CAPITAL NOTES.

William Head Reported to be the Best Locality for a Quarantine Station.

International Fishery Commissioners - Mr. Israel Tarte Elected for Malaita-Suicide.

OTTAWA, Jan. 6. - Mr. Gamble has furnished an extended report to the Department of Public Works regarding the suitability of William Head for a quarantine station. He says the location is undoubtedly the best. A wharf can be erected at the cost of about \$30,000, and as proposed to be erected vessels will be protected in rough weather.

THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC.
It is Assessed of Preventing an Agreement for the Transportation of Through Freight.

New York, Jan. 6. - Concerning the failure of negotiations between the Panama railway company and the Pacific Mail steamship company for a contract to take the place of the contract of February 1, 1878, due to the refusal of the Pacific Mail steamship company to agree to the terms offered by the Panama company, General Newton, president of the Panama railway company, has been negotiating with the Pacific Mail steamship company, but the refusal came from C. P. Huntington, who represents the whole distance of the through traffic between New York and San Francisco.

THE RAILWAY QUESTION.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6. - President Harrison and the Cabinet to-day had before them the facts adopted by the investigation in the Treasury department of the question of commerce to and from points in the United States over Canadian roads, as indicated in these dispatches on Wednesday. The matter was discussed at some length, but nothing additional to what has already been stated was presented.

A SEALER AGROUND.
The Lilly L. Has Five Feet of Water in Her Hold.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6. - The schooner Lilly L., which left for a sealing cruise yesterday morning, returned to port this afternoon in tow of the steamer Hattie Gage. About 2 o'clock she came to anchor off Little Boilins reef. She dragged her anchor and struck on the sharp rocks twice. There was no wind at the time and the water kept pouring in at a very heavy rate.

GERMANY'S ARMY BILL.
Its Importance Discussed - Its Rejection Would be an Irreparable Blow to the Kaiser.

Berlin, Jan. 6. - The January number of the Preussische Jahrbuch contains a notable article by Dr. Delbrueck on the Army bill. The rejection of the bill, he says, would be an unjustified disaster to the German nation and especially to the monarchy. In view of the declaration of the cabinet the bill must now lead to the fall of every minister. The withdrawal of the bill, which has been recommended repeatedly by the business interests which are so anxious to raise the additional \$8,000,000 marks annually, Dr. Delbrueck says, would be an irreparable blow to the Emperor, who, after long deliberation, had placed the whole weight of his personality behind it.

CABLE NOTES.

More Russian Intrigues in the East - Bomb Throwing in Paris - Much Apprehension.

Big Fire in Liverpool - To Blow up an Editor - Suffering From Cold.

LONDON, Jan. 6. - In consequence of the somewhat unsatisfactory relations existing between England and Morocco, it has been decided to send a special envoy on a temporary mission to Tangier. Colonel Sir West Ridgway, military secretary to the British ambassador in Morocco, has been selected for the mission. He will receive six months leave of absence from his Irish post for the purpose of representing the Government in the negotiations that will be opened with the Sultan of Morocco.

VIENNA, Jan. 6. - Great excitement was caused in Neunkirchen, a town of Lower Austria, to-day, by a successful attempt to blow up the house of the editor of a Conservative paper published there. The explosive used was gunpowder, and the house was almost completely demolished.

RIO JANEIRO, Jan. 6. - It is officially denied that a treaty of alliance between Brazil and Chili will be signed here on the 15th of last month, as reported.

BERLIN, Jan. 6. - A heavy mantle of snow covers this city and the surrounding country. The suffering of the people is increased by the growing scarcity of coal, due to the miners' strike in the Saxon district. The mercury sank to six degrees below zero to-day.

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 6. - Three large warehouses were burned this morning, and 20,000 boxes of cotton destroyed. Loss, £250,000. Three lives were lost.

YOKOHAMA, Jan. 6. - The work of repairing the British steamer Zambesi, which recently went ashore, has begun. The court of inquiry found no blame attachable to the officers for the accident.

GENEVA, Jan. 6. - The last wing of the main building of the Italian-American credit bank, here in Switzerland, was destroyed by fire to-day. It is believed that the fire was of incendiary origin. The loss is heavy.

