

## SUGGESTS HANGING OF BOMB DROPPERS

English Paper Advises This Treatment For Any Who Are Caught.

## "THE APACHES OF WAR"

Correspondent Says That It Is Now Clear That Zeppelins Were Used.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Jan. 21.—A note to the Herald from London this morning says: It is now clear that the air raid on Yarmouth and the northeast coast of Nova Scotia was carried out by three Zeppelins. They crossed the North Sea in company, and separated about 30 miles from the coast. One of the Zeppelins, one made a tour of the coast towns of the Wash, and the third went overland toward Sandringham and King's Lynn.

The net result of the raid may be summarized as follows: Two women, one boy and a man killed; a baby girl and 21 adults injured; some thousands of pounds worth of damage done to property.

The German official statement that the raid was made by a Zeppelin is ridiculous, as may be seen from the following list of places on which bombs were dropped—Yarmouth, Boston, Shelburne, Hingham, Spettisham, Deringham, King's Lynn and Grimsby.

Apaches of War. Twenty-two Zeppelins were dropped. Some failed to explode, but where damage took place considerable damage was done. No military value can possibly be attached to such indiscriminate bombing and such killing of women and children.

The Daily Express suggests that the English government should specifically state that if any of the hostile airmen responsible for bomb throwing over undefended towns fall into their hands they be treated as common murderers and hanged. "They are not soldiers, and have no right to be treated as soldiers," the newspaper adds. "They are the apaches of war."

The Times says: "The German Government and the German people alike have made it clear in a hundred ways to the whole world that they are ready to commit any outrage and do not purpose to obey any laws of God or man. They practice the ruthless and inhuman destruction of the weak and helpless."

Effect Is Nil. The Daily Telegraph says: "As for this country, the effect of the raid, apart from some stimulus to recruiting, will be simply nil. Our resolution in regard to this enemy was formed already. We had no need of fresh evidence of the vital necessity of breaking such a power."

The Daily News says: "Is it the madness of despair, or just plain everyday madness? It adds: 'That is undoubtedly the opinion of all people whose native humanity is not consumed in a crazy passion for revenge. It is an element in war, like a child's glee in the demolition of a block castle. In no real sense is the murder of undefended civilians a part of the war. It is the destruction of property war at all.'"

REV. W. R. MCINTOSH HAS SALARY RAISED

Congregation Decides on This at Annual Meeting Last Night.

REV. W. R. MCINTOSH, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at the annual congregational meeting last night, was elected to the salary of the pastor, Rev. W. R. McIntosh, by \$100 per annum in appreciation of his services. All reports of the year's work showed progress, especially that of the Sunday school. The Sunday school is conducted along the most modern lines, all of the students being divided into graded classes, with a superintendent over each. The total membership is about 500.

Reports of the general and missionary societies showed that the church had raised more than \$200 over the amount raised the year before. The missionary societies amounted to over \$100.

When it was announced that the Sunday school was in need of books for the library, those present immediately promised more than 200 new books, and money to buy them. The new members of the board of managers elected last night were Lewis Orr, E. A. Black, and J. C. Patterson, and those elected to the missionary board, H. McFarlane, C. T. Ross and M. Hutchinson.

CONSIDERING COMMERCE

National Foreign Trade Convention Begins in St. Louis.

St. Louis, Jan. 21.—Several hundred delegates representing the leading commercial organizations of the United States, attended the opening session of the second national foreign trade convention, which met here today.

Permanent organization was effected and the convention began the consideration of problems of international law as they affect American commerce during the present European war.

After a discussion of the points raised the convention heard an address by John J. Arnold, of Chicago, on "Foreign Banking, Loans and Credits."

## FIRST CONGREGATIONAL ANNUAL MEETING

The Reports Show Splendid Progress During Year in Church Activities.

## AN INDIAN COMMANDER FINDS TRENCH WORK EXHAUSTING AND VERY UNINTERESTING.

CLOSER TIES FORMING

War Will Link India and Britain More Tightly Than Ever.

London, Jan. 11.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Conspicuous opportunity for sight-seeing in London and round about. Parties of twenty-five are being sent from the Indian army to the Tower of London, St. Paul's Cathedral, the Houses of Parliament, Buckingham Palace, some of the parks, and one of the largest department stores. Careful provision is made for complying with the men's racial customs, dietary habits, and caste restrictions.

Privately Entertained. The Hindus dine at a private house as guests of a Hindu living here, where they are the guests of the host, the ordinary civilian being objected to.

The Mohammedans have their meals at the Indian Government's headquarters. Three of India's ruling princes have just left London after a visit here. They are the Maharaja of Gwalior, Kishangarh and Jodhpur. The two former returned to France, while the latter, who is only 16 years old, took passage for Egypt, where his regiment of lancers is serving.

Has Camel Corps. The Maharajah of Bikaner underwent a minor surgical operation while in London. He commands a camel corps which has seen service in a dozen campaigns since 1901, when he took it over. His latest exploit was a successful encounter with a Turkish patrol near the Suez Canal. The camel corps remains in Egypt, while its commander is temporarily attached to the British general staff in France. His highness speaks English, and granted an interview to newspapermen during his stay in London.

War Is Monotonous. "I find up to date warfare, as waged in France, while it is depressing in its monotony," he said. "It is exasperating to a man trained to arms to have so little opportunity of seeing his enemy, while the Indian soldier is accustomed to operations in mountainous regions, deserve great credit for so quickly adapting themselves to the discipline of standing hours in the trenches, often knee-deep in water."

