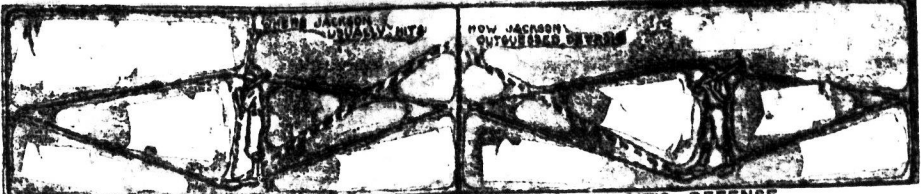
DOWN IN THE POWER PLANT OF THE HOTEL ST. REGIS

OLD KID THEORY PROVED EFFECTIVE BY JOE JACKSON



Joe Jackson, Cleveland slugger, showed Detroit players something the kids know, but which major leaguers disdained.

Jackson bats left-handed and generally hits to right field. Fielders play him accordingly, the outfield shifting until the left fielder is behind short. This leaves left field unprotected.

But in the future outfielders will play Jackson by guess, with a prayer, for he crossed Detroit as cleverly as Napoleon used to when he was tramping over Europe.

Ordinarily Jackson stands as shown in the first diagram. To assure his hitting to right, pitchers keep the ball over the inside corner of the plate.

Against Detroit Jackson stood as usual when the pitcher wound up, but when the ball was pitched he drew back his left foot, throwing forward his right shoulder and hip, until he faced the third base line, as shown in the second diagram.

Jackson timed his swing and caught the ball a trifle late. His step backward took him farther from the plate than usual, and the ball struck the bat near the end, the result being a line hit into left field.

Men who saw the trick remembered when they used to hit to right or left field by means of the same foot and body work. Base major leaguers opened their eyes. They had learned something from a minor leaguer.

DOLLAR KINGS OUST ARISTOCRATS

Stately Homes of Scotland Are
Fast Being Bought.

DRUMMOND CASTLE SOLD

Innovators Make Homes of Ancient
Feudal Kings Look Like
Modern Palaces.

London, May 8.—The stately homes and ancestral acres of old England are fast passing out of the hands of titled landowners. Wealthy American sportsmen already hold many of the shootings of Scotland, and now the dominance of the transatlantic element north of the River Tweed by E. Dyer Jordan, of Boston, who has leased Drummond Castle from Lord Ancester, is remarked. Jordan thus becomes the tenant of one of the finest show places in Britain.

In olden times Drummond castle was a Scottish stronghold, whose sturdy inmates were of comely stature, the field of Bannockburn, Scottish monarchs have been its honored guests. Cromwell's soldiers knocked the castle about, but it was the Dowager Duchess of Perth, a fervent Jacobite, who in 1745 ordered the historic structure to be levelled to the foundations.

The weather beaten pile became a memory, but in 1822 it was partially rebuilt, and prior to a visit paid to it by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert in 1842, was made a habitable abode, though but a museum of Celtic relics compared with its former grandeur.

The modern edifice bearing the ancient name of Drummond Castle is built on the grand scale. The dream like beauty of its gardens, and its lovely lake, the Loch of Bannockburn, its woods and avenues makes the place an exceptionally fine retreat for the Boston dandy king who is its fortunate tenant.

In the case of Floors Castle, another Scottish pile, there are numerous American innovations in progress. By order of the Duke of Roxburghe, some of the rooms of that grim stronghold have been exquisitely decorated in the French style by a staff of decorators specially brought from Paris.

Plenty For Sale.

As everybody knows, Andrew Carnegie has long been laird of Salsburgh Castle, where during the fall he usually dispenses princely hospitality. Britons who have amassed large fortunes in commerce have also been buying up old castles and estates from impoverished peers of the realm. Lord George's land taxes are operating in the direction of bringing many private pleasure grounds into the market, and so the last year or two have been really a good time for business in real estate. Among the people of title who are not so much interested in the sale of their lands and houses for sale during the last few months are Earl Manvers, Earl Soudes, the Dowager Countess of Camaroun, the Duke of Atholl, the Duke of Sutherland, Lord Toller-mache, Lord Heberstee, and the Marquis of Graham.

The new owners are such men as the millionaire contractor, J. P. Yeats (formerly Sir Westman Pearson) whose holdings in Mexican enterprises have more than once brought him a harvest of millions. In addition to a five million dollar home in England, Cowdray Park, the old home of the Earls of Eglinton, he is also the Lord of Dunrobin, Aberdeenshire, formerly the country seat of Sir John Forbes, of Eglinton.

