P. Q. LEGISLATION NOW IN SESSION

Interesting Session of House Now Well Under Way—New Party and Leaders.

MR. KEELY'S SPEECH.

The Quebec Legislature that opened on Tuesday last, with Sir Panteleone Pelletier and the new lieutenant governor, promises to be one of the most interesting since the days of confederation. The first night of its opening the house sat till past twelve o'clock and last night it was away in the small hours of the morning before the house adjourned. The presence of the new party, the Nationalists, having as its leaders Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Lavergne, and the presence of the new leader of the opposition Mr. Talbot, all tend to give an unusual atmosphere to the House, which it has not known for many years.

Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Lavergne have been holding meetings all over the province since the last few years make all kind of suggestions and it now remains whether they can be accepted as practical.

Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Lavergne profited of the first day of the opening of the Legislature to state, the hell a rolling, and at every step they were met by the government which showed how their arguments could not stand when put into practice. Mr. Lavergne having made certain insinuations against Mr. Kelly member for Bonaventure, met with a response which he did not expect and during an hour or more the young member for Bonaventure, took up the programme of the Nationalist party and clearly demonstrated the impossibility of accepting a single item of their programme.

Mr. Kelly's Address
Mr. Kelly, member for Bonaventure, then followed Mr. Lavergne and replied to the unjustified remarks that fell from the lips of the member of Montserrat. He recalled the fact that they had both been born together at school and had also studied together in the same office during several years. Knowing the ability as a speaker that Mr. Lavergne had displayed when a student, and after having passed four years in the House of Commons he had expected to hear from the honorable member the speech of a statesman with ideas worthy of the position he has occupied. On the contrary however the speech delivered by the honorable member is one of mere personalities against the men who took and nursed him in the cradle of his political life, and who had helped make him what he is. He did not contest the right of the honorable member to change his opinions so often as he chooses. He has changed them in the past, he has changed them today and he will again change them tomorrow, according to the opportunity that presents itself, but while he has that right he should at least have the courtesy to let the men who differ from his views and who were instrumental in securing his first steps in political life, to take up the question of the Territories as a Colon. Lord Dufferin said to the free settlers, the speaker of the House, that the Territories are a gift to the people of the province and which means nothing. The speaker said that we should not let the holders in one part of the province and the settlers in the other and keep them separated so that they may make their own mistakes. That is a fine thing but how can it be put into practice under present circumstances. The land for the settlers are applying in many cases are lands that have already been sold in years gone by to the limit holders and on which the limit holders have their rights. The present system of selling crown lands was inaugurated about 1842, and in those days and up till recent years the various governments that have preceded the present one did not look to the question of settlement that was to take place in the future. And hence it is that we have the settler and the limit holder each claiming equal rights in many cases to the same land. If the honorable member for Bonaventure will

able members opposite will suggest any way by which to remedy the present situation and which could be put into practice, every member of this house would be pleased to join them in that respect. But what are the suggestions of the opposition in this respect. The member from Montserrat has suggested that we should take and hand over to the colonization department the lands that should be placed aside for colonization. Now admitting that we do this what would be the result. The situation as between the limit holder and the settler would remain exactly the same, and it would be so no matter to what department we would hand over the administration of the lots. This would simply amount to a question of administration. But whether the sale of the lots would be carried out by one department or the other the rights of the limit holder on the lots thus sold, and the rights of the settler as they now exist would remain exactly the same, and we would be in the same position as we are today.

This is one of the questions that would call for great attention from all governments but our situation after all is not worse than it is in other provinces. While we have this trouble to solve here today the other provinces and more especially New Brunswick have questions relating to their forest which are just as serious if not more so than what is at issue in our province. In New Brunswick today they are obliged to solve the question of the leases of the forests that will expire in the near future and the difficult questions that are already commencing to present themselves in that respect are far more intricate than the questions that we have now to dispose of.

The honorable member for Montserrat has declared tonight that the honoraries of this province during the last ten years have made a profit of over two hundred and fifty million dollars (tax should have been made by the province. I do not know whether the honorable member knows the meaning of two hundred and fifty million dollars but if he can show this province how we could have made two hundred and fifty million dollars during the past ten years his name will remain in history as a genius of this time. Such a declaration is one of the many that have been made by the honorable members of the left and which are too absurd to call for attention.

Since the opening of the debate the opposition have offered three suggestions. Their leader says that we should hand over the expenditure of our monies for education to the council of public instruction. This has been done. We voted for education purposes last year seven hundred thousand dollars and out of this amount only thirty thousand dollars went under the control of the provincial secretary.

The second suggestion from the honorable member from Joliette was that we should spend our money for iron bridges in the same way as we dispose of our money for agriculture. We adapted such a policy as would enable the building of iron bridges in our province, for years to come.

The third suggestion is from the honorable member for Bonaventure, who suggests that we should build a hotel roads in the province of six or sixty miles in length so that the people may see how to do likewise elsewhere. But in what county would we go to do this. A few years ago we built such a road and rather contributed towards it, that is the road that leads to St. Anne's Bay, and even tonight the opposition have criticized the false position that they hold simply for the sake of argument.
