He said that a number of the city's most important reservoirs had been either entirely destroyed or very badly damaged, and the water pipes were in no condition to meet the demands put upon them. There was no storage of water for fire purposes, and consequently no adequate means of protection against fire, if it should break out at the time. Herman Schussler, the Spring Valley Water company's chief engineer, discussed the water situation at considerable length, and expressed the opinion that it would be unwise for the present to experiment with the electric lines. He compared the unburned region of the city to a lot of kindling wood standing on end, and said that "since we have saved that much of the city we should do nothing which might endanger it now."
