GEN. DIAZ DEAD; PASSES IN PARIS

Former President of Mexico
Ruled For Thirty-Five
Years.

AN EXILE FOUR YEARS

Is Given Credit for Establish-
ing a Prosperous Govern-
ment.

PARIS, July 2.—7:40 p.m.—General Porfirio Diaz, former president of Mexico, died at 7 o'clock this morning.

General Diaz's wife, Senora Carmen Romero Rubio Diaz, and their son, Porfirio Diaz Jun., and the latter's wife, were at the bedside when the end came. General Diaz had been in failing health since reaching Europe in 1911 after his resignation from the presidency of Mexico, following the successful Madero revolution.

The letter with which General Porfirio Diaz announced, on May 25, 1911, his resignation from the presidency after having been master of the country for thirty-five years gives in his own words an interesting glimpse of his remarkable career. It reads:

"Sir:—The Mexican people who generously have covered me with honors, who proclaimed me as their leader during the international war, who patriotically assisted me in all works undertaken to develop industry and the commerce of the republic, establish its credit, gain for it the respect of the world and obtain for it an honorable position in the concert of nations—that same people, sir, have revolted in armed military hands, stating that my presence in the exercise of the supreme executive power is the cause of this insurrection."

"I do not know of any fact imputable to me which would have caused this social phenomenon, but permitting, though not admitting, that I may be unwittingly culpable, such a possibility makes me the least able to reason out and decide my own culpability. Therefore, respecting as I have always respected the will of the people, and in accordance with article 82 of the Federal Constitution, I come before the Supreme Representatives of the nation in order to resign, unreservedly, the office of constitutional president of the republic with which the national vote honored me, which I do with the more reason since, in order to continue in office, it would be necessary to shed Mexican blood, endangering the credit of the country, dissipating its wealth, exhausting its resources and exposing its policy to international complications."

"I hope, gentlemen, that when the passions which are inherent to all revolutions have been calmed, a more conscientious and just study will bring out in the national mind, a correct judgment, which, when I die, I may carry away in my soul as a just estimate of the life which I have devoted and will devote to my countrymen."

National Palace Stopped.
The revolution led by General Francisco I. Madero in 1911, to resign his office in a bargain for peace, but on May 24, the day on which the resignation was expected, it was not forthcoming. Diaz occurred that day in Mexico City, during which many persons were killed. The National Palace was stoned by mob shouting "Viva Madero" and demanding to know why Diaz did not resign. The next day he read his letter of resignation to the Chamber of Deputies. A large majority voted yes; the other legislators rose and bowed their affirmation as their names were called.

The views General Diaz held of these subsequent happenings were reported mainly by rumor. He authorized but few interviews, and those in the main were those of an old man gripped over his own misfortunes and those of Mexico. He longed to see peace re-established, and was often quoted as having urged the now former President Huerta to quit to prevent a foreign war. He was repeatedly reported on the point of returning to Mexico, but he denied that he ever would, unless Mexico was at peace with the United States, or unless it was for him to die in his native land.

Spanish and Indian Stock.
General Diaz was born in 1830. His family were of old Spanish stock with an infusion of Indian blood. Left fatherless at the age of 3, he was educated at the expense of the Bishop of Oaxaca with the intention of becoming a priest, but he eventually turned to law and then at the outbreak of the war with the United States turned to a military career. He served throughout that struggle in a militia company which he helped organize, and after peace was declared he made a special study of military science. He and one other were the only two to the country who dared openly oppose the consummation of Santa Anna's dictatorship. His execution was ordered, but he escaped and joined Herrera's revolt. He speedily made a reputation as a soldier, and as a brave general he was the chief thorn in the side of the French forces, when, taking advantage of the civil war in the United States, they attempted to place Archduke Maximilian of Austria on the throne of a Mexican empire. Diaz harassed the enemy constantly, and in June, 1867, captured Mexico City with his forces. On the re-establishment of the republic he was unsuccessful as a candidate for president, but in 1877 he was elected to fill the unexpired term of the fugitive president, Lerdo. His last and eighth election was in July, 1910.

To Diaz was given credit for the advance of Mexico to the status of a stable and progressive and prosperous government, although the autocratic methods he employed were widely criticized.

**SWEDISH MAIL OPENED
BY GERMAN CENSOR**
Swedish Government Likely to Make a Protest.

LONDON, July 2.—4:40 p.m.—Letters have been turned over to the foreign office showing, it was announced, that first-class mail on board the Swedish ship Bloem, which was seized in the North Sea and taken into a German port, had been opened by the German censor. It is expected that Sweden will protest to the German Government.

Pte. James Prince, 1st Battalion, has been wounded according to information received by his father, who lives at Argyle Park, east of Pottersburg, yesterday morning. Prince enlisted in this city with the 7th Regiment detachment and has been missing since the battle near Giverny in which Lieut.-Col. Becher was killed.