VIENNA, Jan. 6. - A convention syndicate has been formed for the purpose of procuring gold for Hungary, in anticipation of the currency reform. It consists of the Rothschild firm of Vienna and Frankfurt, the Austrian Credit Foncier, the Hungarian Credit bank, here in Budapest, and the Darmstadt Disconto-Gesellschaft.

LONDON, Jan. 7. - The Standard learns from a good authority in Berlin that Russian agents have arrived at Kabul to make the Ameroff offer as to the settlement of the Pamir question without the knowledge of England.

LONDON, Jan. 7. - The Times publishes this dispatch from Berlin: "The alleged decision of the mine owners not to pay the balance of wages due to the miners on the ground of breach of contract, is causing bitterness. More than 1,000 women attended a meeting at the end of the day of them having plodded miles through snow. The speeches were very violent."

LONDON, Jan. 7. - The Paris correspondent of the Standard says that a cartridge five inches long and two inches in diameter, with a lighted fuse attached to it, was thrown into the audience at the day meeting last night. The cartridge was carried out by a policeman, and the police are trying to give the impression that the cartridge was only a cigar.

LONDON, Jan. 7. - A dispatch to the Times says, that a landowner named Hertz, who was hounded on account of his wife's unpopularity, killed his four children and himself in Paris last night. He closed all the windows, locked the doors, put his children to bed and then burned a half barrel of charcoal in the open stove so as to fill the room with poisonous fumes. While waiting for death Hertz wrote on the floor with chalk frightful denunciations of his wife and her lover.

IRISH HOME RULE.
Five Points in the Proposed Gladstonian Measure Discussed in the Speaker.

LONDON, Jan. 7. - The Speaker discussed in his latest issue five points of the proposed Irish Home Rule bill. It says that with reference to the land question the bill will reserve the right of legislation. Regarding the question of the retention of Irish members at Westminster, it is not unlikely that the Government will be retained by the Government.

ANARCHISM IN PARIS.
The People Called Upon to Rise at Once and Seize the Reins of Government.

PARIS, Jan. 6. - M. Delahaye publishes this morning, an important letter narrating how he received the commission to expose the Panama scandal. A certain person came to him, he says, with a fac simile of the original list of 173 senators and deputies who had accepted Panama bribes.

AMERICAN NEWS.
Detroit, Mich., Jan. 6. - Dispatches from Benton Harbor, St. Joseph, Holland and South Haven, on the eastern coast of Lake Michigan, and at Escanaba and Deatur, Michigan, indicate that one of the heaviest snow storms in years has been raging since early on Monday morning.

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ATTACKS ON THE JEWS.
The Hebrews Declared to Be the Enemies of France, Its People and Institutions.

PARIS, Jan. 6. - A great anti-Semitic meeting was held at the Trovill Vauxhall this evening. The hall was packed and the first two speakers were received apparently with enthusiasm. The principal speaker of the evening was the Marquis de Mores, who began his address with a general onslaught on the Jews as the corruptors of French honesty and the haters of French liberty.

A CHINESE INPOSTOR.
Said to Be Hoaxing His Fellow Celestials as to the Exclusion Act.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. - The Government inspector of Chinese in the South informs the treasury department that a New York Chinese named Sam Yuen Sun is travelling about representing himself as the agent of the Chinese Six Companies, and collecting \$1 from every Chinese whom he can induce to believe that the money is to be expended in retaining counsel to test the legality of the Exclusion act.

FROM SEATTLE.
Great Northern Construction - The Sealer Henry Dennis - Steamer W. F. Munro Raised.

SEATTLE, Jan. 6. - (Special) - President Jim Hill, of the Great Northern, will be here within ten days. That track-laying on the road will be completed on Saturday is the report given out to-day at the company's headquarters.

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TORONTO'S BANQUET.

The Premier on the Trade Question - He Advises Canada to Await Developments.

Official Returns Show a Steady Advance Made by Canada for Several Years.

TORONTO, Jan. 5. - The Toronto Board of Trade banquet, held to-night in the Horticultural Music Hall, was an unqualified success in every way. The covers were laid for 650 guests. The hall was very tastefully decorated, the prevailing colors being red, white and buff.

THE GUESTS' TABLE WAS ORNAMENTED WITH A model railroad train, with stations, semaphore and telegraph poles, and a number of model yachts and steamboats, with other equally apt tokens of trade and commerce. The galleries were crowded with ladies and their escorts.
