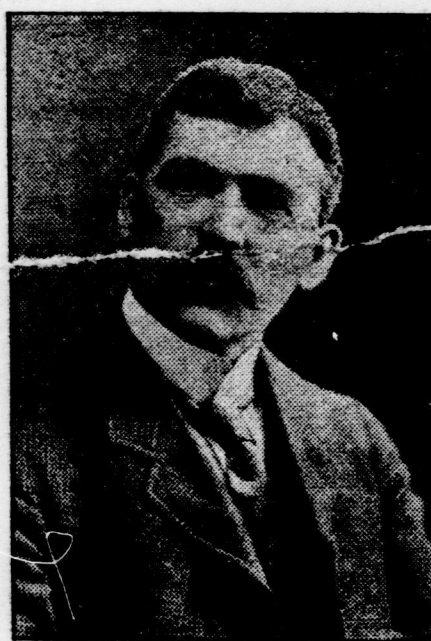

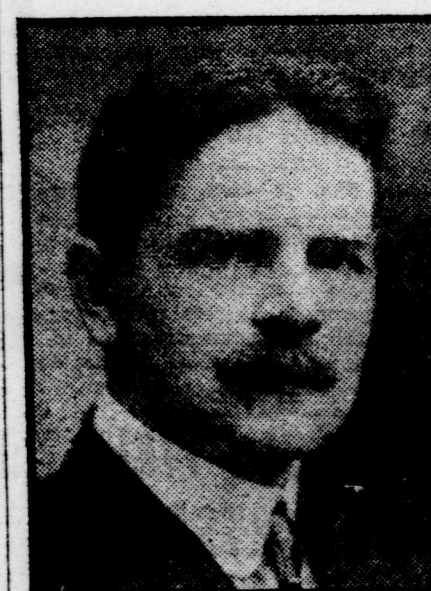

WOULD BUILD ON SHORE
G. T. R. and C. P. R. May Go Through
Black District at Toronto.

Toronto, Jan. 3.—Not one, but three, railways are now contemplating building new lines through the Kew and Balm Beach districts, and if the applications of the G. T. R. and C. P. R. receive a favorable hearing from the Government, the residents of these beautiful suburbs will be compelled to seek pure air and sylvan environment in some other quarter. The city's legal department has been notified by Hon. H. E. Emmerson, minister of railways and canals, that he is to hear the petition of the two companies for leave to deviate their tracks at the eastern entrance to the city. The Grand Trunk states in its application that it desires to deflect its tracks at Port Union, and from there build along the lake shore, at the foot of the bluffs, as far as Munro Park, where it will turn inland a distance of 400 feet from the shore, and strike a straight course through the heart of the residential district. Its intention is to run south of the Woodbine and along Ashbridge's Bay into the city.

VANDERBILT A BIG WINNER.
New York, Jan. 3.—W. K. Vanderbilt eclipsed all owners of race horses in the matter of money won during the season of 1906. His horses in France won \$225,000, which was \$29,000 in excess of his nearest competitor, Herr Weinberg, whose horses in Germany won \$186,875. Lord Derby was third with \$164,720, and James R. Keene fourth, with \$154,918.

GALT BIGAMY CASE.
Galt, Jan. 2.—Mrs. John Bates pleaded guilty before Judge Blake this morning to a charge of bigamy preferred against her by the chief of police, acting under advice of the deceased man. Her maiden name was Dalby and she married Bates in Buffalo some years ago. In 1905 the woman went through a marriage ceremony with Albert Roney, of Preston. The prisoner was remanded for sentence.

near Niagara, and are letting all others go without power. It's dividends they're after. He said the people—all the people—should be interested in Niagara power, because it will mean cheap power for the home as well as cheap power for the manufacturer. If the city said the power it will contract for at the price it purchases it at, it will make enough money through overlapping to provide for the sinking fund and interest. The bylaw to be voted on will only empower the city to make a contract with the hydro-electric commission at the price quoted. If it should prove that the commission's figures are excessive, the city has not the power to make a contract with the commission at any higher rate. Surely this showed that the city is taking no chances.

Mr. Fryer said that in London the people pay 9 cents a kilowatt hour for light.

"With Niagara power you can cut that in two," he declared.

Peeling the subject a little delicate, he turned apologetically to Mayor Judson and said:

"I don't know what connection your mayor has with the London Electric Company."

The mayor did not reply.

Figures Are Correct.
Mr. Cecil B. Smith, the commission's expert, said that the figures of the expert engineers, based on calculations covering a period of five years, and made by three different sets of engineers, are undoubtedly trustworthy. As to the service being a satisfactory one, he said that the breaks in continuity would be practically nil. Companies which supply power over long distance transmission lines have no fear in this regard, and accept heavy penalty claims in case of a break in the line. The service to London will be one which can be depended on. Hamilton, which gets its power largely from the DeCew Falls, has but little or no trouble. The DeCew Falls auxiliary steam plant has only been used once in two or three years. At present, the power is being sold for the sinking fund in London is only 120 miles away. In a few years power from Niagara will be sold to points west of London. London is not on the extreme end of power

case the city decided to do its own distributing. The question was not answered. When the transmission lines are paid for, Mr. Beck stated that London will then get its power at the same price as Hamilton, after allowing for the line loss.

EXPOSURE KILLED CASSATT
Attack Made Over Graft Hastened the Death of Penn. President.

Philadelphia, Jan. 2.—There is no doubt that Mr. Cassatt's life was shortened by the attacks that were made upon him last summer and the exposures concerning the business connections of some of his trusted subordinates on the Pennsylvania Railroad. He was the soul of honor. He was one of the most conscientious men and from the time he assumed the presidency he was full of confidence in the justice, the fairness and the honesty of the management of the property. Hence the exposures and the attacks hurt him keenly. He never recovered from the shock.

Mr. Cassatt's characteristics are illustrated by the manner in which the free pass system was abolished on the Pennsylvania Railroad. That company took the initiative and was immediately followed by the Baltimore and Ohio, the Reading, and other railways running out of Philadelphia. Later other trunk lines adopted the same policy, and their action led to the adoption of the amendment to the railway rate law by the senate last summer, making it unlawful for a railway company to issue free tickets or give reduced rates to favored persons.
