Dancing, too, the speaker declared was licentious, pure wickedness, and a sure road to hell. Dance halls, he said, belonged with the new religions that were going up throughout the land. 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PRESBYTERIANS GIVE FREELY BELG'ANS

Pastor Dwells On Sacrifice of Little Kingdom—Germany Was Prepared.

Special offerings were taken in the Presbyterian churches of the city Sunday with a view of raising \$1,200 to send a car of flour and other necessities to the Belgian people, of which the German military government, of which the Kaiser is the head, has been preparing a surprise for the world which it was hoped would result in forcing Germany to surrender to all peoples. The most wonderful efficient army that the world has ever known was marching with Paris as its goal before war was declared. It was an army compared with which the hosts of Xerxes and the battalions of Napoleon were insignificant. But for the heroism of the Belgians, Paris would have shared the fate of Louvain and Rheims, and England might have been invaded, too. But the Belgians stopped the German advance, and at an awful cost the German advance.

The war was precipitated, Dr. Gordon maintained, to hide and hush the rumble of revolution. The war lords of Germany went to war because they realized that the people were on the verge of rising against the tyranny under which they were being crushed. And not only in Germany, but in France and England, and all the other countries the common people were beginning to rise and demand their rights.

The speaker warned his audience not to hold God responsible for the war. "This war," he said, "was not responsible for it. It was the fault of the war lords, the fault of the world, the fault of the world in which each side did not charge the other with atrocities. We should be big enough to realize that in the hour of conflict judgment was likely to be warped."

"Anglo-Saxon Complacency." "And I warn you against Anglo-Saxon complacency and conceit," he continued. "The Anglo-Saxon is rather inclined to consider every 'foreigner' as an inferior being. People in Canada speak of the danger of the foreign element. I am not afraid of the foreign element; what I am afraid of is the Canadian politician, who corrupts the foreigner when he comes to this country."

"I warn you against the doctrine that great armaments are guarantees of peace. The opposite is true. In fact, they are responsible largely for the present war. The Kaiser only touched the button, the machinery was set in motion in motion. Europe was an armed camp, and all the European countries had been preparing for war for years. A standing army is a standing challenge to the world, and it is necessary. The untrained man who is fighting for a principle is a much more effective fighter than the trained man who fights for money because he is part of a fighting machine."

Women Could Stop War. Dr. Gordon expressed the belief that women constituted one of the greatest forces in the world, and he gave voice to the hope that, when the war was over, they would refuse to sanction war in the future. If they did that, war would have to cease.

He declared that he would not pray for a speedy ending of the war. He prayed merely to ask for God's guidance.

"You can have peace within 24 hours if you want it," he said, "but you must be prepared to pay the price. I am member the British Empire and give Germany the map of Belgium and you can have peace. I hope and believe that the war will end, and until Belgium has been restored and the German navy swept from the seas."

He believed that America, rather than the British Empire, was the power that would lead the world to peace. He declared that he would not pray for a speedy ending of the war. He prayed merely to ask for God's guidance.

"The greatest hour of the world's history," he declared, and Canada had a splendid opportunity before her. If she could not give to the world men of the finest mold the world has ever seen, she was not worthy of her geographical position.

In the evening Dr. Gordon spoke on "The Greatest Mistake in the Life of a Young Man." This he declared to be lack of decision of character, of will power. Young men also made grave mistakes when they sneered at the introduction of the village factor in the world; when they blamed the name of Jesus Christ; when they imagined that money was more than manhood; when they smothered their religious convictions; and when they trampled underfoot the love of their mothers.

Character Only Enduring Thing. "All the money in the Dominion of Canada," he said, "will not make a man a success. Character is the only thing you had when you came into the world and it is the only thing you can take with you when you leave it."
