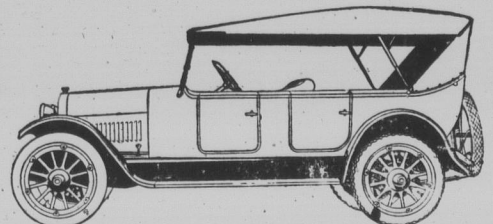

WERNER HORNE TO BE RELEASED

Prisoner at Dorchester Will be Departed Says Ottawa Report.

Frederickton, N. B., July 22.—Werner Horne, captain in the German army and noted war criminal now serving a term of imprisonment in the Maritime Penitentiary at Dorchester, N. B., for attempting to blow up the international bridge on the Canadian Pacific Railway between Vancouver, Maine and McAdam, N. B., may soon be released and deported from Canada as an undesirable alien.

So far no official word has been received by officials here or at the penitentiary at Dorchester, but it is understood that some early developments in the case are expected by officials at the penitentiary and that New York newspaper men are now in the Maritime Provinces investigating various features connected with the case.

Horne's brother in Brooklyn, N. Y., is said to be taking the principal part in the efforts to bring about the release of the German officer, although it is said favorable representations for his release have been made on behalf of the German government.

Ottawa, July 22.—The government has ordered the release from the Maritime Penitentiary at Dorchester, of Werner Horne, the dynamite, who tried to blow up the international bridge on the C. P. R. between Vancouver and McAdam during the war, and who, on October 13, 1915, was sentenced to ten years on a charge of endangering life and property by damaging a railway bridge.

The liquidation in many lines is now complete. "The prices of raw materials are now comparatively stable and manufacturing lines can now move forward with confidence in prices. The liquidation of manufactured commodities is over many lines and is now rapidly being completed in others, and stability of prices of manufactured articles is increasingly in evidence. "The readjustment of costs is improving with surprising smoothness. The problems that the present deflation has brought with it are being solved in a spirit of splendid co-operation. The clouds that have hung over the business world are being rapidly dissipated, and there is every reason to believe that we stand at the threshold of a new era of good business."

"There still remain a few obstacles to remove before we can open the throttle wide, but the inherent strength and soundness of American business is a pledge for the future. The fineness of the American character has shown itself once more in its ability to solve the tremendous difficulties of a
