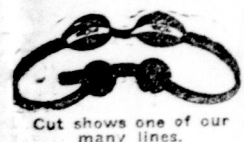

ASK INCREASED
TOBACCO DUTIES

Growers From Essex, Kent
and Quebec Wait On
Federal Ministers.

Hon. W. S. Fielding Promises
Planters' Requests Will
Be Fully Considered.

OTTAWA, April 26.—Representa-
tives of tobacco planters, associations
from the counties of Essex and Kent
were among a large deputation of to-
bacco growers from the provinces of
Ontario and Quebec, numbering in all
over 50, who waited on the govern-
ment today to ask that an increased
tariff be placed on leaf tobacco.

Representing the tobacco planters
of Southwestern Ontario were: R. L.
Brackin, A. M. Fraser and the Hon.
Manning Doherty, minister of agri-
culture for Ontario. They were re-
ceived at the office of the minister of
finance, outside the House of Com-
mons. The cabinet ministers pres-
ent were: Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon.
George P. Graham, Hon. W. C. Ken-
nedy and Hon. Jacques Bureau. The
members of the delegation not com-
ing from Southwestern Ontario were
from the counties of Montcalm, L'As-
somption, Joliette, Berthier and
St. Hyacinthe, Quebec. These last-
mentioned counties, together with the
counties of Essex and Kent, make
up the major portion of the tobacco-
growing districts of Canada.

Make Nine Requests.
The delegation was introduced by
Senator Archie MacGill, and for the
Ontario members R. L. Brackin spoke.
The claims of the delegation were
nine in number, or rather their re-
quests were nine in number. Their
petition given to Hon. W. S. Fielding
declared that in making their
representations they based their argu-
ments on the experience of the past
25 years. Every move of the govern-
ment during that period at the be-
hest, they said, of the tobacco grow-
ers, had been beneficial to all. "There
was only one exception," the petition
stated, "it being the last amendment
of the law governing this industry
when, in 1918, as a war measure, and
without any regard to any other con-
sideration, the late government raised
the duties on foreign raw leaf to-
bacco and the manufactured products
and also imposed a duty on Canadian
raw leaf tobacco in the hands of the
growers when sold by them for con-
sumption, at the same time subject-
ing them to useless obligations in the
matter of license and monthly re-
turns."

The excise duty imposed on to-
bacco growers by the Tory regime
when in power, it was shown, was a
great hardship. The other requests
of the tobacco growers urged:
1. That the annual fee for license
of \$2 and monthly returns required
of tobacco growers be abolished.
2. That the duty of 5 cents per
pound now levied on all Canadian
raw leaf tobacco offered for sale or
consumption, whether by the growers,
the manipulators or manufacturers,
be abolished.
3. That the duty on all manufac-
tured tobacco as distinguished from
cigars and cigarettes be fixed at 10
cents per pound.
4. That the duty on cigars be scaled
according to the proportion of Cana-
dian leaf tobacco used with foreign
leaf used in their manufacture at a
given scale.
5. That the duty on all foreign leaf
tobacco (cigar wrappers excepted) be
fixed at 80 cents a pound on un-
stemmed leaf, and \$1 on the stem leaf.
6. To control the sale of product
stringently to protect the youth of
the country.
7. Transfer or removal of tobacco
stems from one factory to another
be abolished, unless used in manufac-
ture of snuff.
8. That a tobacco grower be allowed
to keep on his premises 30 pounds
of tobacco for each adult in his fam-
ily.
9. That a demonstration or experi-
mental station be established at some
central point for the curing and dry-
ing, etc., of tobacco.

Consideration Promised.
Hon. W. S. Fielding responded for
the government. He declared that
the duty on tobacco was higher at
the present time than on any other
commodity. He said he recognized
the importance of the industry, but
that he thought the trouble was with
a half a dozen buyers, and added
that negotiations might be entered
into with them. However, the govern-
ment—he not being able to speak
before consultation with his col-
leagues, the other ministers—would
give fair consideration to the requests
of the growers.
Soon before leaving Ottawa, the
Ontario growers expressed themselves
greatly satisfied with the reception
that had been accorded to them, and
declared that their mission was satis-
factory in their opinion to the to-
bacco growers.

DISCLOSES STRIKE EXPENSES.

OTTAWA, April 26.—(By Canadian
Press.)—E. J. McMurray (Liberal,
Winnipeg North) was informed in
the House of Commons today that
\$150,024.20 was paid by the Dominion
government to counsel for legal ser-
vices in connection with the Winni-
peg strike. The firms engaged were:
Messrs. Andrews, Andrews, Burbridge
& Bastedo; J. B. Coyne, K.C.; Tra-
vors Sweetnam, L. P. Pihlbo, W. W.
Richardson, S. Goldstein, E. K. Wil-
liams and Charles Russell & Co.
He was also informed that a detec-
tive agency was employed and paid
\$12,332.09 for its services.

INDIAN IN QUEBEC
SHOOT'S BROTHER

OTTAWA, April 26.—Xavier Buck-
shot, a half-breed Indian, was shot
and killed last night by his brother
Michel at Rapides des Joachim, Que.,
opposite Pembroke, according to in-
formation received by Sheriff Sloan
of Bryson, Que.
Michel crossed to Pembroke after
the crime, and was arrested by
County Constable Dixon. The
prisoner was lodged in the Pembroke
jail for safe keeping. The reasons
for the murder are not known.
