THE SYNOD

Next week the 47th session of the Synod of the Diocese of Nova Scotia will convene in Halifax. There will be a celebration of the Holy Communion in All Saints' Cathedral on Tuesday morning at 7.30 and the first business session will be held in St Paul's Hall, Argyle St., at 10 o'clock. The Archbishop's "Charge" will be delivered in the afternoon at 3 o'clock, and there will be a reception at Bishop's Lodge for all members of the Synod, their families, and their hosts and hostesses from 4.30 to 6 p.m.

The same evening the Synod service proper will be held in All Saints' Cathedral at 8, when the preacher will be the Right Rev. Charles White, D.D., Lord Bishop of Newfoundland. This year the Synod promises to be unusually important and interesting and will likely be in session at least 3 days. Besides routine business and the reports of committees—standing and otherwise—the agenda contains a long list of notices of motions.