The war will link India and Great Britain by still closer ties, and there will be an increasing identity of interest between the native states and British India.

ALDERMEN FAVOR MADE IN LONDON

Recommend Dundas Street Building if Cost Not Too Great.

The manufacturers' committee, at its meeting last evening, decided unanimously to recommend to the city council that a suggestion of the board of trade, that the Ford office building on Dundas street, adjoining the new city hall, be used for "Made in London" exhibition purposes, providing the plan is not too expensive.

A number of local firms plan to take space in the building at a nominal rental, and there will also be quarters for meetings of various bodies, such as dairymen, vegetable growers and other similar organizations.

Colored "Copper" Is Wanted for London's Finest

Petition Going 'Round to Have Six-Footer Taken Into Police Department.

London will have a stalwart six-foot colored policeman, in addition to the colored police of the city, if the petition to have a six-footer taken into the police commission can be persuaded to think as they do.

A petition being circulated to this effect, and interested persons stated last night that already 150 signatures had been obtained, while many more citizens had signed the petition.

The petition will be presented to the city council at its next meeting.

Patrol Colored Section. The idea would be to have the officer patrol the section of the city which is inhabited by the colored citizens, although the fact that there would not be enough territory in that section to constitute an entire beat is being urged by the petitioners.

About the nearest city to London where a colored policeman does duty is Cleveland, where, in addition to a colored Italian on the force, there is a big colored "six-footer" on night duty.

"Some Scrapper." One officer recalls an occasion when he was visiting the police headquarters in the American city at a time when a raid had been made on a gambling resort. The colored officer had walked into the "den," grabbed a husky gunman and taking a loaded weapon from him had plucked him up bodily and carried the man to the patrol, while white officers hesitated to tackle the desperate man.

The man backed for the position on the local force is Pete Abbot, who has resided in this city for about seven years, and who, colored people believe, can qualify to enter the force.

"We, the undersigned, petition the best element of the colored population of the city of London and numbered among his many taxpayers, hereby beseech you to appoint to the force a good character and a citizen of London for the past seven years, can qualify for the position in every way."

"We believe in the fairness and justice of your worship and members of the city council to such an extent that we are sure that this petition will not be presented in vain."

## SIXTH OF ALL JEWS NOW MADE PENNILESS

London Co-religionists Discuss Means of Relieving Acute Distress.

London, Jan. 21.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Two million Jews—sixth of the Jews in the world—have been made penniless in Russian Poland and the eastern fighting border by the struggling armies. Beside the Jews, 25,000 Polish refugees in Galicia, 25,000 in Moravia and 75,000 in Bohemia.

These figures were given out at a Jewish meeting recently held in London for the purpose of relieving the acute distress of co-religionists. Plans, introduced by Leopold De Rothschild, were made to raise funds by subscriptions.

TRANSFER GRANTED

Former British Ship Now Sailing Under American Flag.

New York, Jan. 21.—The steamship Statens, formerly British, but now flying the American flag, arrived here today from Sunderland, Eng. Her transfer to American ownership was accomplished by the purchase of the ship by the Statens Line, Ltd., of London, and the granting of a license to the company by the British government.

ENEMY WOULD DESTROY NEW FINISH RAILWAY

German Airships Reconnoitering Sweden-Finland Frontier With This Idea.

London, Jan. 21.—A dispatch to the Echo from Stockholm states that German airships have been reconnoitering the frontier between Sweden and Finland, evidently to ascertain the location of the new Finnish railway, thus interrupting communication between Russia and Sweden.

WILEX SAYS TROOPS ARE RETURNING TO HIM

Assures U. S. Consular Agent of Protection For Foreigners.

Washington, Jan. 21.—Consular Agent Cawston, reporting to the State Department today a conversation with Wilex, said the general had informed him many of the troops which left Mexico City with General Gutierrez were returning to the Villa ranks. Villa gave renewed assurances for protection of Americans and all other foreigners.

The Carranza agency here issued the following: "Vera Cruz says reports from Mexico City state that before leaving there Emiliano Zapata secured large forces from merchants and private citizens. From El Paso it is reported that General Flores and General Alvarado, commanding four thousand men, have invaded Sonora, and are in the vicinity of Navajao, in the southeastern part of the state. General Luis Herrera and Juan Carrasco have invaded territory around Tepic, with 3,000 men."

KILLED IN ACTION

Reaprist, Formerly Montreal Policeman, Fatally Shot at Bethune.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Jan. 21.—Word has been received by Constable Weston that W. Chapman, a reservist, for over a year, has been killed in action.

He was sent to the front as a member of the eleventh company of the second division, Royal Engineers, and was shot through the stomach while fighting in the trenches at Bethune, December 30. Chapman was only 19 years of age.

I. W. W. LEADER BAILED

Joseph J. Ettor, Charged With Treason, Pleads "Not Guilty."

[Canadian Press.] St. Clairsville, Ohio, Jan. 21.—Joseph J. Ettor, industrial worker of the World leader, who has been in jail here awaiting a hearing on the charges of treason, was arraigned before Judge Davis today. He entered a plea of not guilty, and was bound over to the grand jury. Ettor gave bail for \$5,000, and immediately left for his home in Belmont County again or to send any of his representatives here.
