FIRST ANALYSIS SHOWS NOTHING

Examination of Flesh From Thamesford Cow Fails to Demonstrate Hydrophobia.

There are no new developments in the hydrophobia scare at Thamesford. Word was received by Dr. Bab, of Thamesford, from Dr. Amyot, provincial analyst, stating that the first analysis of the flesh from the cow supposed to have been afflicted with rabies was negative, nothing suspicious having been discovered.

Another test, covering a period of seventeen days, will be made, and at the end of that period it will be definitely known whether or not the animal was suffering from the disease.

In the meantime Dr. Shaw is at the Pasteur Institute in Chicago, but nothing has been heard from him.

"There are no new developments," said Dr. Bab. "As far as I can learn, no other cattle have shown any symptoms of the disease. No others have been bitten by the dog, as far as I can learn."

HOUSE OWNERS SEEK PROTECTION

Will Likely Ask for Legislation To Make Claims for Rent Precede All Others.

Although the members of the Real Estate Owners' Association are unusually reticent regarding the meeting of Friday evening last, it still appears that the session was of more than ordinary importance.

Their specific request was that the present laws should be so amended that owners of property should have first lien on furniture and goods of the tenant. It was pointed out that at present the chattel mortgage, or the weekly instalment furniture dealers, have first call on all goods, and that when the landowners try to seize to protect themselves they find they cannot, as the others have a prior claim.

Lose Much in Rent.

The Real Estate Owners' Association point out that they lose a large amount of money every year in this way. Dishonest tenants will rent a house and will fail to pay the rent. If the owner attempts to make a seizure, the furniture is subject to a first lien, and the owner of the property gets nothing.

This question was taken up with Mr. Beck, and it is more than likely that the R. E. O. A. will ask for legislation giving owners of property first claim on all furniture, etc.

Other Matters.

As for the report that Mr. Beck stated that the Hydro-Electric Commission would create a distribution plant if the city did not, he enters a denial.

"What I did tell them," said Mr. Beck, "was that I did not think it would be necessary to provide for a steam auxiliary plant in London, as has been suggested as one of the advantages of buying the London Electric Company."

"I said that possibly that would be a matter for the Hydro-Electric Commission—the providing of auxiliary plants. But I said then, and say now, that the commission has never contemplated such a step, and does not so now. We would need to build big expensive plants all over the country, and they are not needed."

Mr. Stalker, who was 73 years of age, had been a resident of Dunwich ever since 1845, coming to Canada from Argyleshire, with his mother and grandfather. When 18 years old he took up land near the "Smith Plan," and did the work of a pioneer. He was a staunch Reformer, a prominent Sons of Scotland, and was generally known throughout this part of the country. His widow, two sons and two daughters survive; the sons are Neil and Archie, and the daughters Florence and Bernice. The funeral will take place Wednesday at 1 p.m.