Pte. Prince was eighteen years of age at the time he enlisted, and served with the 7th one year prior to going to war. Lieut. Hubert C. Ruthven, a London man who enlisted in the west with the 9th Battalion, has been reported missing since the Giverny engagement, and his uncle, W. H. Cowburn, onetime Forward Avenue, West London, but now resident of R. B. No. 2, Wilton Grove, is quite anxious about his fate. Ruthven lived with his uncle, and while here was employed with the Greeneco-Swift Company. He left London shortly before war was declared, and when in Edmonton joined the 9th Battalion, later transferring to the 1st Battalion. His younger sister, Dorothy, is a ward of Mr. Cowburn and lives with him.

PRIVATE GILROY WOUNDED.
Pte. Hubert C. Ruthven, whose address is given as St. James Park, is mentioned as having been wounded in this morning's action. Pte. Prince was 18 years of age and single. Previous to enlisting he resided with his mother, Mrs. Annie, who lives on the Pipe Line road, South London.

Pte. Gilroy enlisted with the first contingent of men who volunteered from the 7th Regiment and went overseas from Valcartier with the first Canadian overseas force.

'KILLED OR PRISONER'
SAYS OFFICIAL NOTE.

ST. THOMAS, July 2.—The Adjutant-General at Ottawa today advised that Pte. H. C. Ruthven, 1st Battalion, Mrs. J. McKenna, 58 Roseberry street, that her nephew, Pte. Wm. Middleton, who enlisted at St. Thomas, had been officially reported missing since June 15, and was either killed in action or a prisoner in Germany. Pte. Middleton made his home with his aunt here. He was in his 23rd year and was a locomotive fireman on the Michigan Central Railway. Pte. Middleton formerly lived near Yarmouth Centre.

**TWO GALT MEN
AND PRESTONIAN.**

at 49 Beverly street, and worked at the saw factory, although a printer by trade. He is 22 years of age, and was born in Ramsgate, England.

The Preston man is Private Wm. Johnson, unmarried, 33 years of age, and who lived on Vine street.

**GUELPH SOLDIER IS
PRISONER IN GERMANY.**

**FORMER WOODSTOCK
MAN IS KILLED.**

WOODSTOCK, July 2.—Sapper George Revell of the 1st Field Company Canadian Engineers was killed in action according to word reaching Woodstock. He was a son of the late Robert Revell, at one time mayor of Woodstock, and was born in this city about 36 years ago. He removed from Woodstock, however, fourteen or fifteen years ago, and at the time he died in action he was practicing his profession as a civil engineer in Nelson, B.C. He is survived by three sisters and one brother: Mrs. Ed. Peck of Peterboro, Miss Charlotte of Peterboro, and Miss Florence of Chicago, and Harold of Toronto. Dr. Revell of this city is a cousin.

Lance-Corp. William Murdoch has been officially reported killed on the 15th. This letter, however, dated on the 16th, shows that some mistake has been made. Lance-Corp. John Murdoch's death, at Argyle Park, east of Pottersburg, official sources, and it is supposed that the names of the two brothers have got mixed in the official lists.

CANADA WILL GET SHARE OF ORDERS IN FUTURE

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy Says C. P. R. Will Look After Business.

NEW YORK, July 2.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, arrived here today aboard the steamship Lapland from England, where he went to attend a conference with various Government officials concerning the purchase of war supplies for the Allies in Canada. He said he had made arrangements by which the purchase department of the Canadian Pacific would be utilized as far as was practicable for the purchase of such supplies.

By the arrangements made in England, the position of Sir Thomas in Canada will, in the future, be somewhat analogous to that of J. P. Morgan in the United States. He said that the Canadians were not disgruntled at having failed to receive orders given for war supplies in the United States, but that in the future Canada would be assured of her share.

ITALY TO PUSH MUNITIONS WORK

MILAN, Italy, July 2, via Rome.—

Lombardi, Italy's greatest manufacturing centre, has organized a munitions committee, the executive committee of which in collaboration with the military authorities will work to organize Italian industries on a vast scale to cope with the new and unexpected national situation regarding munitions. The duties of the committee will be to ascertain if the various factories can supply the necessary machinery to enable them to undertake army work; to inform the various industries what the statement requires; to supply designs and patterns; and to regulate the prices to be charged and stimulate rapidly in construction which is expected to be obtained through methodical work during longer hours and the alteration of fresh artisans for day and night duty.

The committee, whose services will be rendered gratuitously consists of experts belonging to the Milan College of Engineers and Architects, and the Italian Electro-Technical Association, which are largely providing the funds required, aided by subscriptions from the residents of Milan.

From a recipe of Charles Francatelli, Chief Cook to Queen Victoria.
Published in 1865.
Clean 2 lbs. cherries and a handful of raisins, and bruise stones and kernels in a mortar; place in small preserving pan with 1 lb. John Redpath's sugar-leaf and ½ pint spring-water; boil on the stove-fire about five minutes, taking care to remove scum as it rises; pour into a beaver jelly-bag and filter in usual way. Mix juice with two ounces clarified glass, and pour into jars or mould.
