

MAURETANIA NOW ON RETURN TRIP

Leaves New York Thirty-Eight
Hours After Her Arrival from
Liverpool—Likely to Get Re-
cord

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Thirty-eight hours after "Ne put in at her dock, the Mauretania departed at 6 o'clock to- night, and it was hoped to complete the round trip from Liverpool in world's record. On board was W. P. Holt, British journalist, who came over to "do" America for the London Daily Mail in the thirty-eight hours between trips.

The Mauretania was ready to sail shortly after noon, although Captain Gurney said he expected to have his hands full getting ready for the scheduled departure at 6 o'clock. The cargo, principally apples was stored by scores of longshoremen. The bunkers received their 4200 tons of coal from a fleet of thirty-six barges. The ship's laundry, forty thousand pieces of linen—rush-docked yesterday, has been back again and the refrigerators were re-stocked with provisions.

Three-quarters of an hour before sailing time, the last of the thousands of Christmas mail sacks left the post-office and were hurried to the pier. The cabin passengers climbed aboard and the Mauretania, backed into the river, Captain Turner hopes to touch at Queenstown Thursday night. If he does, he will establish a world's record for the round trip.

Mr. Holt completed his continental assignment today with a round of sleighing in New York. He took in Grant's tomb, Fifth avenue, the department stores and the other tourists' delights, with a brief interview with Governor-elect Dix for extra measure. "Nice chap," he said. "Fine chap. You fellows over here have your political people better trained than we do. They are really quite droll."

This fresh-faced, blue-eyed man, with crisp gray hair, met with disappointment. He could not find a department store that checked babies for its customers while they shopped. "I want to see them check the babies," he insisted. It was explained to him that the practice had been discontinued because of complications which once followed an infant's check. Just before he left, Mr. Holt revealed the meaning of his mission. "At least one of the babies," he said. "You Americans set up your relationships with conditions which you frame," he said. Study of Pellagra

ROME, Dec. 16.—A decree is published creating a commission to examine the new theory put forward as to the cause of pellagra and to formulate any changes in the existing law of protection that may be considered desirable. The commission consists of none members, all doctors, with the exception of Prince Teano, deputy, who is chiefly instrumental in calling the attention of the Italian government to the discovery of the English commission on pellagra.

Effort Studies Aviation

PARIS, Dec. 16.—M. G. Eiffel, the well known engineer, is at present engaged in studying what he calls the scientific laws of aviation. Until now flying machines have been built and worked in the dark, as it were, without any definite mathematical knowledge of the laws of the air. He believes that by careful scientific experiments certain laws may be worked out which will no longer leave the act of flying, as it is accomplished at present, a mere acrobatic feat. The laws of the science ought, according to him, to be scientifically known, and that a machine of certain dimensions, and with a certain amount of essence and motor power, ought to be able to accomplish a certain flight which could be calculated in advance, and which would no longer depend merely on the ability of the pilot. Eiffel has thus constructed a model of a flying machine, which ought to be able to fly in all weather conditions, except in a hurricane, and a number of instruments should be added to guide working with mathematical precision. Mr. Eiffel has already submitted a preliminary study, which will be examined by the academy of science.

BURGLARS SHOOT

THREE POLICEMEN

Desperadoes Tunnelling Under

Deaths Result from Fight

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The death toll resulting from a fight between the police and burglars in a Court street house last night now totals four. The house was occupied by burglars, who were attempting to make their way into a jewelry shop when they were surprised by the police.

A lively exchange of shots followed, in which Sergeant Tucker was killed, and Sergeant Bentley and Constable Choate fatally wounded, dying in hospital today, while one of the burglars died, while another was taken into a Whitechapel bakehouse late this evening.

The occupants of the bakehouse, including several men and one woman, are believed to be the persons who were arrested on Cutler street, which backed on to the jewelry store. The proprietor of this store is Henry Harris, and he said that the burglars had been in possession of the booty.

NOW BREAKING UP

Deck is Awash and Starboard Rail Under Water at High Tide; Crew Abandons Wreck

VALDEZ, Alaska, Dec. 16.—The wrecked steamer Olympia, which went on Bligh Island reef Saturday night, is rapidly being demolished by the roll of the sea. The deck is awash and the starboard rail is under water at high tide. The three men of the crew who have been rescued by the Olympia were brought here last night. Captain J. T. Daniels made a trip to Bligh Island today to take a last look at his lost ship. The officers and crew, who have been rescued, are being cared for by the local authorities.

REACH DESTINATION

Turbine Steamers Brought From Atlantic to Run Between San Pedro and San Francisco

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 16.—The Yale, the new big steamship of the Pacific Navigation company, tonight completed her long voyage around Cape Horn from New York.

The vessel immediately entered quarantine and is expected to steam into San Pedro harbor tomorrow.

The Harvard, which also made the trip around the Horn, is about one hundred miles behind the Yale, but is expected before daylight.

The arrival of the two ships is of more than passing interest to coastwise shipping as they are to be placed in operation on the Los Angeles-San Francisco run.

SMALL HOPE FOR MEN

Rescue Party at Leyden Coal Mine

Stopped by Gas and Great Quantity of Debris

DENVER, Dec. 16.—Bad gas and roof falls in the Leyden coal mine, where ten men were entombed as a result of the fire which broke out on Wednesday night, checked the progress of the rescue party today, and the party covered little more than the cap of the two and a half miles of distance from the bottom of shaft No. 1 to the spot where the men were supposed to be. It is believed that the men are physically impossible for the rescue party to reach the men before tomorrow, if they are not found alive.

At midnight word came from the Leyden mine that the rescue party had worked their way 500 feet to the level of the men. The plan now is to make a dash for the territory in which the ten imprisoned miners are supposed to be, and before this dash can be made, the rescue party must clear the entry for a distance of 500 feet or more. It is believed that it will require seven or eight hours to do this.

THE NEW LUCERIE

The new steamship Lucerie, owned by Messrs. Andrew Weir & Co., London and especially built for the transatlantic trade has been thrown open for inspection at New York. After an inspection of the vessel, the Lucerie was served in the saloon. The Lucerie is an up-to-date cargo liner, carrying 10,000 tons dead weight cargo and capable of steaming 12 knots per hour fully loaded. She is fitted with winches and derricks capable of handling up to thirty tons, has clear holds and large hatches to accommodate locomotives, machinery, etc. The Lucerie is for about twenty first-class passengers. She is also fitted to carry about 1500 emigrants.
