TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE

Sherburne Says Prices Will Drop
Within a Year

"Within a year or so you are going to be able to buy clothes at a reasonable figure," Gen. John H. Sherburne told about 100 retail dealers of Greater Boston who gathered in the American House recently to consider the formation of a co-operative buying association to gradually eliminate nonessential middlemen from their business.

"Wool is starting to come down. Australia is crowded with wool which will come out when England lifts the embargo. The supply is already catching up with the demand in most raw materials. Cuba is full of sugar, the biggest crop in its history, and the price will come down because the dealers in the raw product will not be able to get rid of their crop unless it does. In the relatively near future all prices are going gradually to decline.

"Buy rather lightly. Don't overstock. Buy for immediate sale and not at all for holding or you will lose. The volume of business you do is the secret of profitable retailing, not the rake off on individual sales. Your actual percentage on gross sales has nothing to do with your profit.

Referring to the co-operative enterprise they were considering, General Sherburne said:—"Though a complex mechanism of distribution is necessary in our complex life, we have too much of it. There is a waste in effort. Retailers may well act as their own supply men. This experiment offers a tremendous chance for your success and the benefit of the public. Tell your public the truth about your business and don't be afraid if necessary to show them how much you pay for things. Work with the consumer."—Boston Globe.

TIMES HAVE CHANGED

During the Civil War the Shoe
Pinched the Other Foot

A former resident of Bridgetown residing in the United States, asks us to publish the following from an American paper:

ONCE AGAINST US

Peoples of foreign countries who have been inclined to blame us because we do not accept their paper money at its full face value should read up on our experiences during and after the Civil War, when the shoe pinched on the other foot. Recently a prominent Canadian angrily said that he would not buy a penny's worth of goods from any country that would not accept the Canadian dollar at 100 cents. But another Canadian, Sir John Wilson, writing in the Canadian Magazine, recalls some of the experiences of Americans making purchases in Canada 56 years ago.

At that time, 1864 the American dollar was worth only 40 cents across the Canadian border. The fare for Canadians to New York from Suspension bridge was \$4 while the reverse route for Americans was \$10. Canadians could stop at a \$4 a day New York hotel for \$1.60. Americans buying a 25 cent article in Toronto received only 15 cents change out of a dollar. In contrast, the lowest discount today on the Canadian dollar here has been only about 15 per cent; in the Civil war our money suffered a discount of four times as much.

It was not until 1879, or 14 years after the Civil war ended that we resumed specie payments and our dollar was worth its full face value in international trade. For several years previously we had really been ready to take the step, and as one of our statesmen said: "All we need to do to resume is to resume." The bumper American harvests of that year with poor crops in other countries, thus giving us a big profit on exports, aided greatly in making possible the restoration of the currency.

For Canada and for other countries, the way to remedy the discount on their money is not to entirely stop buying from us, but to stop buying luxuries and other articles which they may produce themselves. Raw materials, such as cotton, coal and iron, they must buy; but by turning these into finished products they can make a profit and thus help themselves.

Canada especially, a great country with unlimited natural resources and with a total favorable trade balance against the world, should "come back" quickly. And no one will be better pleased than Uncle Sam when his neighbor to the north, his second best customer among the nations of the world, has restored her currency to its normal purchasing power, and thus removes all obstacles to a resumption of the pre-war trading relations.

THE PRICE OF SHOES

The Brooklyn, N. Y., Eagle says that the manufacturers of shoes "have voted to undertake a campaign of education" to show the public why shoe prices are high and must be high and they will spend half a million to a million dollars in this propaganda. The Eagle suggests that if this amount were taken off the retail price of shoes it would be a greater stimulus to trade than the "campaign of education" can ever be, "but probably the dealers know their business better than editors."

The Eagle is a trustworthy paper, and its revelations are doubtless within the facts. Every man or woman who buys a high priced pair of shoes is contributing to this "campaign of education" and every editor who, in good faith, publishes an article pretending to show why footwear is high and why, it must remain so is publishing free an article that some newspapers are getting well paid for publishing.

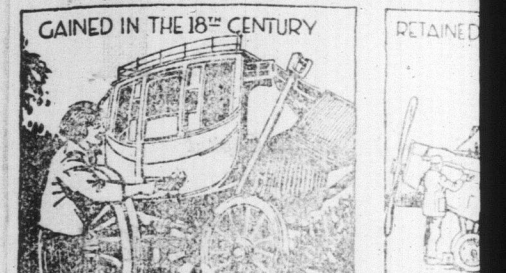