Lord Joicey, the great coal magnate of the north of England, whose he is known as "Old King Coal," has also selected some of the beautiful feudal strongholds. Among other estates he is the proud owner of Ford Castle, an old border castle in Northumberland, once the home of the late Marchioness of Waterford.

BOYCOTT LONDON

Many Canadian Visitors Refuse To
Pay High Hotel Prices.

London, May 9.—Owing to reports of high prices demanded by hotel-keepers and others, who expect to reap a harvest out of the coronation visitors, passengers who arrived by the Mauretania this morning, and the President Grant yesterday, announced their determination to proceed to Paris and other cities on the continent. They will remain there till just prior to the celebration and stay in London only as long as necessary to view the pageants.

One passenger who came by the Kron Princess Cecilia said: "The rich wives of London hotels was the principal theme of discussion on the trip. All of the passengers were of one mind, to spend as little time and money as possible across the channel."

The West End hotels all will be full through June, but there is plenty of room across the channel.

BELFAST AND CORK DRIVE OUT MORMONS

Missionaries Advised to Stay
Away From Emerald
Isle.

Dublin, May 8.—Agitation against Mormon missionaries which started in England, has spread to Ireland, and the missionaries have been advised to stay away from the Emerald Isle.

They never had much success in Ireland, except in Belfast and Cork, and these have been lying low in these two cities for the last week or two. In Belfast the other day a mob broke up one of their meetings and was only prevented with difficulty by the police from wrecking the hall, and in Cork the Mormons were served with notice that they would find it healthier to discontinue their meetings. They took the hint and there was no disorder in Cork. A propaganda in the villages on lines of the parish priests looked so well after their flocks that they found the game not worth the candle and have given up.

Speed Limit for Automobiles.

In Dublin there has just been started a public inquiry into the feasibility of fixing for automobiles within the city the same speed limit as that now in force for horse-drawn traffic. At present the maximum speed limit in Dublin is the same as that for the whole country—20 miles an hour.

But drivers of all kinds of vehicles are notoriously careless, and motorists are no worse than drivers of horses. Nine out of ten street accidents reported are due not to excessive speed but to careless driving, and hardly a day passes without some vehicle passing along at full speed on the wrong side of the road, and taking the chances in cutting through traffic instead of waiting in an orderly way for the road to be cleared. The police can't complain they haven't got enough for traffic regulation, for there is no city in the three kingdoms as heavily loaded in proportion to its population.

Committee Is Appointed.

Here are the names of the committee appointed by the English Liberal Government to consider the financial relations between Ireland and England under the proposed home rule scheme.

Sir Henry Primrose, K. C., B. C. S. L., chairman, secretary to the treasury, Ireland, 1880-81; Denis Kelly, D. D., bishop of Ross, member of the agricultural board for Ireland; Lord Farrington, the son of the late baronet of the lord lieutenant of Ireland; W. G. S. Adams, reader in political economy and in the university of Oxford; Henry Neville Cliftenden, senior partner of Ogilvy, Giffenders & Co., of London; Frederick H. Jackson, director of the Bank of England; William Blewett, of the firm of Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co.

Out of the lot there are only two that can be classed as Irishmen and one who can fairly be called a home ruler. Sir Henry Kelly, Lord Pirrie may be called an Irishman although he was born in Canada. He is a scion of a noble family. The other members of the committee are financial experts, but they are all English. There is not a whole committee a representative of any Irish county or borough council or other local authority, and the chief duty of the committee will be to decide what shall be considered Irish local and what imperial expenditure, in arriving at a fair share of the Irish revenue under home rule.

FIRST ROYAL BALL OF NEW REIGN

Brilliant Affair Marks the Opening
of the London Season.

London, May 9.—There are indications that the social season, which opened yesterday, will be the most brilliant on record. Last night fully a dozen notable hostesses were entertained at a magnificent party of the night, the first royal ball of the new reign, took place at Hyde Park House, where Lady Naylor Leland was hostess, as well as the Duchesse of Argyll, and Prince and Princess Louise of Battenberg, being the chief guests.

SUFFRAGETTE WEDDING

United on Grounds of Perfect Equality Whatever Life Brings.

London, May 9.—A suffragette wedding took place yesterday in a church at Brighton. Suffragettes gathered in force, with tri-color flags, emblematic of freedom, purity, and hope. The bride and bridegroom exchanged rings, and there was a specially worded marriage service, in which it was declared that the couple united themselves on grounds of perfect equality, and that there was a specially worded prayer for the future, whatever life might bring them.
