the enactment.
